During the summer, Annette and Richard will be awarded scholarships to Interlochen for two weeks, and Joan will be attending Michigan State.

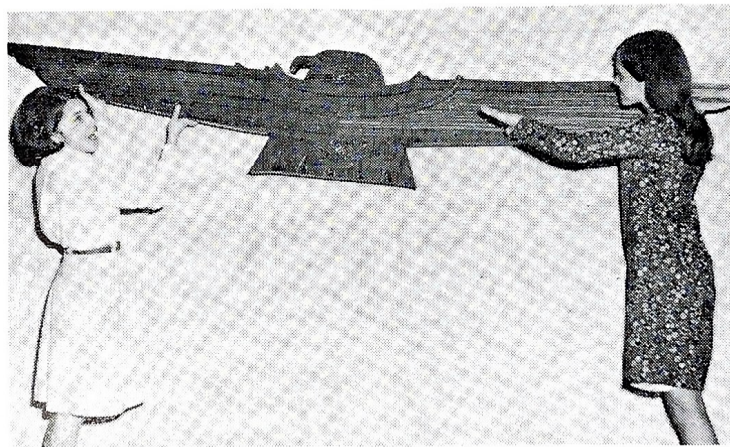

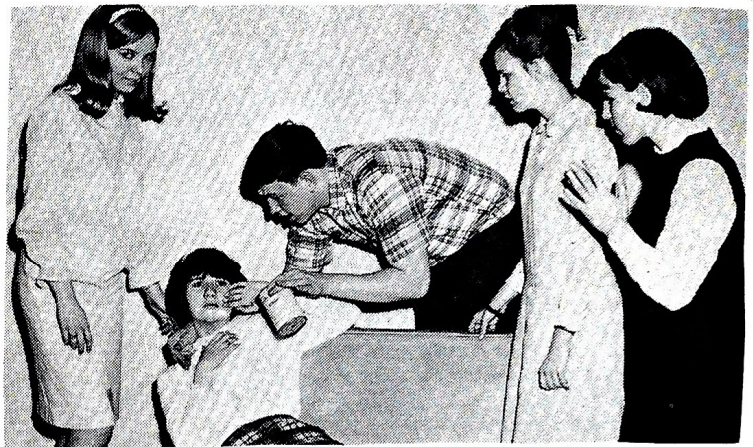

The roof fell in about three weeks ago when they were beaten by Catholic Central; well, actually they were trounced 14-4. The pitching fell apart and the hitting couldn't fill the gap.

The next game was at home against Wayne, and things started looking up. Mike Yuskowatz took the mound, unbeaten as of then. He pitched well, fanning 10 and allowing only 4 hits. The Zebras managed to push across just two unearned runs, and that was all.

But a pitcher can't win a ball game by himself. He needs some hitting to back him up. Yuskowatz didn't get it—the T-Birds pulled a Chicago White Sox on him. They mustered only two hits and managed to strand 16 men on base somehow (The Tigers are averaging only 9, and they lead the Big Leagues).

When Edsel took the field against Trenton the next day, it was nearly a carbon copy of the game 24 hours earlier. Ron Falkiewicz hurled a two-hitter and allowed only two runs. But for the second straight day they managed only two hits.

Thus in 18 innings Edsel picked up a grand total of four hits, one each by Moose Ketyian, Ted Grignon, Larry Suarez, and Doug Ballnik . . . and all were singles. Even the White Sox couldn't win with that many hits.

The T-Birds were handed their fourth straight loss at Dearborn.

Trackmen Track Zebras 78-40

The Edsel Ford track team ran off and left Wayne in a cloud of dust by shutting down the Zebras 78-40.

Coaches Arnold Domke and Jack Bridges had their usual strategy worked out against Wayne, Win! The coaches' enthusiasm to win was shared by the entire team.

Dave Lennox, 11A, turned on the speed to place second in the grueling mile run with a time of 4:57.

Terry, "Speed", Walters ran a 10.1 in the 100 yard dash (Terry is now co-holder of the school record) and 22 flat in the 220 dash for two first places.

Doug Bock edged closer to the stars by leaping 5'8" in the high jump. Doug also took first places in both low and high hurdles.

Mike McCartan, 11A, ran the awesome 2 mile run in 10:10, breaking his own school record. Almost every time Mike runs the two mile, he either breaks or comes near breaking his own record.

Pole vaulter, Jack Gruska, 10A, broke the sophomore record with a vault of 12'2". Jack finished second behind Curt Chubner, who now holds the field record of 12'5/4.

Yuskowatz was on the mound for the second time in four days and pitched five innings of scoreless ball.

His teammates chipped in with a run in the top of the sixth as Suarez, who has been swinging the team's hottest bat, tripled to deep left-center and scored on a wild throw to third. That run was the Birds' first in 22 game:

Suarez picked up two hits in the game, while Falkiewicz chipped in with three hard singles and three stolen bases. But one run wasn't enough, as Yuskowatz ran out of gas in the bottom of that inning.

He walked the first man he faced and then threw a bunt into center-field, opening the door for nine Pioneer runs. Thirteen men batted before the inning was over. So the draught continues . . . is an oasis too much to ask for?
