Edsel Ford Student Leads In National Language Test

Kathy Bailey, 12A, is this year's Michigan winner of the National German Contest. This contest is sponsored each year by the American Association of Teachers of German.

To enter this contest, Kathy and the other German students who entered had to go to the University of Detroit. There they took tests according to their grade levels.

Kathy, who is a second year student, managed to score the highest number of points of all other second year students in Michigan. Other Edsel Ford students who scored in the upper third of the second year eategory are juniors Janet Weber, Linda Wenglowski, and Joanne Black. In the third year category, seniors Bonnie Ledebuhr and Eric Cross scored among the top third.

All of the French students at Edsel took similar tests. However, the contest that they entered was sponsored by the American Association of Teachers of French. They took the test right here in school.

There were four categories of French tests, one for each grade level. In the first year category, Clara Nalli, 10A, scored the most points in the school. Carol Wieck, 10A, scored the most in the second year category. Tilmann Hasche-Kluender, 11A, was the highest scorer at the third year level, and Kathy Bailey scored the highest in the fourth year category.

Kathy was honored at a School Masters Conference on May 12 in Ann Arbor for her outstanding achievement.



Gruska-Polevaults Over Record


"I think we could have an excellent track team if everyone put forth his best effort all the time," declared this edition's star athlete, Jack Gruska, 10A.

Schools Battle For City Track Championship

Six schools battled a fierce war two weeks ago for the championship of the All-City Track Meet held at Dearborn High. The preliminaries started at 3:00 and the finals at 6:00.

The six schools that competed in the order in which they placed are Dearborn High, with a winning total of 102½ points; Edsel Ford, 61½ points; Divine Child, 24 points; Lowrey, 23 points; Sacred Heart, 12 points; and St. Alphonsus, 3 points.

Edsel Ford, in finishing second, did a good job in certain events. Terry Walters, 12A, came in first in the 100 and 220 yard dashes, breaking the city record in the 220 by running it in 22.3 seconds. He did the 100 in 10.2 seconds. Tom Klug, 12A, did the broad jump at 20 feet-3 inches; he also came in third in the 220. Curt Chubner, 12A, pulled a first in the pole vault at 11 feet-8 inches, while Jack Gruska finished second at 10 feet-6 inches. Doug Bock, 12A, won the high jump going 5 feet-8 inches, while Pat Monea, 12A, placed third in 440 yard dash with a time of 52.8 seconds.
