

**Marion Louise Grettenberger**, daughter of John O. (1868-1944) and Wilhelmina "Minnie" (Kaiser) (1872-1958) Grettenberger, was born 18 November 1897, Okemos, Ingham County, Michigan. Her mother was a 1888 Okemos school graduate and a former teacher in the Okemos school system. Marion's father, John, was a druggist, proprietor of a combined drug and grocery business and the postmaster of Okemos.

Marion graduated Valedictorian in 1913 from Okemos High School. She furthered her education by obtaining a degree in Home Economics from Michigan Agricultural College (now Michigan State University) in 1918. Upon graduation Marion was employed as assistant chemist at MAC chemistry station from 1918-1924. On 23 August 1924, in her parent's Okemos home, Marion married Forrest Floyd Musselman.

To this, the bridal party descended the stairs and took their places in the living room, before a big window which was banked with ferns and flowers. # Forrest F. Musselman Was 72, Long Active In E. Lansing

Forrest F. Musselman, 72, of 140 Oakhill ave., East Lansing, whose real estate activities paralleled the rapid growth of the university city for nearly half a century, died Wednesday in a Lansing hospital.

Mr. Musselman entered the real estate business in East Lansing in 1919, soon after he graduated from Michigan Agricultural college. Prior to his entering college he was a school teacher in Ohio public schools five years and served during World War I.

He was born in Ohio on July 16, 1889.

Long active in civic affairs, Mr. Musselman was a past president of the Lansing Board of Realtors and of the Lansing Exchange club. At the time of his death he was a director of the Ingham chapter of the Michigan State Alumni association. A loyal supporter of Michigan State university athletics, he was a member of the Downtown Coaches club.

He also was a charter member of the Service Bowling league, having bowled with it 26 years. Mr. Musselman also was a charter member of the Sherwood lodge of Free Masons of Ohio, transferring his Masonic activities to Lansing an becoming a member of Lansing Commandery 25, Knights Templar, Capital Caravan club; Capital Chapter 9, R.A.M.; Lansing Council 29, R. and S. M.; Central Michigan Scottish Rite club; Elf Khurafeh temple of Saginaw, and DeWitt Clinton Consistory. He was a 32nd degree Mason.

Mr. Musselman was a member of Peoples church of East Lansing, Sigma Nu fraternity, the Chamber of Commerce of Greater Lansing, and William Riker Johnson Post 205 of the American Legion.



# Ex-Local Musician Dies at 96

Miss Louise Freyhofer, 96, a resident of East Lansing for more than 40 years, died Wednesday at a Grand Rapids nursing home.

From 1919 to 1963 she had been a piano teacher and was active in a number of local music organizations.

A native of Roseville, she received degrees from German-Wallace College, the music college of Baldwin University, and served as head of the piano department at Central Wesleyan College in Warrenton, Mo.

She later went to Berlin, Germany, in 1900 to study at the Stern Conservatory and upon her return in 1902 she became head of the piano department at Michigan State University.

She held this position until 1919 and also directed the university choir and girls glee club

Miss Freyhofer was an honorary member of the Lansing and East Lansing Music Teachers Cuild and the Greater Lansing Music Teachers Association. She was an honorary life member of the Michigan Music Teachers Association, a member of the Lansing Matinee Musicale, a life member of Sigma Alpha Iota music fraternity, a member of the East Lansing Women's Club and an honorary life member of the American Association of University Women.

She was also a member of Peoples Church and the WCTU.

A memorial service is being planned at Peoples Church.

Funeral services will be held at 11 a.m. Saturday at the M.J. Clark Memorial Home Chapel, Grand Rapids, and burial will be in Woodvale Cemetery, Berea, Ohio.
