

**Dalsa May Eames**, daughter of Daniel J. (1901-1980) and Thelma V. (Beaumont) (1903-1977) Eames, was born 16 February 1925, Michigan. She was one of 3 siblings; Beverly, Dalsa and Daniel J. II. Beverly was a 1942 graduate of Okemos High School. Dalsa graduated from OHS in 1943. Daniel graduated from East Lansing High School.



Dalsa, in February 1947, graduated from the Edward W. Sparrow Hospital School of Nursing. She wed Cliff William Salton 30 August 1947, Mason, Ingham County. Cliff was a World War II veteran.

On 22 March 1953 the Eames family received the devastating news that Daniel J. had been lost at sea while on a routine training mission aboard a PBM Mariner Flying Boat off the coast of Puerto Rico. He was one of 11 crew members, bodies never recovered.

## **Memorial Service Planned For Okemos Naval Airman**

**Nabbed Nazi**

Memorial services for Daniel J. Eames II, son of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Eames of Okemos, and an aviation machinist's mate third class in the navy, will be held at 3 p. m. Sunday at Okemos Community church.

Eames was one of a crew of 11 men lost when their plane, a PBM Mariner flying boat, failed to return to its base at San Juan, Puerto Rico, last March 22, after participating in training operations.

One of the most extensive searches in navy annals was conducted as 20 ships and 40 planes covered 16,000 square miles of the Caribbean area seeking the twin-engine plane.

Chaplain David S. Evans of the naval reserves, and pastor of the Okemos church, will conduct the services, assisted by members of the Lansing Naval Reserve Training center.

Eames attended East Lansing high school and Michigan State college before joining the service Feb. 22, 1951. Besides the parents, he is survived by two sisters, Mrs. C. W. Salton of Pontiac and Mrs. Lee Thompson of Detroit; and the grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Eames, and Mrs. G. H. Beaumont, all of Mason.

A memorial for Daniel was set in Maple Grove Cemetery, Mason.

By 1965 Dalsa was Chairman of the School of Health Services, Board of Education, Birmingham, Michigan. According to her mother's Lansing State



Journal obituary in 1977, Dalsa was married to a "Dee Nichols." When her sister Beverly died in 1988, Dalsa was referred to as, "Dalsa Goodwin."

Dalsa in the 1980's married Cory Greif Goodwin. The couple moved to Mesa, Maricopa County, Arizona. Dalsa died 21 November 2016, Maricopa County.
