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



# Price Paces Everett '11' To 14-13 Win Over Chiefs

### Vikings Score Twice in Second Half for **Fourth Victory**

OKEMOS, Nov. 8-George (Whitey) Price, playing his last football game for Everett high, sparked a second-half rally here Friday afternoon as the Vikings came from behind to nip Okemos, 14 to 13, in a non-league game.

Price, one of the outstanding prep players in the Lansing area this fall, scored both touchdowns-the second with only three minutes left

in the game-and completed his in the game—and completed his afternoon's work by running for both points after touchdowns to account for all of Everett's points. The victory was Everett's fourth in eight games. Okemos finished the season with a 5-3 record. Okemos, which halled down second place in the

ond place in the Ingham County league race last week, completely dominated the first half against its Capital Cir-cuit conference foe Friday and



halftime margin.
The Chiefs scored in the first period when Jerry Rosa busted around end for the last five yards of a sustained drive. Russ Burch ran for the extra point. Coach Bill Shippey's Everett eleven started to move in the second quarter, but lost the ball on Okemos' one-yard line when Bob Burchfield fumbled and the Chiefs recovered.
Coach Ed Kiley's Chiefs took advantage of the break and on the third play, Dick Ewing swaggered around end and galloped 70 yards for a touchdown. Another run for the extra point failed.
A partially blocked punt set up Everett's first scoring opportunity on the Chief's 40-yard line. Price carried the last five yards, and converted the extra point on a fake place-kick run. Early in the last quarter Okemos threatened again and had a first down on Everett's five-yard line. The Everett line held, and then the Vikings marched 97 yards for the winning touchdown.

Jerry Bentley, Everett senior quarterback, connected on a 15-yard pass to Price for the payoff play. With the score tied at 13-13, Price again stepped into the breach and ran for the extra point and the victory.

Looking for a favorite in the Ingham County league football race? Spin an eight-sided top and the school that lands up will be as good a choice as any.

The eight-team Class C confer-

ence is expected to have one of its ence is expected to have one of its tightest races in recent years with any one of the squads strong enough to come up with the honors. Loop play opens Friday with hree night games and an after-oon tilt at Dansville.

Here are brief sketches about the eight teams (last year's league won, tie and loss records in paren-

Holt (6-0-1) - Four-times de-Holt (6-0-1) — Four-times defending champions, and playing in league last year. Will enter Capital Circuit next fall. Four returning regulars, but have reserve power to again sweep to title.

Haslett (5-1-1) — Coach Oland Dunckle, starting first year at Haslett, has letterman at every position, including eight regulars. Just missed last year, but holds slight edge in race this fall.

Fowlerville (4-1-2)—Started last year with group of sophomores in

year with group of sophomores in rebuilding job. Eleven veterans back, but may be year away from title contention. Could be surprise of league.

Okemos (3-0-4)—New Coach Ed Kiley has dozen lettermen, including four regulars. Three of the veterans are in backfield. Probably fastest backfield in league with Sprinter Dick Ewing leading the

Leslie (3-0-4)—Heavy line could give Fullback Dick Hecksel openings needed to make the veteran fullback a scoring threat every time he carries ball. Coach John McCarger has 14 lettermen, including nine regulars. Line may average near 200 pounds.

Williamston (3-0-4) — Certainly the darkhorse in the race. Coach Bob Kohloff—another new mentor in the league—has a brand new line, but is cautiously optimistic about squad. Hornets open season against Haslett and Holt, and could upset their title hopes.

Dansville (2-0-5) — Probably a year away, as only three seniors first eleven. Bob McElreath ing first year in coaching ranks.

Third place in the Ingham Cou 1ty Football league will be up for grabs Friday afternoon when Okemos and Stockbridge meet on the Chiefs' field.

The league's top teams - undefeated Haslett and once-beaten Holt-do not see league action this week. Haslett is idle after winning five in a row and Holt travels to Mason for a non-conference game with the Capital Circuit

eleven.

Two other league games are on tap. Leslie (2-3) plays at Williamston (0-5) and Fowlerville (2-3) is host to Dansville (1-4).

Coach Ed Kiley's Okemos team and Coach Charlie Wright's Stockbridge Panthers have each won three and lost a pair of games. The two teams are evenly matched as both have lost to Holt and Haslett. Both also have victories over Danse Both also have victories over Dans-ville and Fowlerville.

#### Ewing Sets Up Scores

Okemos' scoring has been spread around with Russ Burch, Jerry Rossa and Harold Grier each scoring two touchdowns this year. Dick Ewing, central Michigan sprint champion last spring, has set up many of the touchdowns with long runs. Stockbridge will have to stop this quartet of runners to take the

this quartet of runners to take the Chiefs into camp Friday.

After winning its first three games, Stockbridge lost a lastminute decision to Holt and then went down before Haslett. Bill Fouty and Vic Jurkan have been the offensive leaders for the Pan-

thers.

Leslie, although defeated in its last three starts, is favored to beat Williamston. The Hornets have given up 112 points in five games and have been able to score only nine themselves. Williamston has lost five in a row.

Coach Maro Miller's Fowlerville Gladiators have come back strong after dropping their first three games. The Gladiators topped Williamston 27 to 0, and then beat Leslie, 26 to 13, as Larry Wallace accounted for all the points. Dansville won its first game in five last week by downing Williamston, 21 to 0.

MacDonald had a part in all three touchdowns when Okemos tripped Williamston, 21-19, early in the season. He tossed two touchdown passes to Russ Burch and scampered across for the other. Ewing ran 70 yards against Dansville for a marker as the Chiefs won, 19-6.

Herbie Hagenbuch will again be Haslett's strongest offensive punch against the Chiefs. The scrappy junior halfback has tallied 13 touchdowns on runs and passed for three more. Running along with Hagenbuch for Haslett will be John Metro, Bill Haskins and Darwin Hart.
