The First Celebrated Athlete of Okemos Consolidated School

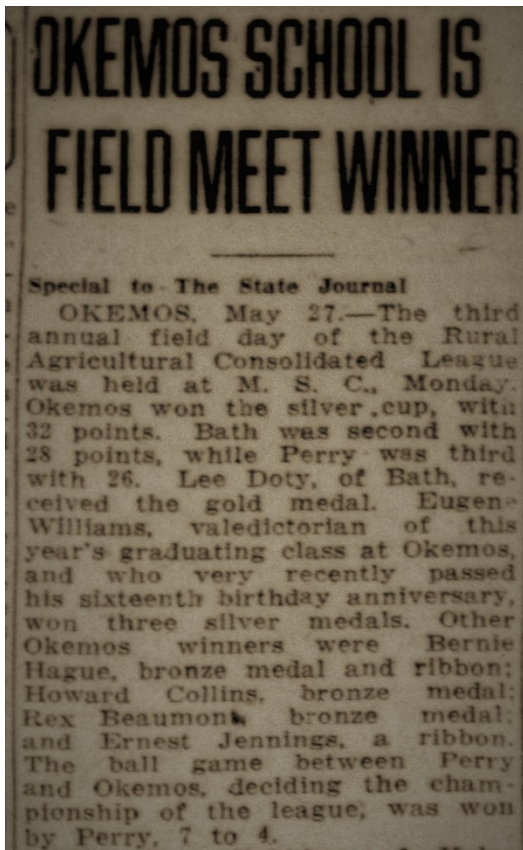


Eugene Wayne (or possibly Warren) Williams, son of Eugene R. and Helen May (Stanton) Williams, was born 10 May 1909 Plumstead, Cape Province, South Africa. Eugene, youngest of four boys, was the son of 7-Day Adventist missionaries.

He graduated in 1925, at the tender age of 16, from Okemos High School.



By 1925, G.C. White was listed as the superintendent. He oversaw the education of all the students and mentored those who wished to finish their studies at the highest level possible. The class of 1925 finished out the year with a total of seven (five males and two females) completing their exercises. Pictured here from left to right are (first row) G.C. OKEMOS SCHOOL IS FIELD MEET WINNER

Okemos, May 27, - The third annual field day of the Rural Agricultural Consolidated League was held at M. S. C., Monday. Okemos won the silver cup, with 32 points. Bath was second with 28 points, while Perry was third with 26. Lee Doty, of Bath, received the gold medal. **Eugene Williams, valedictorian of this year's graduating class at Okemos and who very recently passed his sixteenth birthday anniversary, won three silver medals.** Other Okemos winners were Bernie Hague, bronze medal and ribbon; Howard Collins, bronze medal; Rex Beaumont, bronze medal; and Ernest Jennings, a ribbon. The ball game between Perry and Okemos, deciding the championship of the league was won by Perry, 7 to 4.


Eugene Williams was the first celebrated athlete at Okemos.

Eugene R. Williams, born 16 September 1867 Utica, Oneida County, New York, married 31 August 1890 Park County, Montana, Miss Helen May Stanton. Helen was born 10 June 1868 Holt, Ingham County, Michigan. By 1900 the couple, with 3 young sons, were in Chippewa County, Michigan where Eugene was a clergyman.

The Williams family sailed and arrived as missionaries in South Africa 28 January 1908. They lived at Claremont, Cape Colony. The US Consulate prepared a "Certificate of Registration Of American Citizen" for Eugene but the certificate was never issued. The certificate's expiration date was 7 September 1910. Helen also had such a Consulate Certificate issued and with expiration date of 7 February 1914. Her certificate recorded the following; "Eugene R. Williams, who was born in Utica, N.Y. U.S.A. and is now deceased."

In 1914 widowed Helen and sons made on their way back to New York by way of two different ships. Helen, Lewis (born 1893) and Eugene (born 1909) left Liverpool, England aboard the ship Adriatic. They arrived in New York harbor 26 September 1914. The other two sons, Irwin (born 1891) and Hugh (born 1895), sailed from Southampton, England aboard the Olympic and arrived 26 March 1914 New York harbor.


Eugene accompanied his mother as she continued her work in the church. By 1918 Mrs. Williams was teaching in what is now called Silgo Adventist School in Takoma Park, D.C. The 1930 US Federal Census enumerated Mrs. Williams working in Latah County, Idaho and employed as a "district leader in local church activity." Helen Williams died 23 December 1940 Los Angeles County, California. She was interred Riverside Cemetery, Okemos.

Mrs. Helen Williams, 72, formerly of Holt, died December 23 at Los Angeles. Mrs. Williams, the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Stanton, was born at Holt where she lived for 20 years. She married Eugene R. Williams in 1890. She was a member of the Adventist church, and both she and Mr. Williams were missionaries in Africa for the church. Surviving are four sons, Irwin R., of Lansing, Lewis S., of St. Joseph, Hugh W., of Mt. Pleasant, and Eugene of Nevada; nine grandchildren; and a sister. Funeral services will be held at 10 o'clock Thursday morning at the Estes-Leadley funeral home, with Elder Taylor Bunch officiating. Interment will be at Okemos.

Eugene came back to Michigan to go to school around 1920. His brother Erwin had married in Okemos in 1916 and

settled in Meridian Township. Maternal family roots were deep in Ingham County. Mrs. Williams was a Stanton and her mother was a Stillman. The Stillman's had been in Ingham County for decades and held a large family reunion yearly in the Okemos area.

VETERAN SPARTAN HARRIERS SCARCE

Coach Mason Must Build up New Cross Country Team This Fall

With Captain Roy Severance the only veteran available, Coach Morton Mason will face a difficult task at Michigan State this fall when he will be called on to build a cross country team to face probably the most strenuous schedule in years. In addition to the customary three dual meets with the University of Michigan, Notre Dame, and Marquette, the Spartans will run in the Central Intercollegiate and the Western conference meets, and the second team will carry the Green and White in the state intercollegiates. Both the Central and State intercollegiates will be held at East Lansing.

Five of the six letter men from last year have graduated. From last year's freshman squad and the reserves must come the Spartan harriers. Tommy Belt of Detroit, Herrick Waterman of Decker, Frank Haven of East Lansing, Guy Culbert of Hastings, Alfred Dorrance of Scotts, Royce Drake of Ypsilanti, Henry Johnson of Belding, and Ward Barnett of Rochester are some of the reserves who have had experience.

As likely a prospect as any is Henry Wylie of Sparta, probably the best distance runner in state track circles, barring the university. In his first year of competition, Wylie stepped out with the big boys and was never beaten by more than a few yards, even in the national intercollegiates. Wylie's best time for the mile is 4:25. Of course all great milers are not necessarily good cross country men, but Wylie should find a place on the Spartan squad, barring injuries.

Among the sophomores who must be figured on, are Lewis Hackney, of Flint, William Kroll of Detroit, Richard Maples of Fordson, Alvin LaPlant of Eau Claire, Leland Smith of Allegan, Victor Rossman of Onondaga, Eugene Williams of Okemos, Meredith Clark of Vicksburg, Walter Sheldon of Alger, Lowell Lamkin of Good Hart, Frank Baker of Mt. Pleasant, and George Farley of Albion. Jack O'Connor of Hastings is a man that coaches believe can go far in the running game if he cares to.

After graduation in 1925 Eugene went on to graduate from Michigan State College. Early Season Practice Starts Wednesday at M. S. C. ; Prospects Good

To insure placing a capable team in uniform this year, Coach Morton Mason has ordered his Michigan State cross country runners to report Wednesday of this week. The early practice should give the Spartans a little jump on their opponents.

State hopes for a well balanced harrier outfit this year, with Henry Wylie of Sparta, veteran miler, as captain. Letter winners available include Leonard Blakesdale of St. Johns, Frank Haven of Lansing, Alvin LaPlante of Eau Claire, and Eugene Williams of Okemos.

Three sophomores who should make the veterans step are Loren Brown of Detroit, Elmer Roosien of South Haven, and Floyd Roberts of Rapid River. Brown as a freshman was the state intercollegiate cross country champion, as well as state two-mile champion. Roberts finished second to Brown in the state cross country run, and Roosien was eight. Roosien also starred with Brown on the freshman track team.

Two Lansing Athletes Get Honors in Athletic Elections At State College

Two former Lansing High school sprinters were elected to track captaincies at Michigan State college, Tuesday, when Frederick P. Alderman was chosen as leader of next year's Spartan track team, and Lyle Henson was named honorary captain of the present freshman thinclad outfit. Henson graduated from Lansing in 1924 and entered M. S. C. in the fall of 1925. Alderman competed for the Big Reds in 1922 and became a Spartan in 1923. Both Henson and Alderman are members of the Columbian Literary society.

Fourteen men were given major letters in track, and 12 in baseball, it was announced Wednesday by Ralph H. Young, director of athletics at Michigan State. In addition to these awards, the college gave 49 numerals to freshmen in four different sports—track, baseball, tennis and fencing—and 52 service sweaters both to freshmen and members of varsity squads. Eight minor sport letters were also awarded.

For the first time in the history of the institution awards were made in fencing. This is now a recognized minor sport at the college. The fencing team boasts a victory over the University of Michigan. Yusef Waffa of Cairo, Egypt, was the captain and star of the team.

21 Spartan Gridders Are Honored With Grid Awards

Coach Young Announces List of Men Winning 'S' and Has High Praise for Performance of Athletes; 25 Yearlings Are Voted Numerals for Season's Work

Twenty-one varsity football awards were announced by Ralph H. Young, director of athletics at Michigan State college. The announcement was made following the annual review of the athletic work of the varsity and freshman teams. Six cross-country men who helped Michigan State to a clean cut victory in the first running on the Central Inter-Collegiate cross-country run were also honored with a minor letter. Twenty-five freshman football players, headed by the yearling captain Vincent Define of Nearve, O., were awarded for their services on the gridiron. Other lists announced to athletes who did not quite make the grade for first string freshman competition but whose services were appreciated throughout the season.

Heading the 'varsity football list is the name of Captain Martin Rummell. Although this leader did not play in a single game or take active part in any practice session he was on the field every day, on the bench every game and led the team, though crippled. An automobile accident last summer kept the red-headed Spartan leader out of the rough work all season. In making the football awards Coach Young declared that almost every man on the squad played a better game against Haskell, the closing engagement of the year. The stellar performance of the day perhaps, in Coach Young's estimation, was the playing of Johnny Anderson at left end.

"Anderson typified the fine play of the team last Saturday," said Coach Young. "He played just about five times as well as we had any reason to believe from watching him in practices or other games. It was almost on this great day's work alone that the college wants to honor Anderson by presenting him with his 'S.'"

The State mentor had praise for almost every man on the squad. He called Boehringer, who graduates next June, the best quarterback at East Lansing in the last four years, branded Glen Hitchings the squad's iron man, called Hugo Kanitz' fine play the proof that work and determination will get a football player somewhere, said that Jack Hornbeck probably is the greatest end prospect at Michigan State in years, pointed out that Harry Kurrie fought so hard all year that he was continuously black and blue and said that Grim, Wenner, Drew, McCosh, Ross, Barratt, Crabill, Deacon, Danziger and Moeller played their best games of the year.

YALE IS AGAINST COMBINE IN EAST

Student Paper Says Move for New Conference Would Over-Emphasize Football

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 23.—(By A.P.)—The Yale News disapproves of the suggestion that an association of eastern college football teams be formed to include, tentatively, Princeton, Harvard, Yale, Cornell, Dartmouth, Pennsylvania, Columbia, Brown, Syracuse, Virginia and possibly Army and Navy. Football already is over emphasized, it says.

"The Daily Princetonian and the Columbia Spectator have fallen in line with the New York newspaper writers who have advocated the formation of an eastern intercollegiate football league," the News will say. "Both claim the honor of initiating the idea, but before it gains headway on the assumption that other colleges and universities will favor it, we oppose the scheme on the general principle, that it must inevitably contaminate and commercialize intercollegiate football. It may be adopted by other institutions, but we hope and believe that Yale will not enter any such league."

"Championships and prestige are not the goal of Yale football. Victory is as dear to the hearts of Yale enthusiasts as it is to other university men; but we do not court public favor through the medium of football success. Yale has traditional rivals whom she likes to defeat in football. * * * Outside the select group we have no interest in our relative football prestige."

His Army career began in 1918 and lasted during World War I, World War II and the Korean conflict. He served in England, Belgium, France and Germany and was sent on special assignment to Japan in 1950 and to Korea with the United Nations Civil assistance Team in 1951.

Col. Williams held the Bronze Star Medal, World War I Victory Medal, American Defense Service Medal, American Campaign Medal, European, African, Middle Eastern Campaign Medal with three service stars, World War II Victory Medal, Army of Occupation medal, National Defense Service Medal, Korean Service Medal with two service stars, United Nations Service Medal and the Armed Forces Reserve Medal.

He was active in the Berrien County Chapter of the American Red Cross having instituted the first civilian disaster plan for the county. He was a member of the Retired Officers Association, the Grand Mere Association, the National Audubon Society, Fernwood and the Berrien County Art Guild.

During his retirement years, he returned to oil painting for which he was trained in Claremont, South Africa, and the Corcoran School of Art in Washington, D.C.

Military funeral services will be held Wednesday at 2:30 p.m. in the Kerlikowske and Starks funeral home. Burial will follow in Riverview cemetery.

Hugh Wellington Williams was born 11 August 1895 Clinton County, Michigan. He married Evelyn Leone Case 14 September 1920. Hugh was a minister. Evelyn, born 1893, died 1975. Hugh died 19 December 1987 Reed City, Osceola County, Michigan.
