Martha Barnes, 87, headed Grady High's math department

A brilliant mathematics teacher and student of Latin, Martha Barnes spent her more than 40-year career educating and influencing Atlanta children. Mrs. Barnes taught math at J.C. Murphy Junior High School and Girls High before settling in 1954 at Henry Grady High School, where she served as chairman of the math department until 1980. "She was instrumental in sending so many students to MIT in math and that sort of thing," said Fanny King of Atlanta, a former teacher at Grady. "She was smart as a tack, and the children loved her." Mrs. Barnes taught honors classes at Grady and three of her students won the International Science and Engineering Fair, said her husband, Dr. Jarvis Barnes of Atlanta, a former math teacher and retired assistant superintendent with Atlanta public schools. Students are selected to attend the fair based on their performance at state science fairs.

The memorial service for Martha Allen Barnes, 87, of Atlanta is 2:30 p.m. Wednesday at the First Presbyterian Church of Atlanta. She died Friday at Emory University Hospital from complications of heart problems and a series of strokes. H.M. Patterson & Son, Spring Hill, is in charge of arrangements.

A Monroe native, Mrs. Barnes graduated from Monroe High School and Agnes Scott College with a degree in math. She was a member of the classical language fraternity Eta Sigma Phi and the American Mathematical Association.

Mrs. Barnes did graduate work at Emory University, Georgia Tech and the University of Georgia before receiving her master's degree in math from Georgia State University. Though Mrs. Barnes enjoyed being challenged by a math problem, she was not as fond of technology, Mr. Barnes said. "She went to Georgia Tech and studied computers, but she never did like them."

In her classes, Mrs. Barnes would always remember her students' birthdays by telling students that she heard a bluebird tapping at the window, bringing a birthday greeting, Mr. Barnes said.

"She had a knack for it. She just had a great way of not only knowing math, but of teaching it," said her granddaughter, Martha Elizabeth Correll of Atlanta.

Though she did not teach Latin, Mrs. Barnes handled languages adeptly. "She was good at math, but she was better at languages. She could analyze, write and edit documents just beautifully," Mr. Barnes said. While at Grady, Mrs. Barnes enjoyed attending the high school football games. She played tennis, enjoyed reading and traveled extensively. She and her husband had visited more than 60 different countries.

At First Presbyterian Church of Atlanta, Mrs. Barnes taught fifth- and sixth-grade Sunday school for 17 years. She was also treasurer on the executive board of the Emory University Hospital Auxiliary for more than 10 years, her husband said.

We thought she was 120 years old when we were in high school. And that was 120 years ago.

In fact, Martha Barnes also had taught geometry to my mother. That was at Girls High School in Atlanta. Can you imagine? Most Atlanta girls fitting into one high school? I'm surprised geometry had even been discovered as a legal form of child abuse back then.

Actually, I liked geometry. It was one of the few math classes that made any sense to me. And that was because of Mrs. Barnes.

My little circle of goof-offs called her "Mammy Yokum." That was behind her back, of course. In real life, we lived in palm-sweating fear of Mrs. Barnes.

I've often wondered how Mrs. Barnes would fit in today.

She wasn't content to rule with an iron fist inside her classroom at Henry W. Grady High School in Atlanta. She also felt compelled to patrol the halls outside her room. She did this with a referee's whistle in her mouth.

Mrs. Barnes would blast her whistle and the world would come to a screeching halt. That is, everyone who had not been rendered deaf by previous forays through Mrs. Barnes' domain.

Inside class, it wasn't the whistle we feared. It was a simple, declarative statement:

"Boy! Come to the bode!"

That meant two things.

First, it meant Mrs. Barnes suspected you were not prepared for class. I don't want to say she had a sixth sense for knowing this. I'd say all six of her senses were honed in on sniffing out a slacker.

Second, it meant you had to go to the front of the room and work out a problem on the blackboard. (You remember blackboards, don't you? They were handy items, made with asbestos, that helped children develop chalk allergies.)

The whole time you struggled through the problem -- trying to bluff your way through the transitive property of inequality -- Mrs. Barnes stood in the back of the room tossing insults.

"You're going around Robin's red barn," she'd say, disgusted.

I'd be trying to figure out what a barn had to do with my main man Pythagoras, when Mrs. Barnes reached that mystical hypotenuse within herself. There came a point when she figured she had skewered you long enough, then said, "Go sit down!"

Mrs. Barnes had another special production for the times some poor soul fell asleep in her class. She contracted a football player to yank them up out of their sleep and take them across the hall to the bathroom and flush their head in the toilet.

My theorem is that heads were never actually dunked in the toilet, but I was not willing to prove it with my own head.

But Mrs. Barnes also had a soft spot. This was above and beyond the blatant favoritism and kindness she poured over her pets. This was a soft spot that showed up often at the end of class to break the tension.

She loved to celebrate every student's birthday. At least those who were not on her Most Wanted List. It always went this way. Toward the end of class, she'd say, "A little, tiny biiiiiiiiiiid came tap, tap, tapping on my window this mawnin'." And the bird told her it was so-and-so's birthday. At which time, a pet student would come back in off the streets with dozens of fresh Krispy Kreme donuts, and we would have a party.

When my mother sent me Mrs. Barnes' obituary, she noted Mrs. Barnes had outlived her only child, a daughter. And, back in the mid 1940s when Mrs. Barnes was going out on maternity leave, she broke the news to my mother's class by saying a little, tiny bird had come tap, tap, tapping on her bedroom window.

The obituary also said that Mrs. Barnes had graduated from high school, or maybe it was when she was at Agnes Scott College, with a 99.9 average.

All I could think was that I'm glad I wasn't the poor teacher who gave her that 99 one day.

I don't know the geometry postulates anymore. But I know about how some people can get a lot because they demand a lot. Which could prove my theory that Mrs. Barnes was such a good teacher because she didn't care one whit about our self-esteem. Or hurt feelings.

And that's that.

Owen Seitz Sr., 84, led bands, orchestras in schools. For 34 years, Robert Owen Seitz Sr. was a band and orchestra leader in Atlanta public schools and local musical organizations.

Mr. Seitz, 84, died Monday at his retirement home on Lake Lanier after a long struggle with Parkinson's disease.

In 1938, Mr. Seitz began a long association with music programs in Atlanta public schools. Beginning with O'Keefe Junior High and later Girls High, where he was the school's first male instructor, Mr. Seitz eventually became head of the music department at Boys High. He remained there when it was renamed Grady High and helped the program garner a number of awards.

In 1957, his Grady High orchestra was selected to perform for the Southern Music Educators Conference in Miami, and his groups have been featured at other music festivals and conferences around the South.

An early leader in Atlanta's youth orchestras, Mr. Seitz also played for four seasons as first trombone in the early years of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, according to his wife, Evelyn Aubry Seitz. During the 1940s, he led the Navy V-12 band at Emory University and conducted the university's concert band.

He was a former president of the Georgia Music Educator's Association and was inducted into Savannah's Georgia Band Masters Hall of Fame in 1987.

An Indiana native, Mr. Seitz won a state trombone championship in 1929. He earned a bachelor's degree from Western Kentucky State Teacher's College, now Western Kentucky University, and a master's degree from Chicago's VanderCook School of Music.

"He demanded the best and got the best from his students," said a former student, Herman Rothstein of Atlanta. "To this very day, I still try to do everything the right way because of Mr. Seitz.

He was a collector and builder of model steam engines, which were similar to those used on his grandparents' Indiana farm.

Gene Sanders, 102, former STAR teacher

Gene Sanders sparked scientific creativity in his students and did not want it to stop at the classroom.

He spent 42 years creating forums, including the state's science fair, where his Atlanta high school students could experiment.

Mr. Sanders, 102, watched the beginning of the technological age and was curious about everything, said his wife, Ruth Kirby Sanders of DeKalb County. He enjoyed watching things grow: plants, pets and people.

"He was the prodder who could see something in someone else and bring it out," said his wife, his only immediate survivor.

The memorial service for Eugene Hendrix Sanders of DeKalb County is 1:30 p.m. today at Glenn Memorial United Methodist Church. Mr. Sanders died of pneumonia Monday at Emory University Hospital. A.S. Turner & Sons is in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Sanders, Emory College's oldest alumnus, was a poet in his private life while teaching science at Bass Junior High School, Tech High School and Henry Grady High School until his retirement in 1962.

"He had an ability to make poetry out of anything," said longtime friend Judson Ward of Decatur, Emory University's retired executive vice president and now dean of alumni. When called upon to make a few remarks, Mr. Sanders "would always say something very, very clever and usually in rhyme, a little poem," said Mr. Ward.

Mr. Sanders found his own laboratory in nature, said his wife, especially in planting trees, flowers and shrubs. "You should see where we live," she exclaimed. "He liked to see things start growing. But once he planted the seed and it was up and going, it was survival of the fittest."

Her husband also raised prize-winning Bantam chickens, Persian cats and Scottie dogs he entered in the Southeastern Fair, said Mrs. Sanders.

In Mr. Sanders' diary, his wife found an entry in which he referred to his love of teaching as an "addiction": "I couldn't give it up, and I wondered where to get the money to keep it up."

Outside the classroom, Mr. Sanders organized the State Science Fair in 1948 and directed it for six years. He headed the Georgia Junior Academy of Science and was a fellow of the Georgia Senior Academy of Science. Through a Ford Foundation grant, the former STAR teacher of the year conducted pilot programs for gifted students.

Some of Mr. Sanders' students made a career of science, including the University of Chicago's Al Harper, a graduate of Henry Grady High. Mr. Harper formerly was director of the Center for Astrophysical Research in Antarctica. He resigned to become principal investigator on the SOFIA airborne astronomy project through NASA.

In retirement, Mr. Sanders was chairman of the jury committee and assistant clerk for DeKalb Superior Court through 1983. "That was his first opportunity to sit back and watch other people perform in their professions," said his wife. "He was a keen observer."

Many of his former students who presented cases in court would ask Mr. Sanders' opinion of why they lost, his wife laughed.

"He had a very, very keen sense of humor and a twinkle in his eye," said Mr. Ward. "He was always so affable and friendly. Everybody just loved Gene Sanders. He was a loving, friendly and kind person about other people."

A 61-year member of the Decatur Lions Club, Mr. Sanders was singled out by the international organization for its highest

honor, the Lions Club International Foundation Award. He helped start more than 20 Lions Clubs. While he was president of the Decatur club in 1939, \$10,000 was raised to open a clinic for the poor. That clinic evolved into DeKalb Medical Center.
