

PAT BOURDON CROWNED QUEEN AT RILEY GAME

1954 Graduates at School and at Work

It might be thought that when a student graduates the school disposes of the detailed records kept about him—but that is not true, and to complete the final page a follow-up study is made during the first six months after he has been graduated.

Of the 199 students that were graduated in June 1954, more than one-half are continuing their education. Of this total, 89 boys and 110 girls, 41.2%, are attending an accredited college or university. Another 16% are taking I. U. or Purdue extension work or attending a specialized school. Those attending four-year colleges have selected 32 different ones. They are attending 13 in Indiana and 10 in the neighboring states of Illinois, Michigan, Ohio, and Wisconsin. The remaining schools are scattered from Arizona to Pennsylvania to Virginia.

Of the total boys, 8.54% have joined some branch of the armed forces. The class of 1954 is represented in all the branches, but the navy has claimed the most.

All that are employed work in or around South Bend. Those that have moved have done so because of family connections or marriage. Many of the girls employed in local businesses are carry-overs from Office Practice and Retail Selling classes at Adams. Insurance offices, doctors' offices, small business offices, retail stores, filling stations, and grocery stores have provided the most popular entry jobs for the graduates. Nineteen of the total have married.

At this time only three of the entire class are unemployed.

SHOW-YA ROUND TOUR TO WELCOME FROSH

Brotherhood — Twelve Months a Year

This next month, February, has been set aside in these United States as Brotherhood Month. It seems very odd that the people who live in a land such as ours, founded as it was, should have to have a special month to remind its citizens that it is time to practice brotherhood. What is this "Brotherhood" that should be emphasized during this period? It is a principle which says, "That man is just as worthy as you are, whether he is white or colored, Jew or Christian, rich or poor."

In actual life this is not always put into practice. A man may live in a sub-standard neighborhood because his fellowmen may not let him live in a better section of the city. He may be doing menial work even though he has had a college education. Even though every man is supposed to be born with the same rights and opportunities, these may often be denied to him by other human beings because of color or religion.

One way of realizing what this actually means is by imagining yourself in the place of a person who is of a minority group. You may want to buy a house — a new house — and you have the money to make the down-payment and the regular monthly payments. There is nothing that is standing in your way — nothing, that is, except color. Because of your color and bigoted people, you must go to the part of town that is already overcrowded and run-down. You must be kept in your place.

Now imagine that you are applying for a job. You have all that it requires. In fact, you excel in the job. There is no reason why you should not get that job, — no reason, that is, except the fact that you are of the wrong religion.

Why must we, a people who live in a land founded on the principle of equal rights for all men, have a special month that says, "From this date to that, you will practice brotherhood"? Brotherhood Month could be any month — April, August, or November. It is up to us, the young people of this nation, to see that Brotherhood is practiced every month, every week, every day, and every second of our lives. We must protect ourselves, our country, and its ideal of democracy from being destroyed by one of civilization's most deadly weapons — PREJUDICE!

A Day at "John Atoms" In 2,000 A. D.


Dear Diary:
