The purpose of Boys State is to better acquaint these boys with the functioning of the State and local governments. When the boys return to school in September they will be helpful to the teachers in the American Government classes.

During their week's stay in Indianapolis, the boys will attend courses in the functioning of the government, held mock-campaigns and elections. They elect a complete governing body.

Post 303 of the American Legion will sponsor the two Junior Boys that will represent Adams at Boys State. These boys are chosen by the teachers on the basis of their grades in History and Social Living. This year the two boys chosen to go are Paul Edgerton and Terry Rothermel. James Markom and Gleason Street are the alternates; should either Paul or Terry be unable to attend, one of these will take his place.

Each applicant had to write an essay on why he wanted to go to Europe and also a theme telling about his home, family, extra-curricular activities, and his average day at school.

The cost of this trip is \$435 not including spending money and traveling expenses. The American Field Service provides room and board for each student in the home of a family in a foreign country.

Joan's extra-curricular activities include Drama Club, Thespians, and Band. She is also on the Tower and Album staffs. Charmian is in Drama Club, Glee Club, Thespians, Student Council, is a reporter on the Tower staff, and a member of the Junior Progress Club. 

Whip Cavemen for 1st Conference Win

John Adams walloped Mishawaka 12-1 to win their fourth consecutive ball game and first conference tilt.

John Robbins and Tobe Sexson hurled for the Eagles and yielded only 6 hits. Robbins also led the hitting by banging out 3 hits, one of them a 2 run triple in the fourth inning. Staton, Klowner, Gibboney, Edgerton, and Green also connected safely.

Up to the end of the third inning, the score was knotted 1 to 1, but then the Eagles rocked the Cavemen for 4 runs in the fourth, 5 in the sixth, and 2 in the seventh.

Adams 6, St. Joe 1

Earlier in the week, the Eagle diamond crew dumped St. Joseph 6-1 behind the pitching of Fal Harris and Don Severeid.

Dick Green and Dick Gibboney proved a great help in the Eagles' third straight win of the season, by blasting triples. Two of the three wins are over the Indians.

Adams scored their 6 runs on 9 hits while the Indians were held to 1 run on 5 hits. St. Joseph's lone run was scored in the seventh inning of the game.

The Eagles will play their third league game against Washington at Washington tonight.

Trackmen Drop 2; Run Last at Goshen

Last week the Adams track team lost two dual meets along with finishing last in the Goshen Relays.

On rainswept School Field, the Eagles collected only one first in 13 events as they were downed by Mishawaka, 81½ to 27½, last Tuesday. Tom Troeger was the only Adams winner when he won the broad jump with a leap of 19' 11".

Two days later the team traveled to Michigan City where they were defeated by the Red Devils, 79½ to 9½. Larry Van Dusen collected one of the Adams firsts. Larry won the 440, he also placed third in the 100-yard dash. Gene Personett tied for first in the high jump for the Eagles only other first.

Gary Roosevelt topped a field of 17 as they won the Class A division of the Goshen Relays, Saturday. Nappanee won the Class B championship. Adams failed to score but came close several times. Jim Sostack won his qualifying heat of the high hurdles in the morning, but placed fifth in the finals leaving him out of the money. (In each event they give points for the first four places.) Tom Troeger qualified for the broad jump in the morning, but failed to place in the afternoon. The Eagles also had three relay teams which finished fifth out of the five different relays run. Eight teams competed in each relay.



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Track Trials Tonight

Tonight at Mishawaka the track Conference Trials are being held. The Eagles will be trying to better their last place showing in last year's meet. Central won the meet last year.
