To Bury Hague's Widow Here



The funeral of Mrs. Jennie Warner Hague, widow of former Mayor Frank Hague of Jersey City, will be held tomorrow from the Plaza Funeral Home, 40 W. 58th St., New York. A solemn high requiem mass will be offered at 10 a.m. in Our Lady's Chapel of St. Patrick's Cathedral.

Mrs. Hague, 81, died yesterday in her home at 480 Park Ave., New York, where she had resided with her son, former Judge Frank Hague Jr., since the death of her husband on Jan. 1, 1956.

MRS. HAGUE will be entombed beside her husband in the family vault in Holy Name Cemetery, Jersey City.

James A. McLaughlin, Jersey City funeral director, is in charge of arrangements.

Jennie Warner married Frank Hague on April 15, 1903, when he was 27 and on the threshold of his ascent to fame in city, state and national politics.

Economy Rise Seen In Offing If Jersey City Taxes Are Low

The economy of the Jersey City area is expected to rise in the coming year—if taxes can be held down.

This was the prediction today of Thomas N. Stainback, president and chief executive officer of the Jersey City Chamber of Commerce.

Stainback analyzed the results of a survey of some 60 firms of various sizes and types queried by the chamber last week. He said this was what the survey found:

NEARLY 60 per cent of the firms see business improving; 33 per cent see it remaining the same and only 9 per cent anticipate a decline.

Service and wholesale firms see an overall increase.

Retail businesses expect to hold their own, with slight indications towards improvement.

Most firms expect greater competition in sales.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy, in a friendly but firm mood about U.S. nuclear weapons policy, prepared to meet British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan in the Bahamas today for what could be the most delicate in their series of six conferences.

The Chief Executive was scheduled to take off for Nassau, where for two days he and Macmillan will tackle a broad range of mutual problems ranging from the Skybolt missile to the Sino-Indian conflict.

Greets President

Macmillan arrived on New Providence Island from Great Britain Monday night. He arranged to greet Kennedy at the airport. After brief arrival remarks, they were to motor together about eight miles to the western tip of the island and go to separate residences at the exclusive Lyford Cay Club.

Shore Killer Of 4 Cites God's Order

LAKEWOOD (UPI)—A chicken farmer described by neighbors as "the most sociable person in his family" told police Monday night he killed his parents and brother and sister with a crowbar "because God told me to."

"God had told me to do it because my family is bad," police quoted Gabriel Richard Trifari, 30, who was arrested after he led police to his isolated farm home in nearby Howell Township, Monmouth County.

Police Find Bodies

In the neat, comfortably furnished white-frame farmhouse police found the badly beaten bodies of his mother, Marie, 60, and his sister, Olga, 36. In a workshed where the family repaired pocket-books for department stores across the nation, they found the beaten body of his father, Maxim, 65.

In a chicken coop they found the blood-splattered, beaten body of his brother, Maxim Jr., 31.

Trifari told police he killed each of them with one blow with a crowbar Monday morning. He then "walked around and prayed" for eight or nine hours.

Took Eggs

In the afternoon he took a couple of dozen eggs and walked four miles into Lakewood from the farm at 53 Ford Road, Howell Township.

Not Russia

JFK Says China Greatest Threat to Peace

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy said last night that Red China, not Russia, is this decade's greatest threat to world peace.

The President said "we would be far worse off—the world would be—if the Chinese dominated the Communist movement."

Kennedy made the statement in an unusual radio and television interview covering his first two years as President, which he said had given him "great satisfaction."

THE INTERVIEW RANGED over a wide number of subjects, both domestic and international, but Kennedy's emphasis showed his concern with world affairs.

Kennedy said "I don't think there is a need" for a meeting between him and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev now, and "I think he probably feels the same way." Because of Cuba, "it is going to be some time before it is possible for us to come to any way." Because of Cuba, "It

is going to be some time before it is possible for us to come to any real understandings with Mr. Khrushchev."

Without minimizing the danger of Russia's goal of world Communism, Kennedy said "we are better off with the Khrushchev view than we are with the Chinese Communist view, quite obviously."

"But Mr. Khrushchev does not wish us well, unfortunately," he added.

Summonses Can't Budge Sit-In Trio

EDGEWATER (UPI) — Despite trespassing summonses served on three sit-in demonstrators, the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE) is continuing its fight to establish a Negro family in this all-white community.

CORE has been staging a sit-in at an eight-family apartment house at 2 Dempsey Ave. since last Friday when Negro auto mechanic Charles David, 32, of 188 2nd St., Englewood, was refused an apartment.

Argentine Pony Who Speaks Spanish In Bob Kennedy's Family?

CLIFTON, N.J. (UPI)—A pony arrived from Argentina Monday for the seven children of Atty. Gen. and Mrs. Robert F. Kennedy.

The 30 inch, 100-pound pony arrived at Idlewild Airport and was brought at once to the government quarantine station here. It was to be kept here about 48 hours and then will be on its way to Washington, in plenty of time for Christmas.

Senator Predicts

Sees Southerners Choosing Kennedy Over Rockefeller

WASHINGTON (ANS) — Sen. John J. Sparkman, of Alabama, Democratic nominee for Vice President in 1952, predicts his party's Presidential ticket will do better in the South in 1964 than it did in 1960.

He is confident the Republican nominee for president will be Gov. Nelson Rockefeller, of New York.

"THE SOUTH just won't go for Governor Rockefeller," Sparkman said in an interview.

"Sure, a lot of Southern Demo-

crats give President Kennedy 'down the country.' They don't like this, they don't like that about what he does. I didn't like his executive order against discrimination in federal housing myself, and I've said so.

"But I think most Southerners will take President Kennedy over Governor Rockefeller. On the whole, Kennedy is probably more conservative. And Rockefeller is stronger on racial integration. The South might not be very enthusiastic over either one, but of the two it would prefer Kennedy."

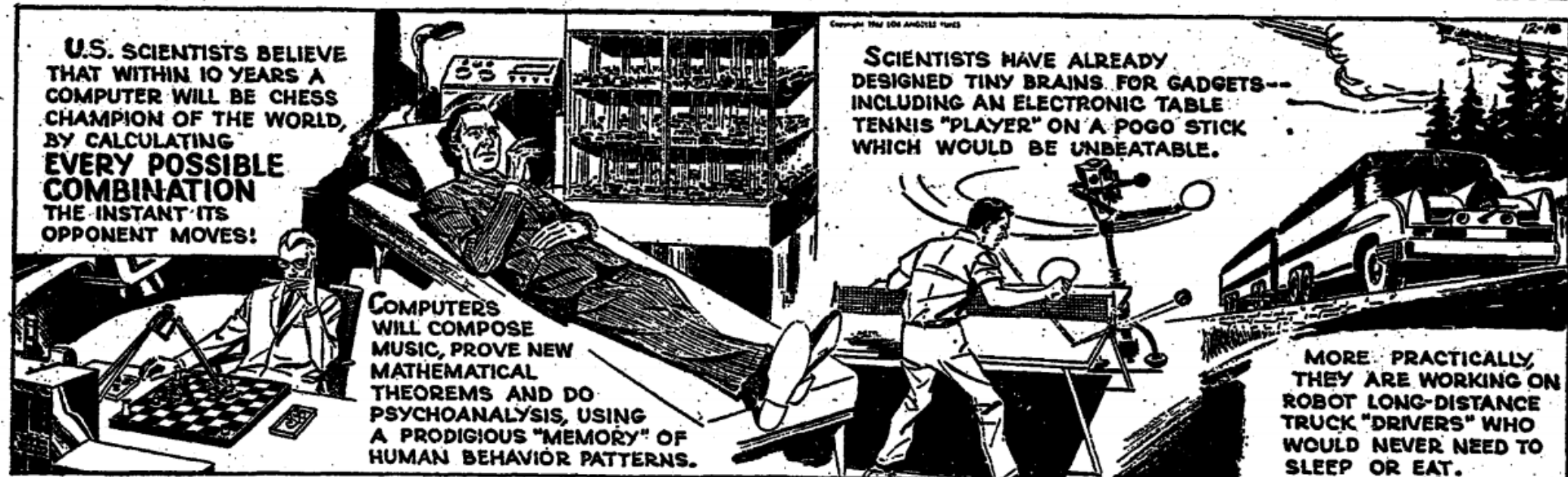

Giant coach Allie Sherman is more concerned with the condition of Tittle's understudy, Ralph Guglielmi. "Goog" twisted his knee against Dallas Sunday, on a series of plays that followed Tittle's injury.

Retтино Switches Allegiance: He's a Packer Now

The Green Bay Packers picked up another fan yesterday when they signed Jersey City's Lou Retтино and coach Vince Lombardi hopes the rugged Villanova fullback will develop into a top-flight professional linebacker.

Retтино was the eighth draft choice of the National Football League champions. He also was drafted by the New York Titans of the American Football League and discussed a contract with the Hamilton Tiger-cats of the Canadian Football League.

'YOU DON'T TURN down a chance to play with the best football team in the world," the former All-Countyite from St. Peter's Prep said after signing a contract for a modest bonus and "a very respectable salary."

Lou will attend the Giant-Packers NFL championship game at Yankee Stadium on Dec. 30 as guest of the Green Bay management. He'll be rooting hard for the defending champs. He previously had planned to take in the action on his own and root for the Giants.

"I would like to have played in New York but with the Giants," he revealed. "The Titans asked me to wait until after the team was sold before I made up my mind. But I feel there is more security with Green Bay."

RETTINO, Villanova's leading ground gainer this season with an average of 4.3 yards a carry, cumulated 1,020 yards in three seasons of varsity ball at Villanova. He was the third leading ground gainer in last week's Liberty Bowl game behind Oregon State All-American

Terry Baker and teammate Billy Joe.

Lou, who turned 21 last week, will get his first taste of pro football on Jan. 6 at Baltimore when he plays in an all-star game for NFL draft choices. He'll play for the Western Division.

"I'll report for practice in July," Lou said, "but if the Packers beat the Giants, I'll probably have to report a week or two early. That's because the league champion plays the College All-Stars and we'll need an earlier start than the other clubs."

LOMBARDI plans to use Retтино as a corner linebacker and Lou feels this is a break for him. "If there was any position on the Green Bay team where I would have a chance, it's linebacker. They lost to Detroit because their linebackers were hurt and they had no adequate replacements."

Both Packer corner linebackers this season — Bill Forrester and Dan Currie — were selected on the all-league team. "But Forrester is 33 years old," Retтино points out. "All I have to

do is work hard and be patient."

VILLANOVA coach Alex Bell feels that Lou has a better future as a linebacker than as a fullback. "He was great at both positions for us," Bell said last night, "but he was just a little bit better on defense. I think a lot of opposing coaches feel the same way."

Retтино is 6 foot 1 and weighs 230 pounds. He is a cousin of Pittsburgh Steeler lineman Lou Cordileone. He is a psychology major at Villanova and is mentioned on the dean's list in three of the past six semesters.
