Goal: Revitalized Jersey City Guarini Will Run Campaign for CCC

The Jersey City Community Charter Council will conduct a "separate and vigorous" campaign on behalf of its city council candidates with Frank Guarini Jr., as campaign manager.

Guarini, president of the CCC, announced today the organization which brought a change of government to Jersey City "will maintain its identity as an independent group."

The CCC's endorsement of Commissioner Berry for mayor and his counter-endorsement of the CCC candidates for councilmen still stand, Guarini emphasized.

The CCC, however, will wage its own campaign, with its own funds, "to place into office competent, civic minded individuals who will preserve the best interests of our city."

"THE GOALS of the candidates will be for a progressive and revitalized Jersey City—this is a crusade for a change," the CCC leader said.

The CCC is running a full slate of candidates for the nine seats

Lafayette Fire Routs 3 Families

Fireman, Boy Are Injured in Two-Alarmer

Three Jersey City families were routed from their homes today by a two-alarm blaze in four dwellings on Woodward Street. A fireman and a boy were injured.

Firemen said the fire, caused by careless smoking, resulted in an estimated \$6,600 damage to the two-story frame structures at 96, 98, 100 Woodward St.

THE BLAZE started in the top floor bedroom of the home at 98 Woodward St. occupied by the family of Roosevelt Moody, firemen said. B. M. Moody, 4, suffered second degree burns of the right arm.

Also treated was Fireman Edward Dawson of Engine 20. He suffered foreign matter in both eyes.

Fireman said the flames spread from 98 to 96, owned and occupied by M. Lemchek, and to the vacant dwelling at 102.

Damage was placed at \$3,000 to 98; \$1,800 to 96; \$1,300 to 100 and \$500 to 102. Firemen were at the scene about four hours.

Parolee Awaits Hearing In Bold Daylight Holdup

A gun-waving convict, nabbed minutes after he reportedly held up a five and ten cent store and led police on a wild chase through lines of school children, will face three charges Monday when he is arraigned in Jersey City Municipal Court.

Held without bail is 27-year-old Charles Bergansky of New York, who police said is on parole from Dannemora Prison after serving seven years of a 15-year sentence for New York burglaries.

BERGANSKY, WHO commandeered a car at gunpoint in a futile attempt at a getaway, faces charges of kidnapping, armed robbery and possession of a dangerous weapon.

The holdup at McCrory's Five and Ten Store, 769 Bergen Ave., netted Bergansky \$153. The parolee told them he needed the money to pay off some bills, police said.

As detectives reconstructed the incident, Bergansky pulled a .45 caliber automatic on a 16-year-old cashier at the McCrory store and forced her to give him the contents of a cash box. He then fled.

THE MANAGER, Thomas Sloan 40, notified Patrolman Martin Collins, who was on traffic duty at a nearby intersection. Then the chase began.

The suspect, with gun in hand, bolted through lines of students who were dismissed from St. Aedan's parochial school.

Honeymoon Ended for Kennedy

WASHINGTON (UPI)—John F. Kennedy's string of charmed victories has ended. For the lack of a single vote, he has tasted the bitter defeat that sooner or later touches every president.

Kennedy's shaky honeymoon with the Democratic-controlled but sharply divided Congress ended last night just 61 days after he took office. Defeat of his \$1.25 minimum wage bill and passage of a \$1.15 measure by the House chopped off a list of narrowly won tests that started with his election last November.

Ironically, but perhaps not surprisingly, Kennedy's first defeat as president came on the same issue that provided his last lost battle as a senator.

But as he did when the same Republican-Southern Democratic coalition whipped him last summer on minimum wages, Kennedy was expected to fight back.

His Senate supporters pledged to pass Kennedy's bill and then put the pressure on the House to accept a compromise that would be close to the President's request.

There is no doubt that when a man loses his faith and his morals, he falls into the pit of cynicism, and when a man begins to possess his soul, he feels an exhilaration of heart.

Everyone knows Thomas the Doubter. He was certainly a sceptic, but he was also lugubrious and sad. As a boy Thomas must always have expected that it would rain the day of the picnic; he must have loved dark days, rainy nights and black moods. He must have been a man very close to the earth, not in the sense of being practical, but because the material, the physical, the tangible, the earthy alone could give him some assurance of spiritual truths. This being so, it is very likely that his moodiness and sadness and melancholy were the cause of his doubts.

"We worked on a few patterns and set up our plays and the hour workout did the trick."

No gymnasiums are available for teams in the ESCIT. Practice isn't prohibited so Halligan went on a search and located an empty school yard near Middletown. During the workout, Halligan stressed offensive maneuvers for Jim Barry and Wayne McGuirt.

The short stint on the cold and windy concrete playground proved a blessing in disguise, for once the game opened St. Peter's was rarin' to go. The Prepsters jumped to a quick lead, held it until the final two minutes and closed out the game with a flourish.

AS A RESULT of the triumph, St. Peter's will now meet All Hallows of New York City, which posted a 72-52 win over Archbishop Molloy, in the title game tonight.

Without some hustling and sparkling play by Barry and McGuirt, St. Peter's could not have reached tonight's final. Barry, performing at the peak of his ability, was held to without a field goal in the last quarter. But the tall 6 foot 5 operator connected for 9 of 10 foul shots in those last eight minutes to ice the win.

"We couldn't have done it without Barry or McGuirt," Halligan shouted amid the handshakes of 100 Prep rooters who made the long journey to see the game.

"EVERYTHING we did was perfect. Barry was just tremendous under the boards and a three-point play by McGuirt in the waning two minutes enabled us to pull ahead for good."

The driving layup by McGuirt on an assist from Brian Sheeran enabled St. Peter's to overcome Trenton Catholic's only edge in the game. The Wave, coached by the Rev. Clarence O'Shea, pulled ahead for the first time of the night, 45-4, on two foul shots by Al Tezsla. Then, McGuirt's driving layup put St. Peter's back in the van.

The brilliant play of Barry, who has been the outstanding player of the tourney, was instrumental in Prep's success during the early and late going. The crew-cut senior was tied for high scoring honors of the day with Billy Lawrence of Molloy with 21 points apiece.

THE HIGH GAME total marked the second consecutive day that Barry has led or has been tied with in scoring. In addition to his offensive output, Barry collared 19 rebounds.

Despite the loss of Nicoletti, St. Peter's proved too tough for the Wave from Trenton. Hustle, desire and savvy on the part of juniors Sheeran, Greg Hochstein and Stu McGregor made up for the loss of Prep's leading scorer.

Now the sky is the limit for Halligan's hustling Maroon Marauders. Dick King's All Hallows cagers boast a tremendous height advantage over St. Peter's and are favored.

New Stadium Gets Go-Ahead

They'll be breaking ground any day now for that new ball park at Flushing Meadow.

The way was cleared for the go ahead yesterday when the State Senate unanimously voted approval of a bill giving New York City the power to spend \$18 million for the new stadium.

Only formal approval of a lease between the city and the baseball club, agreed on in principle previously, remains to be drawn up. Under its terms, the club will pay a rental of \$450,000 the first year and \$22,000 less each year until reaching a minimum of \$300,000. The lease will run for 30 years with an option to renew for another 10 years. The power of rental for other sports and functions will remain with the city.

While the Senate was passing the bill, approved a week ago by the Assembly, George Weiss, president of New York's new National League baseball club, said he had been assured the new park will be ready by opening day 1962 when the team will pay its first game.

NCAA Final

It's Ohio State vs. Cincinnati Tonight

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI) — Defending national champion Ohio State, riding the crest of a 32-game winning streak, meets mighty Cincinnati tonight for the 1961 NCAA basketball title.

Ohio State advanced with a 95-69 win over St. Joseph's of Philadelphia, Pa. and Cincinnati walloped Utah 82-67 in last night's semi-finals.

OHIO STATE coach Fred Taylor attributed his team's latest victory to a fast break offense, a strong second half defense, and *Jerry Lucas*.

"Jerry had a wonderful night," Taylor said. "He seems to be back in form as a foul shooter. He seemed to be under par last

week. Statistics showed he made ten of 11 shots from the field which must be his best night of the season."

Lucas scored 29 points, but three Ohio State teammates joined him in double figures as the Big Ten conference champions sank 63.3 per cent from the field.

LARRY SIEGFRIED had 21 points, Melvin Nowell 15, and John Havlicek 11 for the Buckeyes.

The best point producer for St. Joseph's, and the only Pennsylvanian who hit any consistency, was 6-8 center Vincent Kempton who had 18 points. Jersey City's Frank Majewski had 13 points.

St. Joseph's started off fast,

grabbing a 5-0 lead in the first three minutes and 46 seconds of play. But then Lucas went to work and scored five points in the next 72 seconds. Nowell hit a jump shot from the side and Ohio State was sailing toward its 27th win of the season and its 32nd in a row — dating back through the 1959-60 campaign.

Cincinnati was behind twice in its game with Utah, 2-0 and 8-6, but caught up on two free throws by Bob Wiesenbahn and went ahead on a corner shot by Carl Couidin with 15:35 remaining in the half.

The Bearcats enjoyed a 35-20 advantage at the intermission, and the closest came in the second half with 10 points.

Political Letter Writers

This is the season of the year at which we could fill this page with political letters to the editor. But we don't.

Enthusiasts fill sheets of paper with praise for a particular candidate. Others spend as much space excoriating opposition candidates. Newspapers in general, if they use such letters at this time of the year, generally call a moratorium on them during the weeks preceding election day. And nobody is happier about that than the winning candidate who otherwise might be greeted at inauguration by an enthusiast waving a press clipping and shouting: "See! I put you over!"

Coast-to-Coast GOP

Sometimes we get the feeling that the campaign to win the Republican nomination for Jim Mitchell is a little too pat. Some of the maneuvers are of the kind a big time city fellow might use to show the country boys in Jersey how things are done.

That battle against a straw-man issue on seeing the voter lists in Hudson County was one such item. It was needless. It seemed designed to exploit Hudson's unhappy heritage from the old days when election matters often were strictly custom tailored to fit the orders from "the powerhouse."

The flight to California to have dinner with General Eisenhower looked a bit hollow, too. Jim and Ike are old friends and teammates. Their having dinner together is a most natural expectation. It is not implausible even that Jim would make a transcontinental round trip for the pleasure. But when it is done in the middle of a campaign and not kept secret, the casual observer must wonder a little.

Is it intended to imply that Ike will campaign here only if Jim is the Republican candidate for governor? That would be hard to accept; New Jersey is too much a test ground for the Republican Party this year.
