# Nicoletti Standout For Prep

### Victors Take First Place

For nine months in 1961 his brilliant basketball career was in jeopardy. The St. Peter's Prep senior didn't even touch a basketball as he lay in bed suffering from mononucleosis.

Last night at the Prep gym before an SRO crowd of 1,200, the recuperated Nicoletti demonstrated the savvy, hustle and scoring that made him one of the top players last season as he lead coach Jerry Halligan's Marauders to a convincing 54-43 win over Lincoln. The victory gave St. Peter's undisputed possession of first place in the Southern Division of the Hudson County Basketball League.

IN WINNING, St. Peter's upped its league decord to 5-0 and remained the lone Hudson County five that is unbeaten in regular season play. The loss left Lincoln in second place with its only defeat in five loop games.

# St. Peter's Roars: 'Hands off Finkel'

St. Peter's College coach Don Kennedy yesterday issued a "hands off" warning to any and all colleges interested in "stealing" the services of the Peacocks' 6 foot 10, scholastically Frank Nicoletti is courageous. ineligible center Henry Finkel.

"I've heard from some pretty reliable sources that several colleges, including one in the Metropolitan area, have made offers to Finkel," Kennedy revealed at a weekly meeting of the Metropolitan Basketball Writers Association.

'THIS BOTHERS me," the Peacock coach went on. "In the first place, Henry is a matri-

culated student at St. Peter's College and he has an athletic scholarship that includes books, titution and fees. Therefore, no other school can legally give him a scholarship."

Kennedy wouldn't name the schools involved in the "tamparing," but said he was seriously thinking of sending them telegrams, warning them to keep "hands off," And if Finkel happened to show up on the campus of a college other than St. Peter's, Kennedy said he would demand a complete investigation by the National College Athletic Association.

Finkel is a graduate of Holy Family in Union City and was one of the leading players on

last season's Peacock freshman team. However, he failed two subjects and was suspended by the St. Peter's Dean, Rev. Leo McLaughlin, S. J.

FATHER McLAUGHLIN stipulated that he would lift the suspension if Finkel would make up the subjects at one of the city colleges in New York. He also required that Henry be employed during that period. He is currently working as a laborer and Kennedy hopes he'll enter the Hunter College night school this coming semester.

Finkel wasn't the only Peacock yearling to be so affected. George Kennedy, second oldest son of the Peacock tutor, is also under a one-year suspension and is currently at Hunter.

"This happened to us once before," Kennedy said. "We lost a fine freshman propsect to a southern school. I just hope it doesn't happen again.

'TM SURPRISED, that with all the basketball scandals of late, that any school would even dare think of tampering with athletes from another school."

Kennedy added that Finkel has been in serious financial need since the death of his father this past winter. "But I can't see how any out-of-town school can help him here . . . unless they break some NCAA rule."

# Ohio State. Lucas Keep Rollin' Along

Lucas outscored Dischinger, 32

With a healthy Nicoletti and an equally impressive Brian Sheeran, St. Peter's seems headed for another county championship. Nicoletti, the key to the Prep attack, exhibited his finest performance of the season as he dominated the scoring with 22 points while snaring an equal number of rebounds.

Yet it still took a masterful strategist like Halligan to plot the Prep defense against the frolicking Lincoln Lions, who were handed their first loss in nine games. With a harassing 2-1-2 zone and an equally effective man-to-man defense, St. Peter's forced Lincoln into numerous fundamental errors and bad shots.

Diminutive Brian Sheeran, who with his passes was as nimble as a leprechaun, was the lad who controlled Lincoln's talented Harry Laurie. Laurie, a stalwart of the Lion attack, was held to 11 points and connected on but four of 15 attempts from the floor. Laurie and the rest of his teammates, in fact, just couldn't get set against Prep's changing defenses. The Lion regulars netted but 14 of 57 goals for 24 per cent while St. Peter's was redhot, waxing hot for 60 per cent on 31 of 52 attempts.

In displaying their finest offensive performance of the season, the Prepsters received overall team play from all five starters. Nicoletti stood out above the rest while Sheeran with seven assists smartly directed the attack. Greg Hochstein and Stu McGregor combined their rebounding talents that enabled St. Peter's to enjoy a 53-39 edge off the boards.

ST. PETER'S took the lead at the outset and never was headed. A pair of baskets by Hochstein bolted the Prepsters from a 4-2 lead in an 8-2 advantage. Thereafter Lincoln was faced with a comeback effort that never materialized.

Trailing by seven at halftime, John Ryan's Lions never were to bring the margin any closer. Three baskets by Nicoletti and a pair of drives by McGregor off Sheeran passes powered Prep to its largest lead of the night, 53-34, before both benches sent in their shock troops in the final two minutes.

But the damage was done. There seemed to be a little too much Nicoletti and defense as far as Lincoln was concerned.
