Construction of Greenville's longdelayed Public School 40 should be under way by the first week in May, the Jersey City Board of Edudation has announced.

The last piece of property on the site has been purchased and the board is moving to advertise for bids on six contracts.

THE BIDS on the project, for which a \$3,292,000 bond issue has been raised, are to be returned by April 24 and contracts will be awarded April 27.

The school is to be finished by July, 1962, and ready for the fall term opening

The building and playground will occupy the entire block by Gates, Garfield, Seaview and Ocean Aves.

ALL BUT THREE buildings on the block were demotished last December, but the board could not move on construction until all legal difficulities had been settled on the remaining three parcels.

Nearby public and parochial schools have been filled beyond capacity for some time and have scheduled many part-time classes. The completion of Currie's Woods Housing Project added to the pu-

The new school will have 36 classrooms for 1,180 students, A 600-seat auditorium and a swimming pool are also in the plans.

New York To London In 2 Hours?

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy has asked for federal aid in developing a supersonic airliner that could whisk passengers from New York to London in about two hours.

The President's request was almost overlooked. It was contained in his budget messageof March 24 — a one-line item asking that the Federal Aviation Agency be given an extra 12 million for fiscal 1962.

Of that sum, \$10 million is earmarked for preliminary worj on a supersonic Mach 3 transport a plane capable of flying three times the speed of sound.

Frank Runs Any Distance Well

Koch Bright Hope for Olympics



In spring a young man's fancy lightly turns to love . . love of track that is.

Frank Koch, a senior at 3t. Peter's Prep, combines a steady diet of running and winning medals that have quite a few track experts predicting he will be a future Olympic great.

A. RESIDENT OF Paterson, Koch is a great fan of Dave Sime of Fair Lawn who was an Olympic team member. Both have many qualities in common. Koch, during the indoor season, is most versatile. "Ffank is money in the bank," coach Don Williamson admits. "He is equally effective in any event you place him in. He already has raced and won for me in the 60, 300, quarter mile, 600 and half mile. But Frank is primarily a sprinter."

Koch, with an explosive, fantastic start, usually leads at the first turn. In the outdoor season, Frank will be placed in the 100 and 220 by Williamson. "We know we have 10 points before he even races," Williamson says.

THE CARROT-TOPPED youngster has a host of medals and records to his credit. His 33 seconds in the 300 yard run established a New Jersey Catholic record. A time of 1:14.6 in the Cardinal Hayes meet set a New Jersey as well as meet mark in the 600 yard run. And Frank's 51.3 time in the St. Francis meet in the quarter mile also set another standard.

Frank's track career almost came to an abrupt end when he was injured last season. He didn't compete in indoor meets at all last season and made his presence on the cinders late in the outdoor season.

"I thought Jack Uphaus of my team from last year was terrific," Williamson continues. 'But Koch already has broken all but on of Uphaus' marks and seems certain to do topple Jack's outdoor mark in the quarter mile."

BECAUSE OF HIS small size, Frank would be a tremendous man for any college mile relay team. His agility and diminutive size enable him to navigate the turns on bank tracks.

When you talk about Koch you can't forget his academic standings in St. Peter's. Frank ranks fourth in his senior class of 250. His college future just about is set with Notre Dame, Georgetown

and Holy Cross vieing for his scholastic and athletic talents.

The coming months will bear much watching for Koch. He will be attempting to lead the St. Peter's mile relay team to the national championships in the Penn Relays. "And we're going to rely very heavily on Frank," Williamson smiled.
