Full coverage of St. Joseph's (Mont.) nail-biting victory over St. Peter's Prep

JERSEY CITY- On Friday night, we had a primetime showdown between No. 4 St. Joseph (Mont.) and No. 8 St. Peter's Prep in the Non-Public, Group 4 semifinals.

In the end, though, the Green Knights got the job done and earned a trip to the sectional final at MetLife Stadium.

On Friday night, St. Joseph (Mont.) put forth an unforgettable performance, highlighted by the play of Brian Kearns, taking down defending champion St. Peter's Prep 37-27 in the NJSIAA/SportsCare Institute Non-Public, Group 4 semifinals.



This one came down to the wire, with both teams putting up incredible plays to help their team. The play of the night, however, came with 1:48 left in regulation. With the Green Knights clinging to a 30-27 lead, they faced 4th-and-9 at the Marauders' 33-yard line.

Instead of punting, or running the ball, St. Joseph went for it and boy did that decision pay off. Quarterback Nick Patti, who was nearly sacked, heaved a desperation ball deep downfield, which receiver Joe Neglia grabbed out of nowhere for a score.

The huge touchdown put the Green Knights up 37-27 and there was no late magic for the Marauders, who saw their season come to an end.

Prior to that touchdown connection from Patti to Neglia, the Marauders closed the gap, making things 30-27 with 7:50 on the clock, following a four-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Johnathan Lewis to Boston College wide receiver commit KJ Gray.

Those gigantic plays from the Green Knights and Marauders were only a pair of big ones made on the night.

With 2:08 remaining in the third quarter, St. Joseph junior Marc Doran made an incredible play, flying into the backfield and blocking a Lewis punt. The ball then flew out of the end zone for a safety, giving the Green Knights a 16-14 advantage.



Then, after St. Peter's Prep couldn't respond, Kearns showcased some blazing speed. After receiving a handoff from quarterback Nick Patti, Kearns flew down the sideline for an 83-yard touchdown run.

Following the PAT, St. Joseph (Mont.) took a 23-13 lead and all the momentum went its way.

The Marauders refused to back down, though. With 11:03 remaining in the fourth quarter, quarterback Johnathan Lewis hit wide receiver

Jorge Portorreal for a 30-yard touchdown, cutting the Marauders' deficit to 23-20.

However, with 9:25 on the clock, Austin Triglia scored on a 12-yard touchdown run, giving the Green Knights a 30-20 advantage. That touchdown run was set up by a 40-yard run by Kearns.

On the night, Kearns was electric, rushing 15 times for 238 yards and two touchdowns. Kearns averaged nearly 16 yards per carry.

In the first half, the Green Knights scored the first two touchdowns of the game. Running back Austin Triglia opened the scoring with an eight-yard rush late in the first quarter, while Kearns made things 14-0 with a 62-yard run with 10:02 left in the second. Triglia finished the night with 24 carries for 127 yards and two touchdowns.

St. Peter's Prep quickly answered, though, with a 49-yard touchdown run by Lewis with 9:07 to go in the first half. Then, with 48.8 seconds remaining in the second quarter, Lewis hit Gray for a 25-yard touchdown to even things up at 14-14. That was the score entering halftime.

Lewis, a junior, completed 23 passes for 292 yards and three touchdowns. He also added the rushing score. Gray hauled in seven receptions for 118 yards and two scores. Kolton Huber wrapped up his brilliant career with seven receptions for 64 yards.

With the gritty win, No. 4 St. Joseph will now face the winner of Don Bosco Prep/Bergen Catholic for the championship. Those two teams will be playing at 7 p.m. on Saturday night.

Farewell to some Hudson stars:

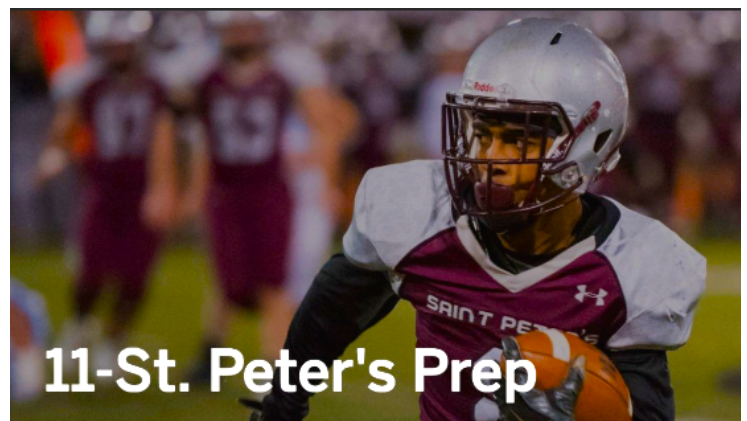
