

St. John Bosco's 56-14 victory over No. 6 St. Peter's Prep

It wasn't meant to be for the Marauders on Saturday night.

Despite hanging tough with one of the top teams in the country for a half, St. Peter's Prep saw its season record fall to 2-2 following a 56-14 loss to St. John Bosco of Bellflower, Calif.

Early on in the third quarter, it looked like we had a ball game between national powerhouse St. John Bosco (Bellflower, Calif.) and state ranked-No. 6 St. Peter's Prep.

With 9:39 remaining in the third, a four-yard rushing touchdown by Marauders' quarterback Johnathan Lewis cut St. Peter's Prep's deficit to 21-14. With that score, the team from Jersey City was high on energy, and looked ready to make a charge.

However, moments later, Braves' star running back Sean McGrew broke up the middle for an 80-yard touchdown run to quickly put St. John Bosco back up 14, 28-14. That score led to 28 unanswered points by St. John Bosco to close the third quarter, leading the visiting team to a 56-14 victory over the Marauders.

McGrew, who is ranked four stars and committed to the University of Washington, showcased why he's such a highly touted recruit on Saturday night. The future Husky finished the night with more than 250 total vards and three touchdowns.

The 5-9, 192-pound back scored on rushes of 80 and four yards, and added a 61-yard TD reception in the third to put the Braves up 35-14.

St. John Bosco quarterback Quentin Davis also had himself a strong showing, throwing for 325 yards and three touchdowns. Davis threw touchdown passes to McGrew, Berkeley Holmon and Ansalem Umeh.

As for St. Peter's Prep, wide receiver KJ Gray got the Marauders on the board with less than a minute to go in the first quarter. On that play, Gray caught a short pass from Lewis, shook off a defender and sprinted his way down the sideline for a 68-yard touchdown. Running back Sa'id Boykin finished the night with 90 yards, highlighted by a 60-yard run in the second half.

With the loss, the Marauders are now 2-2 on the season. St. John Bosco is a perfect 5-0 on the year.

Player of the Game: There's no question the game ball belongs to St. John Bosco running back Sean McGrew. The 5-9, 190-pounder had himself one heck of a ball game, scoring three touchdowns. McGrew rushed for two touchdowns, highlighted by an 80-yarder and added a 61-yard receiving touchdown.

On that play, McGrew caught a screen pass from Braves' QB Quentin Davis and bolted his way upfield for the score. The speedy senior is ranked four stars by Scout.com and is committed to the University of Washington.

Game-changing play: Again, McGrew gets the credit here. Early on in the third quarter, St. Peter's Prep cut its deficit to 21-14 following a four-yard touchdown run by quarterback Johnathan Lewis. Right before the end of the first half, the Marauders also made a big goal-line stand to keep Bosco out of the end zone.

The Marauders had all the momentum in the world. Hwoever, moments after Lewis's TD run, McGrew bursted up the middle for an 80-yard touchdown. After the game, St. Peter's Prep head coach Rich Hansen said that TD by McGrew really let some air out of the Marauders' tires. The team never responded after that run, and the Braves went on to score 28 additional unanswered points.

Prep showed heart: Despite the lopsided final score, St. Peter's Prep played with some passion on Saturday evening. They were right there with on of the top teams in the country in the second half, but the lack of depth and experience was showcased in the final 24 minutes of play.



In order for the Marauders to take down St. John Bosco,

they needed to play four quarters of football. Hansen said he felt like his team played a good 2.5 quarters, which wasn't good enough. St. Peter's Prep, now 3-2, will have a bye next week before entering league play.



Top Five Notre Dame Freshmen Brandon Wimbush

-Wimbush possesses all the tools. He has an NFL-caliber arm, impressive lateral cutting ability, and explosive straight-line speed. WImbush struggled in warm-ups a week ago but made a few tweaks in his release point. He threw the ball with much more spin and velocity. Powerful arm that can make all the throws. The in-game experience WImbush got is invaluable for the future. He was able to work through protections, movement-read progressions, and zone concepts in a live, yet low pressure, situation. WImbush was 3-of-5 passing for 17-yards, just missing on bombs to Will Fuller and Equanimeous St. Brown. Wimbush also found the endzone for the first time on a 58-yard run. He finished with 92 yards on four carries.

SOUTH BEND — Sheldon Day offered that quarterback Brandon Wimbush's flashy college debut didn't resemble anything the true freshman had ever accomplished in practice.

Not when Day was on the field anyway.

"He looked very explosive today," marveled the Notre Dame senior defensive tackle after Wimbush put the finishing touches on sixth-ranked ND's 62-27 rout of visiting UMass Saturday at Notre Dame Stadium.

Two of Wimbush's more explosive plays were stricken from the official play-by-play, a 50-yard pass to Will Fuller on his first attempt that was later reversed to an incompletion by the replay booth, and a 44-yard TD pass on third-and-22 to classmate Equanimeous St. Brown.

That was negated by an illegal-man-downfield penalty.

Still, Wimbush presided over two scoring drives, once he entered the game at the 8:00 mark of the third quarter with the Irish (4-0) leading 48-20. One of those culminated in a 58-yard run by himself. The other was a handoff to freshman Josh Adams, who raced 70 yards for another TD.

"Getting Brandon Wimbush in there, I thought, was very important, and we've wanted him to run the offense," said Irish coach Brian Kelly, his Irish 4-0 heading to No. 11 Clemson (3-0) next weekend. "That was very important to us."

"We really felt like trying to make sure that when he went in there, regardless of what the score was, we had to give him real game experiences and do the things that may happen in a game situation. He is our backup, and he has not played any football, and he's a true freshman."

Wimbush completed 3-of-5 passes for 17 yards on plays that did count and ran the ball four times for 92 yards.

"Brandon did some good things today and got a little out of his realm," Kelly said, "a little bit later with some misreads in our run game where he thought he was supposed to throw the ball out and he's supposed to actually run the football. But those were great learning experiences for him.

"As you can see, he's athletic. He can throw the ball deep."

Wimbush's biggest supporter appeared to be starting QB DeShone Kizer. The redshirt freshman, in his second collegiate start, threw for 207 yards and ran for 42 more with two TD passes and a seven-yard TD run before giving way to Wimbush.

"We knew the opportunity was going to eventually come to get him some playing time," Kizer said. "I spent a lot of time talking to him about, 'You're a five-star athlete coming out of high school. You have all the talent in the world. That stuff can translate over to the college field if you're comfortable in what you're doing.'

"He was very comfortable going out there. He was obviously put in a position where there wasn't too much pressure on and he balled out just like we expected."
