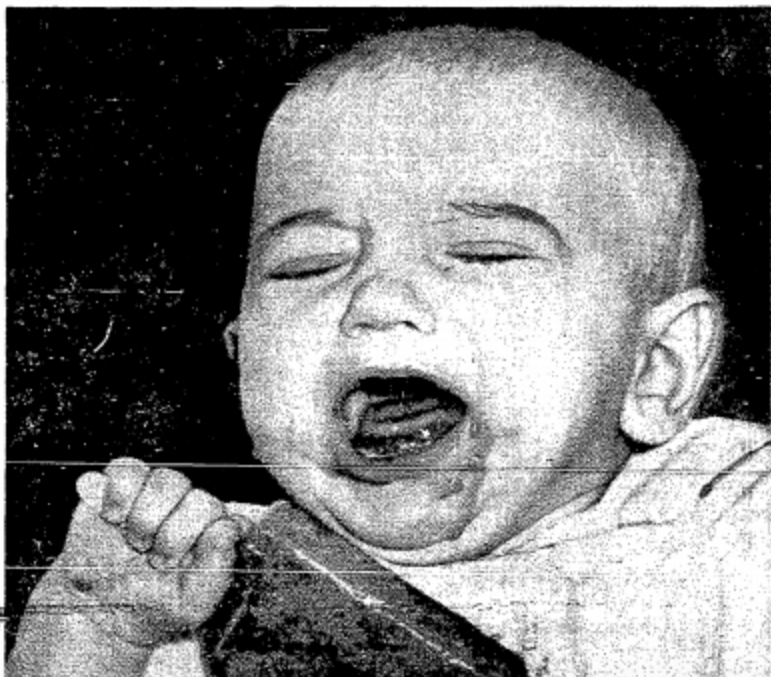

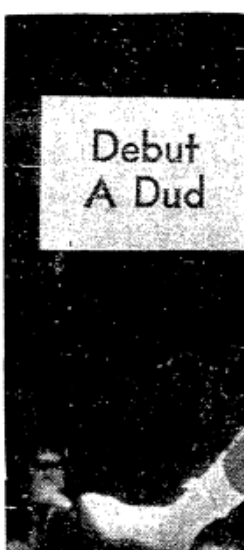
A red hot Pete DeLisa can only mean trouble for league leading Bayonne.

## **A Very Poor First Step!**

We cannot believe that Commissioner Berry's first step in the runoff for mayor of Jersey City is in the direction of victory.

His call to Mayor Witkowski for assistance is understandable; his assertion that his own victory is needed "to keep Jersey City racket free" is not.



**THE ASSERTION** in Jersey City that the other fellow's election would be a prelude to the arrival of gangsters is a song all of us have heard before — many times.

Frank Hague said it of John V. Kenny before the deluge of 1949 retired Hague permanently from power.

It was said again of Kenny in 1953 when he won reelection only to relinquish later the mayor's chair to Commissioner Berry, one of the younger men he had brought into public life.

In fact, it is one of the most over-worked and outworn of Jersey City political statements.

## **Are Our Boys Really Fit?**

President Kennedy's concern with the physical fitness of our nation, particularly our youth, is grounded in fact. The figures prove it.

This does not detract, however, from the excellence of certain individual showings in the annual Marine Corps Physical Fitness Meet.

While the individual showings of those competing yesterday were of high quality, the sad story is that less than half of all the young men in high school today are able even to qualify to compete. Since the tests consist of the calisthenics expected of a Marine recruit, it is easily seen that many of our potential fighting men will have to do some physical training before they even can become potential recruits. Small wonder the President is concerned.
