Third Try Makes Tom Mayor

An oft - disappointed Thomas Gargemi scored a decisive victory over Commissioner Berry in Jersey City's runoff election and will take office July 1 as the first mayor under the city's new strong mayor-council form of goverament.

Gangerni, who was defented parrowly in 1953 and in a contested election in 1950, swept into office carrying his three councilmen-ot-large candidates and four of his ward condidates with him.

THE VICTORY gives his side seven of the nine seats on the city council. Fred Martin in Bergon-Lafayette and Thomas Marasca in Helbon City were the opposition's winners.

The winning councilmen-at-large candidates are: Mrs. Evelyn Holender, James C. Rochford and John J. Kijewski.

Jack Kelaher won in the West Side Ward, Thomas Whelan in Journal Square and Thomas Flaherty in Greenville.

But it was Gangemi's day he carried the ball. Unofficial returns show that Gangemi rolled up 58,000 wors to Berry's 43,000 as he topped the ballot in all six wards. His whaleg margis was swelled in the Downtown Ward where he get 10,200 votes, nearby 6,500 more than Berry.

THE GREYING County Street visor had a more difficult time in the other wards, however. He won by less than 500 votes in West Side and by slightly more than 1,000 in Greenville. But he carried them all.

The tightest of the races, howover, were for coupoil in the Gressrville, Beigen-Lafsyette and West Side Wierts where fewer than 1,000 votes decided the issue.

Flaherty oked out a 400 vote win over Thomas McCareera in Greenville; Martin was by 500 over Dr. Paul Sincialr in Bergen-Lafayetts and a surgrising George Clett came within 800 votes of upending Kelahar in the West Side Ward.

Ben Jones, at 78; Trained **Kentucky Derby Winners**

Tributes from a saddened racing world were being received at Lexington, Ky. today following the death of Ben A. Jones, 78, who remained "Plain Ben" through the years in which he trained six Kentucky Derby winners.

Jones, who built Calumet Farm into racing's richest operation, died of a heart attack yesterday.

(Jimmy) Jones in 1953, suffered a Gail in 1952 for Calumet. heart attack at the farm last Saturday.

He was thought to be on the mend, and Jimmy, who had flown from Monmouth Park in New Jersey Saturday, returned east Monday. But another attack shortly after noon yesterday proved fatal.

Robert T. Goehrs, chairman of the Gulf AAU registration committee, set a hearing for next Monday at which the eight athletes can appear and defend themselves.

GOEHRS SAID he set the hearing for Monday so that if the Negroes were cleared, they could compete in the National AAU championships June 24-25 in New York.

Jersey City: Which Way?

Where Jersey City goes from here depends entirely upon 275,000 people—the people who live here. They have chosen Thomas Gangemi to be the first strong mayor under the new form of government but all he can do is point the way. Unless all the others are willing to help, Jersey City will not present a new and better face to the rest of the world.

WHICH DIRECTIONS can the new mayor take? Looking at it with cold practicality, he can offer the city little better than the Churchillian prescription of "sweat and tears." He inherits a residue of the more than 30 years of Frank Hague's era. And he inherits the penalties of four years of indecisive government at City Hall.

Anything less than "sweat and tears" is certain to be an expressway to disaster.

The tooting horns and the shouts of victory in the streets last night were elation of the moment.

Sooner or later Jersey City will awake to realize that unless heroic measures are taken, the tax rate will soar because too many of the economics of recent years were unreal. They were achieved by bookkeeping rather than by true savings. But there comes a time when bookkeeping no longer will serve; the books must be balanced with cash—from the taxpayers' and rentpayers' pockets.
