Leukemia Boy Is Home for Christmas

Little Johnny Golden, his pale face smiling as yesterday's snow dotted his bright red snowsuit, walked out of Memorial Hospital tightly clutching his mother's hand.

The four-year-old West New York youngster, hospitalized with acute leukemia last Wednesday, was allowed to come home for Christmas.

JOHNNY BROKE AWAY from his mother's grasp and picked up a handful of snow. He threw it as high as he could into the air and laughed out loud.

"I'm going home," he cried. "I'm going home."

The blond-haired, hazel-eyed boy who had been confined to a wheelchair rushed through the heavily-falling snow to his fa-

Roadblock Proved No Problem Suspects Saw FBI on Payoff

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Two earlier attempts to kidnap Frank Sinatra Jr. and the near-success of the crime were related today by a cellmate of one of the three suspected kidnapers.

"Once in Arizona, we just missed connections," John William Irwin, 42, was quoted by Robert Dale Howard, 27, Lakewood, Calif.

HOWARD, serving a six-month term for failure to support his family, was interviewed by a reporter for the San Diego Union, which carried the copy-righted story.

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Irwin also was quoted as telling Howard that the two younger suspects Barry Worthington Keenan and Joseph Clyde Amsler, both 23, spirited Sinatra Jr. through roadblocks in the Lake Tahoe area where the youth was kidnaped Dec. 8.

He said Sinatra was placed on the floor of the back seat and covered with a blanket while one of the two abductors hid in the trunk.

"HE SAID the other two told him they were stopped by a patrolman or a sheriff, but waved on when the officer saw only one man in the car," Howard said.

Frank Jr., 19, was held captive 54 hours and released after his father paid \$240,000 in ransom, nearly all of which has been recovered.

Irwin turned himself in to the FBI.

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Patriarchal, Papal Talk Uncertain

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — A major preliminary step toward ending the nine-century division of the Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox Churches appeared likely today with the projected meeting of Pope Paul VI and the Orthodox patriarch, although there were conflicting reports on whether the meeting was definitely set.

Spokesmen for both churches said there probably would be a meeting next month in the Holy Land between the Pope and Athenagoras I, who together lead about 683,000,000 Christians — more than two thirds of the world's total.

THE CONFRONTATION of the Roman Catholic Pontiff and Athenagoras would mark the first meeting of leaders of the two churches since the split in 1054 A.D.

New York's air gateway to the world, formerly known as Idlewild, opened its first full day of business today under its new name, the John F. Kennedy International Airport.

The renaming of the huge airport as a memorial to the late President was made official yesterday by Mayor Wagner, who signed into a law a name-changing bill passed last week by the City Council.

Dedication ceremonies will be held Tuesday.

WASHINGTON (ANS) — Former Senate majority secretary Robert G. (Bobby) Baker will give up his plush town house near Capitol Hill that has been occupied by his attractive ex-secretary, Nancy Carole Tyler.

A management official of River Park Mutual Homes, the cooperative development in which Baker's town house is located, confirmed yesterday that "the house will be up for sale."

BAKER, who resigned his \$19,600-a-year Senate Post under fire on Oct. 7, is the central figure in a Washington investigation of "conflicts of interest or other impropriety" on the part of present or former Senate employes.

He lives, with his wife and children, in a \$125,000 home in the exclusive Spring Valley section of Washington.

Baker bought the four-bedroom, \$28,000 town house near the Capitol in the fall of 1962. On his purchase application he indicated that the house would be occupied by Miss Tyler, whom he identified as his cousin, and by Mary Alice Martin, then an employe of Sen. George A. Smathers (D-Fl).

Eddie Fisher Expected In Mexico This Weekend

PUERTO VALLARTA, Mexico (UPI) — Eddie Fisher is coming here this weekend, perhaps to seek the divorce that would open the way for Richard Burton to marry Elizabeth Taylor, it was reported today.

Judge Arcadio Estrada Quinones, who granted a divorce to Burton's wife, Sybil, earlier this week, said Fisher is expected "sometime between Saturday and Monday." He would not say whether the singer plans to file for a "quickie" divorce from Miss Taylor.

(IN HOLLYWOOD yesterday, Fisher said of his marriage to Miss Taylor: "I would like to be out of this thing—whatever it is—as soon as possible.")

(But Fisher insisted he had no plans for a trip to Mexico. He said he was leaving for Las Vegas today.

Burton and Miss Taylor, who are vacationing here, say they do not know when they will marry.

Fisher and Miss Taylor are legally separated.

Informed sources said yesterday Lynda Bird, 19, the older of the two Johnson daughters, will continue her studies here, but it was not learned where.

Sad Yule For Jackie In Florida

PALM BEACH, Fla. (UPI)—The widow of President John F. Kennedy and her two young children arrived at the scene of some of the family's happiest times Wednesday night for a "quiet and sad" Christmas.

Black-clad Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy, Caroline, 6, and John Jr., 3, flew to this winter resort from Washington on an Air Force jet. They were accompanied by Princess Lee Radziwill, Mrs. Kennedy's sister, and several Secret Service men.

Seaside Mansion

The family stepped from the plane into a waiting car and went directly from the West Palm Beach airport to the walled-in, seaside mansion of C. Michael Paul, leased last year by the Kennedys.

Gallagher Plea: Columbus Day A U. S. Holiday

WASHINGTON (ANS) — Rep. Cornelius Gallagher (D-Bayonne) yesterday asked the House Judiciary Committee to approve his bill to make Columbus Day, Oct. 12, a national legal holiday.

He said there is strong public sentiment not only in his district but throughout the country for such an observance.

He said later that he was hopeful the committee would favorably report the bill and bring it to the floor for action at the next session.

Muslims Not Forced To Salute

TRENTON (UPI) — State Education Commissioner Frederick M. Raubinger has ruled five children whose parents are Black Muslims do not have to pledge allegiance to the American Flag at school.

Raubinger Wednesday ordered the Elizabeth School children who had been suspended for refusing to make the pledge, reinstated.

'Conscientious Scruples'

He held that a state law exempting children "who have conscientious scruples" from the pledge encompassed the objections of their parents.

The parents of the children testified that as Black Muslims, they were taught that their sole allegiance was to Allah and that it would be contrary to their teachings to pledge allegiance to any flag, including the flag of Islam.

St. Peter's Prep is up to its old tricks.
