JFK's Dad 'Very Happy' At Home

PALM BEACH, Fla. (UPI) — Joseph P. Kennedy, father of the President, rested at his seaside home today following his release from St. Mary's Hospital, in neighboring West Palm Beach.

Kennedy, 73, was released yesterday after 20 days of hospital care for a stroke he suffered last month. Hospital officials said he faced several more months of confinement at his sprawling winter home overlooking the Atlantic. His right side is still paralyzed and he is still unable to talk.

The family said Kennedy was in good spirits and seemed "very happy about being back home." Hospital officials said he had been eating well and had been sitting up in a wheel chair there.

Clark Says He'll Run City Committee

Dates Set

Bayonne Officials Agree To Budget Discussions

Mayor Alfred Brady and Commissioner John E. Januszewski have consented to meet with three Bayonne organizations to discuss municipal department budgets, it was learned today.

The groups, comprised of the Bayonne Economic Research Council (BERC), the Business and Professional Council (BPC), and the Labor and Industrial Commission (LIC) have sent letters to all the commissioners requesting meetings to discuss the budget of each department. Deputy Commissioner Stephen Ferko of the Department of Public Works met with the organizations Thursday.

THE LETTER requesting the meetings suggested the following

schedule: Brady—week of Jan. 8; Commissioner Prendeville—week of Jan. 15; Januszewski—week of Jan. 22, and Commissioner Fitzpatrick—week of Jan. 29.

Brady consented to a meeting with the organizations, but asked that the date be changed to Jan. 23. Januszewski will meet with the combined groups Jan. 24.

The meetings are desired by the three organizations to discuss manpower and efficiencies accomplished during 1961 and changes planned in the departments between January and July of 1962. The combined organizations would also like to know of any recommendations which will be made to the new mayor-council administration concerning department budgets.

Lopez Admits Yankees Will Be Tough to Beat

CHICAGO (UPI) — Manager Al Lopez has loads of confidence in the pennant-winning potential of his Chicago White Sox but fears the American League race may again be dominated by the New York Yankees.

"I hate to say this because it's the same thing every year," Lopez said. "The Yankees are always here and it's tough to beat them."

THE WHITE SOX pilot, tanned and trim, sized up his team's

chances at the club's annual mid-winter lunch. Lopez, however, was not ready to concede the race to the Yanks before it starts.

He said that age may catch up with the world champions just as it overtook his own team.

"The Yankees can't possibly be as good as they were last year," he said. "It's not likely that Roger Maris or Mickey Mantle can live up to the seasons they had last year, and Yogi Berra and Bill Skowron aren't what they used to be."

LOPEZ SAID trades that brought Joe Cunningham, Charley Smith, Bob Farley and others into the fold will make the 1962 White Sox his kind of team.

"In 1959 we went to the long ball," he said, "and instead of getting better we got worse."

"I think we made exactly the trades we wanted to make. This is something you can't always do," Lopez said.

"EVERYBODY knows we had too much age on the club and instead of getting better we had to get worse," he said.

Lopez said the White Sox would be strong in the middle again with Luis Aparicio at shortstop, Nellie Fox at second and Jim Landis in centerfield.

Lopez had great hopes for Charley Smith, the third baseman obtained from the Philadelphia Phillies and said the former National Leaguer should have no trouble in winning a steady assignment.

At first base Lopez figured it would be either Joe Cunningham, obtained from the St. Louis Cardinals for Minnie Minoso, Bob Farley, who came from the San Francisco Giants, or J. C. Martin.


