# Marker honors the spirit of a hero

The last time Ed Niewahner saw his

brother Ron, Ron was napping on Ed's sofa after Thanksgiving dinner in 1968, just before shipping out to Vietnam.

rushing into death to save someone else. "I guess you could call him a hero," said Ed Niewahner. That's what the Villa Hills Historical Society will be calling him next Saturday, when it unveils a highway marker in his honor at the corner at Niewahner Drive

marker will tell the story of the only soldier from Villa Hills to die in Vietnam. But Ron Niewahner's story didn't end in Vietnam, Ed said. "It's been 31 years, but he's still part of the family.

sisters' homes, you'll see his picture hanging on the wall. We get together annually for a campout, and we'll hang his picture, and now Mom and Dad's picture, on a tree. We don't just give up," said Ed Niewahner. "They may be gone, but they're still with us."

Sometimes Ed Niewahner looks at his nieces and nephews and wonders what Ron's children would have looked like. "We figure he would have been the fa-

ther of five children. He loved kids," said. The picture isn't as clear on his job. Ron was still a carefree kid when he enlisted in the Army. He might have ended up

as an over-the-road truck driver like another brother, Mike. He would have been the joker in the family, Ed Niewahner said. He had his own pool cue as a teen-ager, so by now he
