With several events and time to see old friends, Reunion Weekend promises to be both a time for memories and a weekend to remember. Here's what's planned:

Friday, May 20

- **Reunion Kickoff: Let's Get This Party Started**. We'll get together at the Waveland Golf Course Clubhouse. Enjoy conversation with your classmates while catching up on the past 50 years. Appetizers, pizza and salad provided, cash bar. Time: 6-11 p.m. Casual dress. Cost: \$45 in advance, \$55 (cash only) at the door. Advance registration strongly recommended. Free parking available at Waveland or at Glendale Cemetery.
- For those of you who are golfers, The TRHS Foundation is hosting the Annual Rider Cup event that day at Waveland. The course will be closed to the public that day so only TRHS grads and/or students will be playing. Go to https://www.trhsfoundation.org/ridercup for more information or to sign up. Advance registration for the Rider Cup ends April 15.

Saturday, May 21

- **Tour of TRHS.** 9:45-11 a.m. Here's your chance to rekindle memories -- either fond or traumatic -- by once again walking the halls of TRHS. Plus, you can see if the combination on your hall locker (which you undoubtedly remember) still works.
- **Explore Des Moines.** Between the school tour and the evening event, you'll have time to explore Des Moines with classmates or on your own. You can join classmates/friends for informal lunch at several nearby locations on Ingersoll Avenue, including Palmer's Deli, a roomy, casual spot with good food. Or head for Bauder's soda fountain for a malt/shake made with their renowned ice cream, followed by a walk in Greenwood Park and/or visit to the Des Moines Art Center. Or join another group of classmates planning a walking tour of Des Moines' revitalized downtown. Or just take a nap...
- **Reunion Finale: Cheers to 50 Years**. Party at Forté Banquet & Conference Center in downtown Des Moines. A Classmate's Journey from Uruguay to TRHS to Italy

My experience in Des Moines, at TRHS, with my new friends there, and with my foster family, the Bryans, changed my life forever. I was a 17-year-old girl from Uruguay, and the time I spent in Des Moines on the foreign exchange program opened my eyes to the world. In memory of such a change and thanking life that it took place, I decided I had to go back for the 50th Reunion. Unfortunately, Mr. and Mrs. Bryan have passed away, and my foreign exchange sister, Sally, will not attend the event, although I have visited her twice since 1971.

After graduation, I went back to Uruguay, where I became a lawyer, joined a law firm, and became an Assistant Professor of Commercial Law at the University of Montevideo. I also married but did not have children. In 1983, I got a scholarship from the Italian government to further specialize in commercial law and participate in a research group in Siena, Italy. Once the research group achieved results an Italian/English helicopter company hired me to be part of their legal department. I later became the Head of the International War Helicopters Legal Department. I worked there for 10 years.

I was then recruited to lead the International Legal Department of an Italian/Dutch petrochemical company. I worked there for 20 years, during which the company grew to be a multinational giant. While I continued to live in Italy, I had an office in Frankfurt, Germany and another one in Houston. My jobs at companies made me a very frequent traveler. Moreover, whenever I was able to take a vacation, I enlarged my traveling experience, always choosing adventurous destinations.

I retired in 2017 and, in addition to serving as a consultant, I continue traveling, mainly in Africa with a small group led by a very well-known photographer, to capture images of people and animals. I'm also taking theater lessons for "over-60 people" in Milan and have already been on the stage twice. I look forward to coming back to Des Moines and meeting as many '71 graduates as possible.
