Lynd: In Viet Nam And FUNY

In 1798, France and the United States came dangerously close to war. George Logan, a Pennsyl-vania Quaker, tried to settle the dispute. Because he was a private citizen without authorization from the government, the American people rebelled against the idea.

As a result of this venture, the Logan Act was enacted. When enforced it carries a stiff penalty for anyone negotiating privately with a foreign government in the name of the United States.

Now the act is being tattered by the frivolous winds of the new crop of liberals. Two noticeable examples are Dr. Linus Pauling and the Rev. Martin Luther King.

The fact these men will send letters in open defiance is lamentable. They may be innocent in the eyes of law until proven guilty but when no action is taken to indict them, the situation is deplorable.

Now the latest infringement on this law is the recent journey of Prof. Staughton Lynd and two other men Viet Nam. men to Communist North
