



The Comets started the scoring action when Al Holmes scampered for a touchdown from deep in our own territory, early in the game. The extra point was good.



The outstanding players of the game were Al Holmes, the Rallo brothers, and Ron Downs.




Mat Larigan completes a touchdown on a pass play in the Riverview Central victory.
