Voters Of R-2 School District To Vote On Proposed Bond Issue and Tax Levy

Voters of the R-2 School District will go to the polls on Wednesday, February 19, to decide on the proposed \$1,300,000 bond issue and tax levy for a 2 year period of \$4.05. The tax levy, an increase of 50c over the present rate, will provide funds to comply with the increased operational costs of the ever enlarging enrollment of the

The bond issue will provide for 2 elementary schools, additional instruction rooms at Mc-Cluer High School, and future sites in the northern and southern areas of the district. So that rooms now used by special personnel at Vogt School can be returned to classroom usage, an addition will be made to the administration building.

Both the bond issue and tax levy will require a 2/3 majority vote. If the majority is not obtained, a second proposal will be submitted. This would call for a change to \$3.64, an increase of 9c over last year's levy of 3.55. This proposal requires only a simple majority vote. If the 2/3 majority is not obtained in the first election the following cut-backs in the school program will have to be made:

1) Cut out entire kindergar-

ten program.

2) Charge \$10 book fee for all secondary students.

3) Charge \$20 fee for driver education.

4) Eliminate eight teaching positions in addition to the 32 kindergarten positions which

would be closed.

Since the growth increase of the district will be 2273 by 1965, more classrooms must be made growth. to accomodate this \$500,000 remains from the 1962 bond issue. This amount would, when added to the receipts of the sale of new bonds, provide elementary and secondary facilities which are urgently needed. Since approximately 25% of the R-2 School District is yet undeveloped, it is essential that the Board of Education purchase additional property for school buildings.

Although the R-2 district has the greatest number of children in the county, it is 18th in cost per pupil. Urging passage of this bond issue and tax levy to help remedy the urgent shortage is the Citizens School Crisis Committee headed by Mr. Johnson Poor and Dr. Daniel P. Ro-

Our parents on that date have a chance to make our lives and our community more beneficial as the bond issue and a tax levy both will be up for approval on

The bond issue will provide for two new schools, new rooms at McCluer High School, and an addition to the administration building. This is extremely important because without it there will be a greater number of students in most classrooms making it harder for all of us to learn.

The tax levy will also make a difference to all of us. If it doesn't pass, we'll all have to pay a higher book-rental fee making it hard on many of us.

Even secondary students, or perhaps we might say, especially secondary pupils should realize the need for the growth and development of our schools and aid to teachers. Many strongly advocate the continuance of kindergarten.

So in conclusion we strongly advise that you influence your parents and get them to vote "yes" for both the tax levy and the bond issue and we urge the passage of both because of the provisions made for teachers and new classrooms needed now and in the near future.






