It has been tested already and has brought a glow of satisfaction to all students participating.

The project originated at Brittany Junior High in University City and they were asked to expand the project to include other

As the accompanying list will indicate, we are collecting books, magazines, games and art materials for the children of the Banneker District in St. Louis. Students on our staff are bringing magazines, children's books etc., which they no longer use, and they are asking their friends and others to do the same. Beginning May 4 and through May 15, bring them to the stage in the girls' gym where we will sort them and tie them together in small bundles. Then we will load them into cars or a school truck for deliverey to the Banneker District distribution center at 2840 Lucas Avenue.

Dr. Samuel Shepard, director of the Banneker District Schools is very pleased with the project and suggested that other districts

participate in it.

The Banneker District in St. Louis extends from Grand Avenue to the river, and from Choteau on the south to St. Louis Avenue on the north. Children come from home where some have never had a book or magazine of their own and where they may never even have seen anyone reading. In a small way our project is intended

Voters Pass Levy Will Vote Again On Kindergarten

Voters of our district passed the tax levy on April 7, for an operating rate of \$3.00 by a 68% vote. There was just one proposition on the ballot which was the Teachers' Fund. The proposal required only a simple

On February 19, when voters on a bond proposal of \$1,300,000 and a two year total tax levy of \$4.05, a historic 12,500 came out to vote. It turned out that the total vote was over 60% but not enough for the 2/3 majority. Under the statutes of our state, any proposal of this much money, the vote must be a 2/3

Voters of the Ferguson-Florissant R-2 District, on May 5, will vote again, this time on a proposal for a full year kindergarten program for the 1964-65

school year.

At this time there is a halfyear program but next year the program is scheduled to end because of the defeat of the last school bond issue and tax increase which needed a 2/3 maiority.

This new election vote was set by the Board because of a petition requesting a full time kindergarten program for next

If a petition is turned in the number of voters signing it must equal 10% or more of the votes for the Board member who had the highest total of votes in the last election.

To provide a full-time kinder-

garten the amount of additional revenue needed will be \$.28 on the \$100 valuation. The salaries for the 32-34 teachers is the largest part of the program



Cliff bowled three games of 238,237, and 241 on alleys 5 and 6 at the Ferguson Bowling Lanes.







Leading the rout, in which the Comets broke four of last year's records, was Al Holmes who accounted for two of the broken


