This year, our school is somewhat different from last year in several ways, besides being more crowded. For instance, the time schedules are altered. Admittance to the building is at 8:30 and dismissal at 3:15. Also, there are only four twentyminute lunch shifts rather than five longer ones like last year. Speaking of eating, there are 2 lines in the snack bar this year. Starting in the middle of the counter, they go left and right, and have a cashier at each end. We might also add that new light fixtures were added to the cafeteria and snack bar which make the eating areas much brighter.

The tennis courts and outdoor basketball courts, a few weeks ago, had a "face lift." They were blacktopped and marked off with new white lines.

Another new feature this year is a home room between fourth and fifth hours, lasting fifteen minutes. During this time, the teacher reads the bulletin and other odds and ends like group guidance, individual counseling, Red Cross or other projects or group discussions. If the time is not used for the above mentioned, it will be spent as a short study hall.

Room 101 in the old building has been shortened, and the teachers' room was lengthened.

According to the latest information, the enrollment of Ferguson Junior High has gone up about 77, making the grand total of students approximately 1559 compared to last year's 1482 pupils. Out of these pupils, 528 are 7th graders, 498 are 8th graders, and 555 are fresh-



In the opening game of the 1964 football season the Ferguson Comets defeated the Riverview East Eagles by an overwhelming score of 33-0.


