Students Attend Christmas Dances

Quintet Plays For Assembly And Demonstrates Instruments

Informing students about brass instruments by demonstrating and answering questions was the assembly pre-sented by the Saint Louis Symphony Brass Quintet on November 29. Don Stolz and Vern Cresslear, trumpets; Kaid Friedel, French horn; John MacNulty, tuba; and Mel Jernigan, trombone, played several pieces as well as demonstrated their instruments.

"King's Fanfare" by des Pres opened the program after which followed introductions and a trumpet demonstration. That all brass have three things in common; a mouthpiece, tubing, and a bell, was explained.

The brass ensemble then played "Die Bandelsagerlied," a German song, and "Canzona #2" by Gabrieli. This last piece used different instruments playing the theme one after another which produced an echo effect.

In the French horn demonstration, the instrument was compared to a rubber hose with a mouthpiece and funnel on the other end. Surprisingly, it play-

"Three Intradas" by Pezel and a trombone demonstration were next on the program. On the more modern side, "Waltz" by Harris intermixed with a fox trot was presented.

The largest instrument of the quintet is the tuba. Usually the tuba is associated with an "oompa-pa" rythym but it is also used fluidly.

The question and answer session resulted in FJH students learning more about the brass instruments. Such questions as these were asked: "Can you play a scale by moving the position inside the bell of the French horn?, How many feet of tubing are there in a tuba? Are there mutes for tubas?, and How is the tubing on brass instruments shaped?" The answer to Pat Lowrance's question, 'How heavy is a tuba?', was answered by letting her go up on the stage and hold
