Cheltenham High School ranks consistently in the top five schools statewide in National Merit Awards along with various national and statewide mathematics and science competitions, Scholastic Aptitude Test scores for Cheltenham students were well above the national testing average. One of the most significant facts is that Cheltenham has the highest percentage of college bound students for a comprehensive high school in Pennsylvania.

Sports in Review

Sports have always played an important role in the history of Cheltenham High School and the 1978-79 school year was no exception.

The football team, under the able guidance of Pa. Coach of the Year, Ted Weinstein, completed a successful season with the Panther's third straight victory over our rivals Abington.

In the winter, the boys' gymnastics team completed another perfect season under Coach Len DePue copping a ninth straight Suburban I League Championship. The wrestling team, at the end of a fine season, advanced five wrestlers to the regional tournament, the most for a C.H.S. team since the early 50's.

The spring season saw the lacrosse team, led by Coach Linda Lonsinger, undertake a five-match tour of England. The team raised \$22,000 to finance the trip. The boys' baseball team, under Coach Steve Kolinsky, broke a three-way tie for first place by sweeping a two-game playoff series to capture a Suburban I title. (This championship was the first since the days of Reggie Jackson.)

Change in Site

Graduation ceremonies for Cheltenham High School's Class of 1979 were held at Temple University's Music Festival. Five hundred and ten seniors received diplomas.

This is the first time these ceremonies have been held at a site other than on the high school grounds.

Howard Fields, 1888-1979

Howard W. Fields, a former principal of C.H.S., passed away June 16, 1979. He was 91. Mr. Fields was at C.H.S. for 31 years. He taught mathematics and science and coached the track team from 1919 to 1926. He was principal from 1945 to 1950.

Where Are They Now?

Robert C. Cunningham

In a teaching career that spanned more than four decades, Robert Cunningham established himself as a respected and good friend of Cheltenham High School students and faculty. Continuing the "F & M" connection, which brought us "Dutch" Lehman and Bill Saltzman, Cunningham came to CHS in 1933 from Franklin and Marshall College. Starting as a two-period-a-day teacher and line coach for the football team, Cunningham quickly became an important part of the C.H.S. family.

He became a full time faculty member teaching English and History, the following year. In 1937 he became head baseball coach, a job he held until 1962. In the classroom he moved from history teacher to department chairman.

His desire to help students more directly led him into guidance, first as a counselor, and later as head of the Guidance Department in 1965.

In 1959, Cunningham and his wife Arlene expanded the Domestic Exchange from an infant program to a valuable educational experience for many students. Over the next fourteen years the Domestic Exchange traveled to Abeline,

Texas; Bradenton, Florida; and Lakewood, Colorado.

After forty years of loyal service, Cunningham retired from Cheltenham. Today Bob Cunningham is an involved community leader. Currently he is active in the Glenside Rotary Club where he helped to organize a Career Expo (still the counselor). He is an Elder in the Elkins Park Presbyterian Church and President of the Board of Directors for the Elkins Park Fire Company.

He spends a great deal of time in the Pittsburgh area where his children, Don '58 and Nancy '63, have settled. While there, he and his wife spend a great deal of time spoiling their five grandchildren!

Looking back on his Cheltenham days, Cunningham recalled that he was always pleased when graduates would return and tell him how well CHS had prepared them for life. Of course as a coach he said he often remembers "the big game we won and, of course, the ones we should have won."

Plans to travel to Europe and, of course, Pittsburgh are in the future for the Cunninghams. They also send their best wishes to all of their many Cheltenham friends.
