

THE LONE PILGRIM. By Laurie Colwin. 211 pages, Knopf. \$9.95.

The New York Times called it a "fictional anatomy of love." In a laudatory book review, the Times reviewer said, "In Happy All The Time, her recent novel, Laurie Colwin wrote about successful love, that



grand surprise. In 'The Lone Pilgrim,' her new collection of stories, she writes about some of the unsuccessful aspects. 'Love, in its initial stages,' a character says, 'takes care of everything.' It is, in both a positive and a negative sense, a disturbance of the peace.
