One century since the class of 1884 began the fine Cheltenham tradition. And your Alumni Association — in conjunction with the school district and the United Parent's Organization — has planned a year of celebration that is worthy of such an historic event.

The Centennial year will begin with the dedication of a Centennial Grove to be planted in the library quadrangle at the high school. This symbolic gesture will grow along with C.H.S. as it enters its second century.

Beginning in October, the Alumni Association will sponsor the Centennial Sunday Series. The Series will be five Sunday evenings throughout the school year spotlighting distinguished graduates of Cheltenham.

The first night, October 23rd, features Lewis Klein '45 vice-president of Gateway Communications, Inc. Mr. Klein, among his many accomplishments, was the executive producer of American Bandstand during its Philadelphia tenure. He will speak on "Television: Yesterday and Tomorrow!"

November 20th will celebrate "Musical Comedy: Past and Present" with the return to Cheltenham's stage of three of Cheltenham Theatre's brightest stars. Robert Acker '74 (Don Quixote in "Man of LaMancha"), Susan Wapner '78 (Laurie in Oklahoma"), and Richard Weinstock '76 (Charley in "Where's Charley?") will recreate some of the great musical songs from Broadway hits of recent memory. They will be joined that evening by the Cheltenham Ensemble who will perform their touring show which this year has as its theme our 100th birthday.

March 18th, Robert Myers '29, former Chief Actuary of the United States, Deputy Commissioner of Social Security, and most recently Executive Director of the National Commission of Social Security Reform, will speak on the future of Social Security.

April 29th will find Robert Nurock '54, President of Investor's Analysis, Inc. and one of the regulars on Wall Street Week speaking on your money and what you should know about it.

The final evening, May 20th, will be a nostalgic look back by *Don Kinnier* '62 at the console of the Theatre Organ. His programs have delighted people at Longwood Gardens where he is currently guest organist, and around the world.

# Where Are They Now?

Ralph Garreth Started teaching in the Cheltenham School District in 1935. As a graduate of Germantown High School, Palmer Business School and the University of Maryland, he holds degrees in Economics, Political Science and Business.

Garreth's background lies heavily in the business world, and for years he worked in a local brokerage firm until he began teaching in Cheltenham. During his years in the school district, Garreth taught business and finance courses, and ran the school bank.

The purpose of the school bank program in the beginning, Garreth says, "was to give the kids training and experience in handling money and financial records." At that time, the school's money was held in the bank until it was issued for various purposes. Garreth was responsible for the money and had to issue monthly reports to the school board and superintendent on the use of money.

Ralph Garreth was also involved closely with athletics while at Cheltenham. A major problem the athletic department faced was the theft of athletic equipment. Coach Lehman asked Ralph if he would supervise, organize and distribute the equipment to the students. In addition to this responsibility, Garreth coached the baseball team for nine years and coached the golf team for 15. During his tenure as golf coach, his teams won 4 championships.

Garreth retired in 1970, and he remains tremendously active. He spends his time these days playing golf, gardening and doing civic and charitable volunteer work. He recently retired as secretary of a local building and loan association and spends every other week at the Wyncote Church Home giving lectures and leading discussions with the residents.

Mr. Garreth lives in Glenside with his wife, Frances, whom he met while working in Cheltenham. Frances was the secretary to the director of elementary shoools at that time. They have one son, Ralph H., who attended Cheltenham and was distinguished for his achievements in baseball and basketball. Today he is Vice-President of Aerospace at Standard Pressed Steel.
