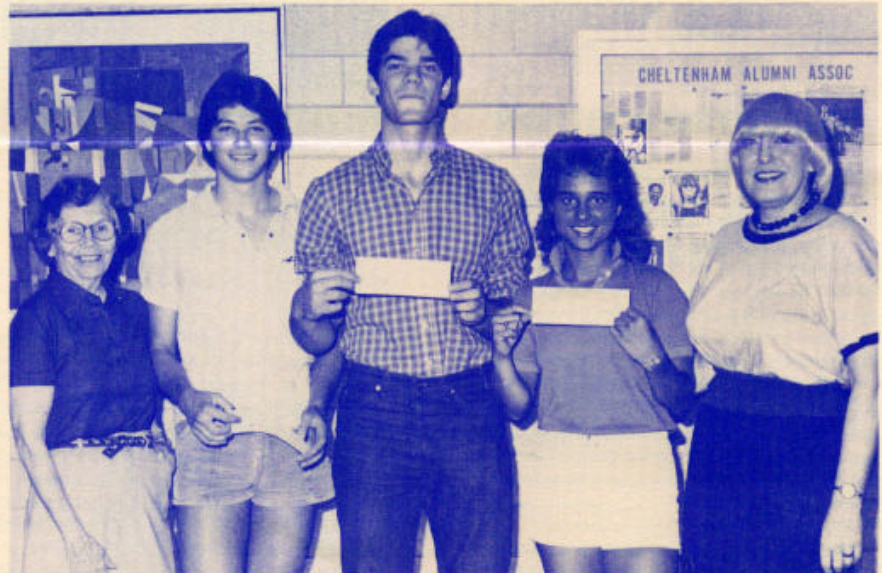
SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS

BRING ON THE CLOWNS

Peter Sheib '75 isn't clowning around when he dons his costume and goes on stage. Clowning is serious business to Peter. He trained in Paris, France with master clown, Philippe Gaulier, of Le Coq School. He also studied at the Etienne Decroux Mime School and Fratellini Circus School.

Peter won first place at the International Mime-Clown Festival and acted in "Amadeus," directed by Roman Polanski in Paris. He has performed in Atlantic City, Philadelphia, Washington and New York. Peter sometimes offers workshops in clowning and mime at the Cheltenham Township Adult School.

Perry Triplett, '47, who can trace his roots in the LaMott section of Cheltenham Township to the 1800's, was always encouraged by his teachers to think, question and explore. Triplett has done extensive research on Lucretia Mott, a Quaker and active suffragette after whom the Lamott community was named. Mott supported the Underground Railroad and after the Civil War earmarked her land for a racially integrated community. A portion of her land was used as the first training camp for blacks during the war. Perry's current project is a major undertaking — to have the federal government list LaMott as an historic district on its National Registry.

After graduation from the University of Pennsylvania in 1965 with her Fulbright Scholarship, she went to Turkey to photograph the country and the people. Mary Ellen has been most affected, however, by her frequent trips to India which began in the late 60's and when in Calcutta, photographed Mother Theresa. Mary Ellen's works have appeared in "Camera Arts," the "New York Times Magazine," "Paris Match," "Times and Life Magazine." She has more than 10 books to her credit. Mary Ellen has received many awards; the most recent was for the film "Streetwise," a documentary about the children that live on the streets of Seattle.

SCIENCE STUDENTS HONORED

Two members of the class of 1985 recently took high honors in the annual Westinghouse Science Talent Search in Washington, D.C. **Anthony Ciabarra** placed sixth and **Allan Goldstein** placed tenth. Ciabarra earned a \$7,500 scholarship, while Goldstein won a \$5,000 scholarship. Ciabarra's selected project was in DNA biochemistry; he studied the genetic repair in bacteria, using a bacteriophage containing uracil in its DNA to screen known mutants for their clotting efficiency. Goldstein studied the production of proteins in leeches that help prevent blood clotting in those animals. His work was directed toward finding ways to create the proteins in human beings to help fight emphysema.

These two outstanding young men were among forty finalists selected for the scholarships from thirteen states and were chosen from 300 semi-finalists in January.

The Westinghouse Electric Corp. and Science Service sponsored contest is considered the country's top science competition.

CHS WINS SCIENCE FAIR

The Delaware Valley Science Fair was held in April. CHS walked off with most of the honors.

Allan Goldstein won the gold award for biochemistry and **Anthony Ciabarra**, the silver, for microbiology. Three other seniors took first place. They were: **Andrew Cohen**, **David Sacks** and **Barry Margulies**. **Peter Kohn**, **Martin Kelley** and **Gregory Pastore** came in third.

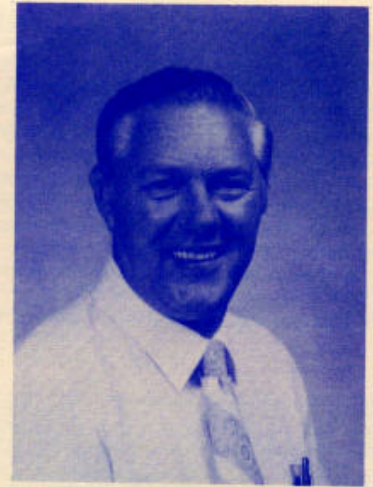

All the young competitors were given an expense free weekend in Washington, D.C., and met Sally Ride. The winner won a trip to the Kennedy Space Center in Florida to view the space shuttle launch in July.
