Three Cheltenham High School Alumni Association Scholarships have traditionally been announced at Commencement. Last June, in a departure from the usual procedure, the recipients were named at a special awards ceremony to which parents were invited on Monday, June 1st.

Criteria for selection of these Alumni Association Scholarship winners include academic performance, community involvement, financial need and school citizenship. Applications are sent to Beaver College to be forwarded to Princeton University for evaluation in much the same way that applications for financial aid by students applying for admission to college are handled.

The 1987 winners were Francis McGrath of Melrose Park, who planned to attend Tulane University and major in Liberal Arts; Ohn Park, a resident of Elkins Park who planned to pursue a course in Liberal Arts at Dartmouth; and Cuong D. Vu of Melrose Park who planned to major in Business at Temple University. All three of our winners are to be commended because in addition to their studies and extra-curricular activities, all three of them worked at part-time jobs.

Francis McGrath was a National Merit Scholarship finalist and recognized for Outstanding Academic Achievement. He also received a C.H.S. School Service and Citizenship Award named in honor of Robert Mackler Iskin. (These awards are named in honor of former teachers and administrators, distinguished people in the community or former students at Cheltenham.) In addition to these honors, Frank participated in the 1987 musical, "Pirates of Penzance," and also the 1984, 1985 and 1986 productions. He was a member of the Math Team, President of the World Affairs Council and was selected to attend the Glenside Rotary Club's Leadership Seminar in Washington, D.C. last summer. He worked at United Instrument Company.

Ohn Park was a National Merit Scholarship winner, elected to the National Honor Society and also recognized for Outstanding Academic Achievement. He received a C.H.S. School Service and Citizenship Award named in honor of Edwin J. Davis. His activities at Cheltenham include being Student Council Treasurer, a World Affairs Council Officer, member of the Math Team and Science Seminar and Captain of a Bowling Team that won both First and Second Place in Intramural Competition. He was also selected to attend the Glenside Rotary's Leadership Seminar in Washington, D.C. last summer. Ohn worked for three years as a lab assistant at the Fox Chase Cancer Center.

Cuong D. Vu was a student at Cheltenham from February, 1985 and didn't speak any English when he arrived from Vietnam. In addition to his school work and learning our language, he worked as a cook and dishwasher at the Dominican Retreat House in Elkins Park.

The Alumni Association extends congratulations to all three winners and best wishes for their success and happiness as they continue their education.

TWO CHS SENIORS WIN AT SCIENCE FAIR

1986-87 Seniors Anthony Goncalves and Jonah Erlebacher were chosen for recognition for excellent scientific research in the Westinghouse Science Talent Search. Goncalves' project on 'Raman Spectroscopy of an Alpha Olefin/Maleic Anhydride Copolymer" and Erlebacher's project. 'Model for the Inhibition of Polycylic Hydrocarbons: The Crystal Structure of Ellagic Acid" both placed in the top 40. The contest is considered the country's top science competition and is sponsored by the Westinghouse Electric Corp. and Science Service, a non-profit organization based in Washington, D.C. Erlebacher attended a sixday all-expenses-paid session in Washington, D.C., where he was awarded \$1000 in scholarships. CHS ranks sixth in the nation among schools with the most Top 40 winners in the 46 year history of the Search.

PANTHER'S TALE ON THE AIR!

Lights Camera Action! A new Alumni Association project, Panther's Tale, had its television premiere on Cheltenham's own cable television station last Spring. The brainchild of Richard Weinstock '76, Panther's Tale attempts to highlight in a video format the best and the brightest that Cheltenham has to offer. In the inaugural one-hour episode, three diverse stories were presented in a snappy, clean format with Richard serving as the on-air host supported by an all-alumni technical crew.

The first segment included an interview with two of Cheltenham's best wrestlers, Perry Lederman '87 and Bennett Myer '71. During the past two years, Bennett helped Perry prepare for the end of the season tournaments. This resulted in Perry's winning an opportunity to represent Cheltenham in the PIAA State Wrestling Championships, the first time for a Cheltenham wrestler since Bennett accomplished this back in 1971.

The second story was the beautiful dedication ceremony of the Netanyahu Memorial in Philadelphia. The inspiring marble piece symbolizes the heroic actions of Jonathan Netanyahu '64, who tragically lost his life while leading the Israeli commando raid on Entebbe, Uganda in 1976. The memorial project was directed by Steven Friedman, a classmate of "Yoni's". The main speaker at the ceremony was Benjamin Netanyahu '67, "Yoni's" brother, and currently the Israeli Ambassador to the United Nations.

The final story was an interview with the cast of last year's CHS musical, "The Pirates of Penzance." The story included film clips of the cast and crew in their final dress rehearsal.

Work has already begun on this year's programs which should be on the air in December. The first show will include a video look at the Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony held last Spring and filmed by the Parither's Tale ace mobile cameraman Raymond Scott '87. Other hardworking alumni include: Johnna Corbett '84 and Jackle Myers '81 on the studio cameras and Charles Stamm '67 who serves as the show's director and who, along with Richard Weinstock, edit the programs.
