

CLASS OF '89 HAILED BY THE CHIEF

President Bush is Commencement Speaker



An enthusiastic audience of over two thousand electrified people heard President Bush encourage the 331 members of the class of 1989 to refute those who speak of a "me generation" and to continue the tradition at CHS of volunteerism. President Bush spoke of his Administration's new YES to America Initiative Program — Youth Entering Service. According to President Bush, this program "can build a cathedral of spirit;; and help yours become a global "We Generation."

President Bush referred to the "magnificent success that is Cheltenham High School." And paraphrasing Mark Twain, he said, "reports of your reputation have not been exaggerated." He told the seniors, "you are beautiful and I am enjoying my first visit."

In a prepared speech, Bush told the graduates, "that you can enrich the world charitably and courageously, through your choices and your deeds." He went on to say, "I have learned that any definition of a successful life insists that we help

those for whom the American Dream seems an Impossible Dream." He then spoke of the heroism of Chinese students who recently have "demanded freedom — a demand that won't be stilled."

The President encouraged members of the class to do something inspiring. "Become a doctor, like your alumnus Michael Brown ('58, winner of the 1985 Nobel Prize in Medicine), or become a teacher like Lew Shaten — retiring tomorrow after 32 years committed to broadening the minds of thousands of young people.

Or writers like Levinson and Link." (The late Richard Levinson and his partner, William Link, Emmy Award winning writers and producers — members of the class of 1952).

President Bush also made personal references to several class members for their volunteer work throughout the community.

The ceremony began with an invocation by senior class member Cindi Barry, followed by a well rehearsed welcome address from composed class president Jeffrey Schwarzschild. The Ensemble then sang several selections and drew a favorable comment from the President.

Joseph Reavy, director of guidance, announced the academic awards and National Merit Scholarship results.

Dr. Charles F. Stefanski, superintendent of schools, delivered his remarks immediately before class member Hang Nguyen, a National Merit Scholarhship Finalist who ranked in the top two percent of the class, introduced the President.

After President Bush's remarks the members of the class of 1989 were presented by Cathy Stamm, class sponsor and Joseph W. Rodgers, Principal. The President shook hands with each of the 331 graduates, often exchanging remarks with the students and occasionally receiving a hug and kiss from the young women or an arm around his shoulder from the young men.

JUST ANOTHER GRADUATION

Some very different music was coming from the band room several weeks before graduation. Band members were practicing "Hail to the Chief." Also, for the first time in the band director's memory, or anyone else's, each member of the band took their instrument home and practiced every night.

Strangers were walking through the corriders with school officials. Although school administrators were advised to keep the president's visit a secret for as long as possible, it became very clear something was "happening" according to several seniors.

Finally, Joseph Rodgers, CHS principal, informed class members of the visit. Suddenly, the "suits" (secret service and members of the White House advance team) seemed to be everywhere. Cheltenham Statt and White House staff had only two weeks to get ready for President Bush's visit.

Modifications to the stage area had to be made, while a platform had to be erected to accommodate the media.

The planning and preparation meetings were just beginning. The Secret Service began working on security with the Cheltenham police. District maintenance staff began modifications to the stage area. A speaker's platform with an armor-plated barrier had to be built. Floors were polished, the gym was painted, ceiling tiles replaced, potholes repaired, fifty additional telephone lines were installed at the school. Another 42 lines and extra pay phones were installed for the media. The White House also requested another 200 lines be installed at an undisclosed area. Special television lights supplied by the White House were hung from the gym ceiling.

Preparations also included staff and student security checks. The day before Bush's visit a thorough "sweep" was made of the entire building.

Local resident's had a chance to tour Marine One, the president's helicopter when a simulated run was performed several days before graduation.

Then, suddenly the hottest and the "only" ticket in town was for the 105th commencement exercise at CHS.

Finally, graduation day arrived. District personnel, who had been working long hours to make this a special day for the Class of '89, were busy with last minute duties.

The Secret Service and White House teams were also finalizing their last minute plans. Television and other media crews began arriving very early. A score or more of microwave dishes from the news vans parked near the gym, towered 50 or 60 feet over the school. Comcast Cable carried the ceremony live throughout the area as did three major T.V. Stations.

At three o'clock the entire gym and second floor of the school were "sealed off" for the final security sweep. At the same time the presence of local and state police was evident as were F.B.I. teams, mounted police, K-9 units, fire equipment, special aviation foam trucks, an ambulance corps, and bomb squad specialists. Positioned on the roof of a nearby apartment complex, as well as the high school, were police marksmen.

In order to enter the building everyone had to pass through metal detectors positioned in several locations. Cameras and pocket-books were checked by the Secret Service.

Then, at 6:40 p.m. precisely on schedule, just before the procession of the graduates, the sound of five Marine helicopters could be heard. The excitement in the audience reached a new, electrifying level when the president's helicopter was seen through the arched gymnasium windows while landing on the nearby athletic field.

Then within a few minutes the announcement "Ladies and Gentlemen, the President of the United States" was greated with enthusiastic applause and a long standing ovation. The band then proceeded to "show off" its talents with a stirring "Hail to the Chief" which brought chills to the spine as the reality of it all truly sank in.

Following the ceremonies, just before boarding Marine One, as this once in a lifetime experience came to an end, the president stopped along a practice field fence to shake hands with school officials, members of the police, fire and emergency crews, assembled to protect him.

WHY CHELTENHAM

One of the most frequently discussed topics surrounding the presidential visit to Cheltenham was "Why Cheltenham."

"In many ways, it is a shining example of what is right with education," said a spokeswoman for U.S. Secretary of Education, Dr. Lauro F. Cavazos. Stephen Hart, Deputy White House Press Secretary, called it "an exemplary school."

The U.S. Department of Education suggested ten schools from which the White House staff selected Cheltenham. The Class of '89 was Cheltenham's first to complete the district's new core curriculum based on recommendations from the 1983 report "A Nation at Risk." The curriculum emphasizes math and science, along with introducing all students to foreign languages.

Select students from CHS have been part of the Presidential Classroom Program held in Washington for the past twenty years. The school has always had many innovative programs and a tremendous record of involvement by students, parents and the community. Clearly recognized by the White House were the many CHS students volunteering in all types of community service.

An outstanding 84% of Cheltenham's graduates go on to college, along with a less than 1% dropout rate, are a credit to the inspired and dedicated teachers, the students and their families.

All of this in conjunction with Cheltenham's reputation for academic excellence did not go unnoticed!





PRESIDENTIAL SECURITY

An interesting and informative side-light to the presidential visit involved the security measures used by the secret service and the White House staff. In the week before the graduation the young, clean cut men in their white shirts and dark business clothes were referred to and identified by the students as "the suits." Although easily identified and few in number at first, the secret service people and the White House advance staff team worked easily with the students and administrators at the high school and a warm camaraderie developed at the school. However, by Monday afternoon in the hours before commencement the number of secret service men, other federal agents and local police was dramatically increased and they were ALL business. By 3:00 p.m., the gymnasium and industrial arts area of the school was completely sealed and thoroughly "swept." The podium had been constructed to exacting specifications provided by the White House to provide maximum protection to the president. Although inconspicious, there were many protective devices present on, under and around the stage.

Entry to the transformed gymnasium at three entry points was through the most sensitive metal detectors both stationary and hand held which was supervised by uniformed secret service personnel.

The evening went without incident and none of those present voiced any criticism of the security measures employed for the protection of the president.

CHS Graduates Among Victims of Flight 103 Pan Am Airline Crash

David Dornstein, class of 1981, and Martin Apfelbaum, class of 1947 perished, along with 257 others, when Pan Am Flight 103 crashed into the Scottish village of Lockerbie.

Dornstein worked for the Coalition for the Advancement of Jewish Education in New York until July of 1988. He helped organize the Coalition's international conference in Israel and left the organization following the conference and remained in Israel. Dornstein was a Brown University graduate, where he was a creative writing major.

Apfelbaum was a prominent stamp dealer in the City of Philadelphia. He was president of Earl P.L. Apfelbaum Inc. He served as past president of the American Stamp Dealers Association and was a columnist for several Philadelist Journals.
