## Reavy steps down from head of guidance

Perhaps you were one of the students in Joe Reavy's social studies class at Thomas Williams Junior High in 1959. Little did Reavy think when he started out as a young teacher that he would leave the classroom and begin a new career in guidance at Cheltenham High School, with the responsibility for seeing that seniors were matched with the colleges appropriate to their skills and academic talents. But that job was "in the stars" for him, for his interest was people.

Having first prepared to be a Christian Brother, Reavy left that vocation to become a teacher, where his concern for helping others is what made his guidance career possible and caused the man himself to be so beloved by all. In 1963 he became a guidance counselor at the high school. In 1973 he was appointed Director of Guidance and Special Education. Over the decades he helped thousands of Cheltenham seniors to academic success by his continued encouragement with academic dilemmas and by his willingness to give them time when they needed a listening ear.

Reavy's activities have extended beyond the realm of guidance. His interest in the theater has led him to become assistant director of both the fall play and the spring musical. For the past five years he has been sponsor of the Student Council. In all these activities Reavy kept in close touch with students, enabling him give guidance and advice outside of his office.

Reavy's private life is filled with poetry, music, and family. Proud of his Irish heritage, he studies the Irish poets, especially William Butler Yeats, as an avocation. He gives music lessons, and has published a book of music in the Irish tradition written by his father. He speaks with pride of his daughter who was just graduated from Princeton.

Reavy will be remembered for his kindness, his Irish wit, and one famous quote imprinted on the minds of the teachers at the annual start of school meetings, "There will be no course changes this year." Of course, there were always many changes because of his genuine interest in the welfare of the students.

And now, in the year 1992, Joe Reavy is about to retire. A great gap will be left in the structure of the school administration; Reavy cannot be replaced in today's world where there are fewer people interested in other human beings and the main concerns are money and self-serving interests. Reavy is a man who thinks more of responsibilities than rights, and more of people than money. He will be sorely missed by all.

The Cheltenham District is saying goodbye to many beloved and familiar friends. Including two junior high school principals: Dr. John Townsend, who led Thomas Williams Jr. High and Cedarbrook Middle School for the past 26 years and Mr. Dan Fitzgerald who was principal of Ogontz Jr. High until its closing and a District employee for a total of 23 years.

## Norton retires after 32 years at CHS

After thirty-two years of dedicated service to Cheltenham High School, Bill Norton is retiring, leaving behind a sizable legacy and a record difficult to equal, particularly considering the obstacles he'd had to overcome throughout his career.

Bill Norton was the first black teacher hired by the Cheltenham School District. Back in 1961 he stood in front of his first group of students to teach history; the job was a challenge because there were few black children in the class and Mr. Norton wondered about his acceptance. With his academic credits, however, none doubted that he would become an outstanding teacher and soon move up in the ranks of administrators. In 1969 he became department chairperson of social studies, and after his tenure there moved on to become housemaster at the high school. In 1979 he was made Assistant

Some of you may remember Mr.

Norton's outstanding political science lessons. His renown spread so that he taught not only at Cheltenham, but also at Rutgers University, one summer at Harvard University and for 15 years at the University of the Arts. While at Harvard, Mr. Norton developed the use of periodicals in conjunction with textbooks. This enabled students to read not only the most current material on the topics but also articles that spanned the political spectrum from right to left.

Honors students ask "why," which was the impetus for Mr. Norton to institute the Senior Independent Project. Originally this program was started as an academic research project that encouraged students to get out into the field and talk to practitioners. One such project, Mr. Norton recalled, had a student interviewing police and prisoners on the topic of brutality. The two sides had varied opinions on the extent

## CHS graduate awarded MacArthur Fellowship

Anthropologist Steven Feld, C.H.S. '67, has spent 15 years trying to capture the interaction of the Kaluli people of the Papua New Guinea rain forest with their environment. He has recorded everything from the whoops and yodels of men as they cut down trees to a Kaluli woman singing a duet with a waterfall.

"The woman was singing not only with water, but singing like water — imitating the sounds around her, said feld, a University of Texas at Austin professor. "Whether they are singing along with crickets, the birds, the rain or the streams, I want to show the Kaluli people becoming one with the rain forest's musical ecology."

Feld's interest in the relation of music and mythology to the environment is one of the reasons why he was named a 1991 recipient of a \$260,000 MacArthur Fellowship. He is one of 31 persons receiving the fellowships this year.

The MacArthur Fellowships which range from \$150,000 to \$375,000 over five years, are given to free creative individuals from economic pressures

and encourage them to pursue research or artistic endeavors. "By supporting these fellows, highly talented individuals working in a wide range of fields, the foundation means to honor creative persons everywhere," said a statement from the MacArthur Foundation, which has awarded more than \$1 billion in grants since 1978.

Feld's interest in this area grew out of his background as a jazz trombonist, an instrument he played in the Cheltenham Band and Orchestra. He then became interested in African and Oceanic musics and went off to the jungles of Papua New Guinea to study how the people of the rain forest adapt to the varied sounds that surround them.

In the spring of 1990 with the help of Grateful Dead drummer Mickey Hart, Feld completed an hour-long recording of songs and sounds called Voices of the Rain Forest, which is available in record stores.

"I have found that the Kaluli people of Papua New Guinea are so in-synch with their environment that the music they create is intertwined with the natural sounds of the rain forest they live in, said Feld, associate professor of anthropology and music and director of UT Austin's Center for Folklore and Ethnomusicology.

Feld discovered that the people had myths about origins of crying and song and poetry coming from the calls of birds. "It has turned out that this music isn't just some surface fluff. It was really heavily linked to the tribe's spiritual world, and to adaptation and the environment," he said.

Dr. Feld then extended his research to the sounds of frogs, crickets and water. "It's not just that they think about birds and think about water like music — they sing duets with birds; they're whistling like them, and they're performing with them. It's not just that the birds inspire all this, it's that they're good to sing with as well. They're part of the orchestra," said Feld. His book Sound and Sentiment: Weeping. Poetics, and Song in Kaluli Expression won the 1991 J.I. Staley Award for outstanding books of anthropology.


# Cheltenham forms foundation Daniel Seltzer '67 elected chairman

The Cheltenham school community has a new resident, the Cheltenham School District Foundation. Its major goal is to promote the quality of education in the schools by providing funding for innovative and creative programs. The Cheltenham School District is not unique in these troubled financial times. With a limited tax base and minimal federal and state funding, the school district needs other sources of income to help preserve those characteristics which have always made Cheltenham a leading force in public education. Following 18 months of study, a Citizens' Advisory Committee recommended the establishment of an educational foundation to aid the district in providing those additional funds

Formed in September 1991 as a non-profit, tax-exempt corporation, the Foundation has already received 20 grant applications from the professional staff for the 1992-93 school year under the Foundation's Teacher Grant Program. Funding ideas include innovative projects in the Humanities, Math, Reading, Art, Music, the Environment and self worth. To pay for these projects and to establish an endowment, the Foundation is in the midst of its first annual fund raising drive. During this drive, Lincoln Investment Planning, Inc. of Wyncote, will match all funds raised by July 1st up to \$5,000.



In addition to the new computer equipment, the Cheltonian has been linked via modem to a national journalism network called the Youth News Service in Washington. The Service allows over 300 high school newspapers throughout the United States to share news stories of interest to today's youth. Editors-in-chief Andy Shurman, '92 and Danny Burns along with Cheltonian sponsor Elizabeth Westerman Wolpert, '54 have given leadership to this prize-winning newspaper. to which police brutality existed. This was such an eye opener for this student that when he later became an attorney, he fought for legislation to protect juvenile offenders. As Mr. Norton recalled, "these were exciting lessons for the students and me." Student projects that have been done as a result of class "extend their education. It doesn't stop at the end of a semester.

One example of taking the classroom into real life was a summer program in government taught by Mr. Norton and Mrs. Lila Rosenbluth. This course took one group of students to the 1972 Democratic Convention in Miami. Due to a ticket crunch, admission to the convention floor was very difficult. A chance meeting between Mr. Norton and Hubert Humphrey in a Florsheim Shoe Store enabled the class to get all the passes they needed to the convention. Mr. Norton was always a persuasive talker.

Mr. Norton is an inveterate reader, enjoying two or three books a week. Also a musician, he plays violin in the Adult School Orchestra and a symphony orchestra. School duties and personal interests did not keep him from being close to his two sons, one an attorney and an architect and the other an attorney.

Mr. Norton is a man who can't sit still, according to his acquaintances, so retirement will not bring his life to a standstill. We can picture him climbing into his three-year-old car, which already has 40,000 miles on it, to visit friends around the country.

### Boys', girls' basketball teams win division titles

This past winter season saw a rare occurrence in the Cheltenham High School gymnasium. For the first time in memory, the boys' and girls' basketball teams each won the Suburban I Liberty Division title. For the girls, under coaches Robert Schaefer Mike Houghton and Lewis Wisnoff '76 this was the sixth consecutive title. Led by thousand point career scorer Dana Mills, the Lady Panthers rolled to an impressive 21-3 regular season record. Dana became the all-time leading Cheltenham scorer, boy or girl, with 1316 points.

The Boys' team, under coaches Steve Daley and Scott Eveslage '89 won their first Suburban I championship since the Paul Westhead coached team of 1968 went all the way to the PIAA State Finals. The boys' team finished with an impressive 21-7 record for the season.

The big night for the basketball program came on the last night of the regular season when the boys' and girls' team took on arch-rival Abington in a double header before a sell-out crowd in our gym. The girls blew Abington off the court first with an impressive 56-42 win. This set the stage

for the showdown between Abington, Suburban I champs in their division and our own championship boys' team. The Panthers blew open a close game in the last five minutes to roll to an impressive 60-50 victory.
