## Former high school to be reborn as park

n early morning inferno on January 11, 1994, engulfed what had once been the second building to house Cheltenham High School. The fire, which has since been ruled arson by Cheltenham Fire Marshall Michael Moonblatt, '64, gutted the front building

on the High School Road and Montgomery Avenue site. The building, which had been built in 1905, has played many roles in its 90 year history. Starting as the high school, it later became Elkins Park Junior High School and then the school district's administration building until the entire four-building, 11 acre complex was sold to a religious school in 1977.

The Cheltenham Township Board of Commissioners has, since the fire, decided that they would utilize funds from the Montgomery County Open Space initiative to purchase the property from developers

who had planned to convert the site into a senior citizen living facility. The Commissioners plan to demolish the buildings and convert the property into a park. Township Commissioner Tom Ellis, '77, who represents that area said, "The county will be providing 90% of the purchase price through its Open Space Program. The purchase price is \$1.1 million, of which the county is paying \$990,000 and the balance is to be paid by Cheltenham Township."

Ellis elaborated, "The use of the

top of the property will be passive park land and will be called High School Park. The old soccer field will be converted into use by the Cheltenham JVs. It will then be up to the township and the neighbors to decide if additional recreational facilities will be added."

It is hoped that in the process of demolition, some of the ornamental trim that had been part of the 1925 high school (main building) can be saved. This would include the engraved stone name over the main entrance and the blocks that were engraved with "service" and "wisdom" on either side of the plaza.

"Hopefully we will have a dedication ceremony sometime this summer", said Ellis. It is hoped that as part of the dedication cer-

emony, a c o m memorat i v e plaque will be erected at the park to pay tribute to the site of the former Cheltenham High Schools.

#### Sociology text author returns to CHS

The author's name on the cover of most textbooks is usually an anonymous, faceless person with whom the students have little or no contact. This was true for about forty of Dr. Stanley Goldhaber's sociology students until Dr. John Macionis '65, the author of their new textbook, made a return visit to his alma mater to speak to these

budding sociologists.

Macionis, a professor at
Kenyon College in Ohio, was
in town for a convention and
stopped at Cheltenham to speak
to the students. Among his audience were two fellow classmates, Cheltenham School
Board members Emily Brecker
Greenberg and Neil Sklaroff,
as well as CHS principal Joseph
Rodgers and social studies department chairman George
Reim who had arranged the
visit

Two years ago, the Cheltenham social studies department began looking for a new and exciting sociology textbook. Having looked at dozens, Dr. Macionis' Sociology 4th edition was selected. The ironic part is that



Cheltenham did not know the roots of its textbook's author and Macionis did not know that Cheltenham now taught sociology and had adopted his book.

To date, more than 1 million students in the United States and around the world have used one of Macionis's four textbooks. His major introductory text, Sociology, has sold more than 500,000 copies, more than many books on the New York Times "best-seller" list. He is the most successful textbook author, regardless of discipline, for Prentice Hall, Inc., the world's largest textbook publishing company.



# Another year of blue and gold glory...

Cheltenham's Class of '95 boasted 16 National Merit Semi-Finalists, tops of any high school in the state of Pennsylvania.

The Panthers football team won Homecoming, defeating the Abington Ghosts 21-15 to cap off a winning season. The victory was the second in three years for the Panthers, and represented the culmination of outstanding performances from running back Jamy Smith '95 and lineman Curtis Schley '95.

A fourth board win by Bun Lai '96 gave Cheltenham's chess team a narrow 3-2 win over Lower Moreland to clinch the league title. This year's team was solid from top to bottom, with no team member finishing lower than 22nd in the league rankings.

The Lady Panthers basketball team won their ninth consecutive Liberty Division title, going undefeated in league play.

Cheltenham basketball saw the 1,000 point mark surpassed by two players in the same season for the first time ever by Jimmy Garrett '95 and Brandi Butler '96.

Jonathan Kravis '95 and Semra Mesulam '95 won Cheltenham's first-ever regional varsity debate title, defeating a nationally-ranked Jenkintown team in the finals to clinch the Southeastern Pennsylvania tournament.

The wrestling team won its first division title since 1971. Led by tri-captains Tyrone Scott '95, Rich Shoemaker '95, and two-time regional champion Kevin Brandon '95, the Panthers finished with a strong 16-2 record.

Cheltenham's performing arts boasted some champions of their own this year. Bassist

Jacob Greenberg '95 and baritone Evan Rieder '96 head off to state orchestra and chorus respectively.

Continuing its long tradition of science fair domination, Cheltenham took top honors at the Montgomery County and Delaware Valley fairs. The Class of '96 won Montco., and Jill Rappoport '96, Brendan Brennan '95, and the team of Stacey Rubin '95 and Cara Spallone '95 were all invited to present at the International Science Fair.

Over the past several years, Cheltenham's playwrighting workshop has produced many winners in the Philadelphia Young Playwright's Festival. This year, however, Jonathan Kravis '95 became the first Cheltenham student in the competition's 12-year history to win the National Young Playwright Festival.
