EIGHT INDUCTED INTO HALL OF FAME

ay 17, 1996 marked the fifth Hall of Fame Day at Cheltenham High School. The eight inductees returned to their alma mater to be honored by the Cheltenham High School Alumni Association for lifetime achievement. The new Hall of Famers spent the morning with the current student body and faculty talking to classes in their respec-

tive fields. In the afternoon a luncheon in their honor was held at the Melrose Country Club. That evening the Hall of Fame ceremony was held in the Little Theatre of the high school. Master of Richard Ceremonies Weinstock, '76 introduced each of the inductees by reading excerpts from their "diaries" while a slide show was presented. All new Hall of Fame members received their plaques from CHSAA President Betty Cataldi, '62, and gave a short acceptance speech. The festivities then moved to the high school Hall of Fame lobby where the inductees' pictures and plaques

were unveiled. Many friendships were renewed and new ones formed throughout this warm and glowing evening. Taken as a whole, the day was a huge success!

The new Cheltenham High School Alumni Association Hall of Fame inductees included these eight Cheltenham graduates. James Farquhar, '30 received his undergraduate degree from the University of
Pennsylvania. His first philanthropic action
was in the founding of the Ft. Lauderdale
Symphony, which has now grown into the

Florida Philharmonic Society and Museum of Art. He is one of the founders of Nova University, and was the first Chairman of the Board of Trustees. In 1974, he was appointed Chairman of its State Board of Independent Colleges and Universities by the governor of Florida. His philanthropic work has benefitted the University of Pennsylvania, University of Maryland, Washington and Lee University, Jacksonville University, the University of Florida, and Broward Community College. He is married to an-

Barbara Snedeker Bates, '36, attended Wellesley College in Massachusetts. After graduation she spent a year working for the Times Chronicle and the Glenside News as the "assistant everything." Her college experiences earned her a job with Westminster Press in Philadelphia as the Editor of Books for Young People. She was also able to raise a family and write eleven of her own books. Two, The Happy Birthday Present and The Happy Puppy, have even been translated into French and

German. She has taught courses at adult schools in creative writing. In 1986, Bates was honored with the sixteenth Drexel

ALUMNI ASSOCIATION AWARDS SCHOLARSHIPS

The Cheltenham High School Alumni Association, for the 18th consecutive year, has presented four graduating seniors with scholarship awards. Last year's four awards (\$500 each) bring the total amount of scholarships presented by the Alumni Association to well over \$36,000. The winners last year were Maureen E. Brown, Glenside; Matthew K. Chamberlain, Cheltenham; Erica C. Keen, Melrose Park; and Alexis A. Wetzel, Chel-

tenham.

Maureen E. Brown is the winner of the CHS Alumni Association's Louise Bers Rose Scholarship. Maureen, a true student-athlete, carried a schedule of honors history and English along with physics, French V and microbiology. She graduated with a 3.77 average and a rank of 17th in the senior class. A member of the National Honor Society, Maureen also excelled in field hockey, cross country, winter track and

soccer during her athletic career. Ms. Brown was voted the team's most valuable player by her teammates when she received the Holden Award, once in cross country and twice in soccer. She was also an All League Scholar-Athlete in soccer. During the past two years Maureen has served as assistant coach of the Hunter Soccer Club's Under 12 Travel Team. Maureen Brown is



Citation for contributions to children's literature. Currently, she lectures in creative writing at Beaver College in Glenside.

Adele Boyd, '49 has distinguished herself as an outstanding athlete and coach in the sport of field hockey. In 1953 Boyd received her undergraduate degree from Ursinus; the follow-

ing year she joined the faculty at Cheltenham as a physical education teacher and coach of the Lady Panthers' field hockey, basketball and lacrosse teams. She was a member of the Philadelphia Amateur Team from 1953 through 1967, and played on the U.S. National team from 1961 until 1967. In 1972, Boyd took over as the field hockey head coach at Ursinus, beginning a 17-year career that would include 16 winning seasons. She took the Lady Bears to three consecutive second-place finishes in the AIAW Tournament during the late 1970s. Her 1983 squad won the Eastern College Athletic Conference title. Boyd's career has earned her a place in the United States Field Hockey Association (USFHA) Hall of Fame, the Ursinus College Hall of Fame for Athletes, and the Philadelphia Chapter of the

Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame. Boyd has served as national umpire, officer, and team selector for the USFHA. Currently, Ms. Boyd is Associate Professor of Exercise and Sport Science and Associate Direc-





tor of Athletics at Ursinus College.

Dr. Winnifred Berg Cutler, '62 has strived to educate women and their doctors on female health issues. After graduating from Ursimus College, Dr. Cutler earned her Ph.D. in biology from the University of Pennsylvania in 1979, and did her postdoctoral work in behavioral endocrinol-

> ogy at Stanford University, where she founded the Stanford Menopause Study. The author of six books on women's health, Dr. Cutler cofounded the University of Pennsylvania Women's Wellness Program in 1985, and served as its first Scientific Director. Dr. Cutler founded the Athena Institute for Women's Wellness, the first program of its

Brecker left the group after a year to join the Horace Silver Quintet. With that group, Brecker recorded his first album as a leader, Score, which also featured his 19 year-old brother Michael on tenor sax. After working with Horace Silver, Brecker co-founded the two pioneering jazz/rock groups that would establish his place as one of the architects of fusion: Dreams and the Brecker Brothers. Dreams, the more short-lived of the two, recorded two adventurous and wildly acclaimed albums before they disbanded in 1971. The Brecker Brothers, however, lasted for six years, making six albums and receiving seven Grammy nominations for their innovative blend of jazz with electrified rock and funk. His trumpet performances have graced albums by James Taylor, Bruce Springsteen, and Frank Zappa. Ten years after they disbanded, the Brecker Brothers reunited to produce a

School (now the Widener University School of Law) while working for the United States General Services Administration in Washington, D.C. In his first elected post as As-

sistant District Attorney in Montgomery County, Fox aggressively prosecuted violent criminals and drug offenders from 1976 to 1980. In 1984.

Fox was sent to the Pennsylvania House of Representatives by the 153rd Legislative District. In 1991, Fox was elected to the Montgomery County Board of Commissioners. Fox is currently a member of the 105th Congress. Originally elected by Pennsylvania's 13th District in 1994, Fox serves on the Banking and Financial Services Committee, the Veterans Affairs Committee, and the Government Reform and Oversight Committee.

Michael Brecker, '67 is one of the world's most respected and versatile musicians. His unique combination of pop and

Craig Littlepage, '69 was an All-American, All-Region, and All-State basketball player at Cheltenham, who went on to play a key role in the University of Pennsylvania's

basketball team. After graduating from Penn's Wharton School of Business and Finance with a B.S. in Economics in 1973, Littlepage held assistant coaching positions at Villanova, Yale, and the University of Virginia. In 1982, Littlepage returned to his alma mater as head basketball coach where he led the Quakers to the Ivy League championship and the NCAA tournament in 1984-85. Littlepage then moved to Rutgers, and later returned to the University of Virginia. Following two years as a Virginia assistant coach, Littlepage was promoted to Assistant Athletic Director for basketball administration, and from there to Associate Director of Athletic Programs. In December of 1994 Littlepage was named

After a year at Indiana University, Brecker began his musical career in New York at eighteen years of age joining his brother Randy in the ground-breaking fusion group Dreams. letics, a position he held until July 1995, when he was again elevated, this time to Senior Associate Director for Athletic Programs. Today he is responsible for the operations of the University of Virginia's \$15 million, 24 sport athletic program.

currently attending Vassar College in Poughkeepsie, New York.

Matthew K. Chamberlain was awarded the CHS Alumni Association's Jack Wagman Scholarship. Matt is attending Carnegie-Mellon University in Pittsburgh and will major in Mechanical Engineering. While at Cheltenham, Matt carried a full load of honors and enriched subjects for four years earning an incredible 3.919 cumulative average and a weighted class rank of seven. Chamberlain was recognized by the Merit Scholarship Corporation with a Letter of Commendation. An active member of Cheltenham's instrumental music department, Matthew played oboe and bells in the concert and marching band. He was the winner of the John Philip Sousa Award as well as the Albert E. Weston Award in Language Arts and the Clopp Memorial Service Award. Matt was a medal winner in local science fair competitions, earning first place recognition twice. He also was a sports writer for the Cheltonian. Outside

Erica was a totally involved Cheltenham citizen. Co-captain of the Girls' Tennis Team and Coaches Award winner, Erica was first team All-Suburban. A member of the school's string orchestra, Erica was a member of District and Regional Orchestra. Keen was an active member of Student Council, both as a homeroom representative and as a member of the Executive Committee, where she served as chair of the Promotional Committee. She served as co-editor of the school's literary magazine, the Quintessence, as well as being a staff writer for the Cheltonian. She was a performer in the school's musicals and the talent show. Cheltenham's athletes have been winning championships at a spectacular pace. The 1995-6 Girls' Basketball Team led by all-time leading scorer Brandi Butler won Cheltenham's first District I Championship and finished in the final four of the PIAA State Championships. The track program was on the fast track last year when both the boys and girls placed second as teams in the PIAA Championships. IN MEMORIUM

Dr. Edwin B. Keim, principal of Cheltenham High School from 1954 to 1973, died at age 85 on December 23, 1996. Dr. Keim came to Cheltenham in 1954 from the Kennett Square school system where he served as a teacher and administrator. Keim will be remembered as the principal who helped plan and execute the construction of the current high school in Wyncote in 1959 and the additions in 1966. He was also responsible for maintaining the high educational standards that have become synonymous with the name of Cheltenham.

Dr. Keim served as president of the National Association of Secondary School Principals and also as president of the Headmaster's Association. Since his retirement, he served as a professor in the Graduate School of Education at Lehigh University and as a visiting professor at several other universities.

ISRAEL ELECTS CHS GRAD

he May 1996 Israeli national election marked the first direct election of a prime minister in Israel's history, and the vote was close, Benjamin Netanyahu, 1,501,023 (50.4%); Shimon Peres, 1,471,566 (49.5%). But with that vote Israel had a new Prime Minister in 1967 Cheltenham High School graduate Benjamin "Bibi" Netanyahu.

Netanyahu, who was born in Israel, came to Elkins Park with his parents and two brothers in 1963, when his father was appointed a professor at Dropsie College for Hebrew and Cognate Learning, now part of the Annenberg Research Institute. He was 13 years old and in the eighth grade at the Ogontz Jr. High. He continued his studies through Cheltenham High School as an outstanding honors student, finishing fourth in his class of 542. Leaving just before his 1967 graduation along with several classmates, "Bibi" returned to Israel to help in the Six-Day War.

He served five years as a paratrooper, being promoted to captain after the Yom Kippur War. Later, Netanyahu returned to the United States where he at-

tended MIT, earning his undergraduate and master's degree. He then returned to Israel. After his brother Jonathan's tragic death on July 4, 1976, in the commando raid on Entebbe, Uganda that freed 105 hostages, he became director of the Jonathan Institute. Named for his brother, the institute studies all aspects of terrorism, a theme that Benjamin has focused on ever since he began his public life.

From 1982 to 1984, Netanyahu served as Israel's deputy ambassador to the United States in Washington. He was appointed ambassador to the United Nations in 1984, a position he held for four years. He resigned to return to Israel to run for the Knesset, Israel's parliament.
