
A donation of \$50 was received in memory of Frank Newberger and Herbert Barness from Louise Bers Rose, '33.

SPORTS SHORTS the year in review

Il of Cheltenham's teams found great success this past year whether or not it was reflected in the won-loss column. The fall season was highlighted by the outstanding performance of the Boys' Cross Country Team under Coach Tom Sexton. The team had the best record in school history posting a perfect 11-0 record in league competition. They swept the Suburban I Championships and finished fifth in the District I race which qualified them for the PIAA State Tournament. At States the team finished tenth, the best finish in Cheltenham history.

On the gridiron, the football team entered the traditional Abington-Cheltenham game with a 7-4 record. Heading into the fourth quarter, the Panthers trailed the Ghosts by 13 points. The Chelts staged a major comeback

scoring 13 points to tie the game. The last touchdown came with just 43 seconds remaining in regulation. In the first overtime game in the 79 game series, sophomore Brandon Johns booted a 20-yard field goal for the thrilling 23-20 Cheltenham victory.

In the winter, the Boys' Basketball team, under Coach Scott Eveslage, '86 made the District I playoffs and crushed Abington 71-53 in the first round before falling in the second round to finish 18-7. On the mats, senior Max Galka won a District I wrestling championship, finished third at Regionals and qualified for states. Max, coached by Perry Lederman, '87, finished the season with an impressive 32-3 record. But the winter season once again belonged to the Lady Panther Basketball team. The team clinched their 13th consecutive Suburban I League

Championship. They followed this with a dramatic 59-58 win over defending state champions Dowingtown for the District I Championship. Led by All-State senior point guard Stacey Smalls, the Panthers made it to the State Championship game at Hershey Arena for the first time in school history. There the team lost a heartbreaking 62-56 game to Upper Saint Clair to finish with an outstanding 28-2 record. Along the way, Coach Robert Schaefer notched win 400 in his 18-year career at Cheltenham.

Spring brought a Suburban I Championship to our Boys' Tennis team. In addition, David Gary, leaped into the Cheltenham track record book by capturing a Suburban I Championship, placing in districts and picking up a fifth place medal at the PIAA Championship in the triple jump.
