OPERATION RECOGNITION BEGINS

Cheltenham High School Diploma from principal Joseph Rodgers on Tuesday, November 13, 2001. Although Mr. Rodgers has awarded thousands of diplomas in his years as principal, this one was a first. Mr. Gentile was awarded his diploma 57 years after his class, the Cheltenham Class of 1944, was graduated. The reason for the delay and the special ceremony at a school board meeting was a new Pennsylvania law. Act 73, entitled the Veterans' High School Diplomas Act, established the Operation Recognition program. This program authorizes local school districts to grant high

school diplomas to any honorably discharged veterans who served in the U.S. military in World War II between September 16, 1940, and December 31, 1946. These eligible vets are members of high school graduating classes that were graduated between 1941 through 1950, but did not receive diplomas due to their entering military service. Under the law, the board of school directors may establish an application process for awarding such a diploma.

Brad plays Gregg Glass, the older brother of a loser young man who keeps going back in time to his high school days to correct the flaws in his life that have led him to loserdom. 
NEW SCHOLARSHIP


SPORT SHORTS the year in review

heltenham High School athletes once again excelled on the fields and on the courts during the 2001-2002 athletic schedule. Here are some of the highlights.

Total Domination are the only words that describe the Cheltenham girls tennis team and their play in the Suburban I Liberty Division this season. Coached by Mr. Tom Deiley and Mr. Lew Wisnoff, 76, the Lady Panthers captured the League title for the third consecutive year. Their four singles players ran the table going undefeated in all the regular team matches compiling an impressive 56-0 record on their way to a 16-1 final record. Their lone defeat came in the semifinal of the District I Team Tournament with a hard-fought 3-4 loss to Council Rock.

The football team completed one of the most successful seasons in the school's history, but the final two games took off some of the luster for the hard-working players. The Chelts finished the regular season with a 10-I record having completed their league schedule with a second place finish in the Suburban I, American Conference, Liberty Division behind Quakertown, the only team to have beaten the Panthers. This great record qualified Cheltenham for the second seed in the PIAA Class AAAA subregional playoffs. The team did not disappoint their fans as they rolled to a 21-14 victory over the visiting seventh-ranked Abington Heights Comets. This was the first tournament win for the Panthers in school history, their having qualified for the post season only once. That game was a set back to Plymouth Whitemarsh back in 1995.

Cheltenham's football team wrote a storybook ending for their PIAA Class AAAA subregional semifinal game on Saturday, November 17, 2001. Unfortunately, the Pioneers of Conestoga cut short the Chelts come-from-behind story and handed Cheltenham a 34-31 double overtime loss. The Panthers trailed 28-14 with 9:32 remaining in the fourth quarter when the heroics began. Chris Hawkins, senior quarterback, led the team on a nine-play, 70-yard drive that ended with a Norman Raison four-yard plunge with just 5:01 remaining. A failed on-sides kick left the Pioneers in great field

position, but the Cheltenham defense stiffened and forced a punt. Starting from their own 14 yard line with 3:21 remaining on the game clock, the Panthers advanced, led by senior running back Jesse Patterson (who scored his second touchdown of the day from the four yard line with only 55 seconds left in regulation).

In the first overtime, senior Matt Litman kicked a 27-yard field goal which was matched by Conestoga on their possession; score tied at 31. In the second overtime, Conestoga was forced to kick a 32-yard field goal that just made it over the crossbar to put the Pioneers up by three. Cheltenham got to the three when a Hawkins pass was tipped at the line and intercepted by a diving Conestoga player, ending the game. Physical exhaustion finally caught up with the Cheltenham Football team in their traditional Thanksgiving game with Abington, dropping the contest 32-26. The Chelts, playing on pure emotion after the previous Saturday's double overtime loss to Conestoga, built a 20-6 lead in the second quarter but could not sustain the effort. They finished the season with an 11-3 and some big records for senior running back Jesse Patterson. The Georgetown-bound running

back is the all-time leading career rusher in

Cheltenham history having surpassed the 2975 career yards of Jamy Smith, 95. In

the Abington Heights game, Patterson broke the single season rushing record held by

Chad Levitt, 93, of 1620 yards.

Both the boys soccer team (16-6-1) and the boys cross-country team (9-2) finished the season strongly and placed second in the league standings. The boys basketball team also had an outstanding season. Turning what was supposed to be a rebuilding year into a winning season, the Chelts won the Cavalry Christian Tournament and the Hazleton Holiday Tournament. The team, coached by Scott Eveslage, 89, finished the season 16-9. The boys tennis team also completed a great season winning the Suburban I Championship

The Lady Panthers Basketball Team continued the incredible success of previous teams. Led by two senior thousand-point scorers, Andrea Jones and Rachel Laws and senior forward Kelly Gould, the team climbed
