In the evening the inductees returned to the high school and the newly created Student Center (formally known as the "Quad") where over 150 friends, relatives,

The ceremony, which was run by Master of Ceremony Richard Weinstock *76, was the culmination of a full day of activities for the inductees. The seven inductees arrived at the high school in the morning and were greeted by Alumni Board members, Cheltenham H.S. Principal Joseph Rodgers and members of the Student Council.

After a tour of the newly renovated high school, the graduates attended classes that matched their fields of interest. There they spoke to current Cheltenham students about their life experiences both at Cheltenham and post-high school. Both students and local dignitaries and classmates watched as each inductee was presented with their Hall of Fame plaque by Charles Stamm '67 Hall of Fame Chairperson. Alumni Association President Betty Cataldi '62 welcomed the visitors. She then introduced Joseph Rodgers and Acting Superintendent Christopher McGinley who extended their greetings to the inductees and their guests.

The evening ended with the dedication and unveiling of the newly constructed Hall of Fame wall in the school's lobby. n Tuesday, May 6, 2003, Myers students, faculty, alumni community celebrated the school's 80th anniversary. Approximately 450 people arrived at the school to reminisce about their days at Myers, some from as far away as Chicago. Decades of memorabilia were on display throughout the building for all the visitors to view. Henry Weis of Elkins Park, who attended Myers in 1933, expressed how he had such vivid memories of the school. Gail Taffin, a 1950 Myers graduate, class of 1956 (CHS) graduate, and 15-year art teacher at Elkins Park Middle School also had fond memories of Myers. Current students entertained the attendees by singing the Myers Elementary school song. Each classroom made something to place in a time capsule that will be opened during the 100th anniversary.

The Township commissioners recognized June 4th as "Cheltenham Elementary School Day."

Salvatore "Sam" Rizzo '55, who has been honored in the past by the Greater Glenside Chamber of Commerce, owns SRJ Catering in Glenside, PA.

Richard Bank '65 has two books currently published: Why Be Jewish? A Guide for Discovering and Maintaining Jewish Traditions and Values and The Everything Judaism Book: A Complete Primer to the Jewish Faith from Holidays and Rituals to Traditions and Culture. A graduate of University of Pennsylvania Law School, Bank practiced law for many enjoyable years but is now happy to be able to focus more on writing on matters that are close to his heart.

Samuel Stern '67, a Math teacher at CHS, is a professional photographer who shares his talent in the CHS community by photographing the Hall of Fame and Alumni scholarship winners each year.

Margaret "Maggie" Friedman '92 cowrote the final episode of *Dawson's Creek* (aired May, 2003 on the WB) with the series' creator, Kevin Williamson.

Thomas Feeney III '76 was sworn into the 166th U. S. Congress in January 2003. He won the seat in the U.S. House of Representatives after serving in the Florida House of Representatives for 12 years, the last 2 of those years as Speaker.

Michael Brown, M.D. '58, a Cheltenham Hall of Fame winner and Nobel Prize winner, received the \$500,000 Albany Medical Center Prize (second only in monetary value to the Nobel Prize) with his research partner, Joseph Goldstein for their work on cholesterol. They originally discovered that human body cells have receptors that determine how much cholesterol circulates in the blood. The recent research found how a family of proteins regulates the amount of cholesterol by controlling LDL receptors, and their discovery of an insulin-sensitive regulator that holds promise in treating a rare form of diabetes.

Dara Shender-Trager '90 is a Doctor of Chiropractics and lives in Texas. Miles Shore '62 is a partner in the law firm of Saul Ewing, LLP in Philadelphia, PA. He is also the father of 3 daughters, all CHS graduates.

Andrew Schloss '69 is President of Culinary Generations, Inc. and the International Association of Culinary Professionals. His eighth cookbook, Almost From Scratch: The New Home Cooking, is out this summer. He still resides in Elkins Park with his family.

Mark Harnitchek '73 was promoted to Rear Admiral in the U.S. Navy and is the new commanding officer of the Naval Inventory Control Point here in Philadelphia. His 25+ year naval career has taken him to Florida, Virginia, Connecticut, South Carolina, California, Guam and Japan. It's nice to have him back home.

2002 Hall of Fame inductee, Judge Richard S. Lowe '42 has retired from the Montgomery County Court. During his college career he served for two years in Europe during World War II, where he received three battle stars. graduating from Temple University Law School, Judge Lowe worked his way up the ranks going from private practice, to deputy attorney general, to assistant district attorney, to county district attorney and finally to the bench. During his 35 years in the Montgomery County court, he has been a driving force behind computerizing the county court system and making the juror system more efficient and tolerable for potential jurors.

Michelle Mostovy-Eisenberg '98 recently graduated from the News Writing and Reporting Fellowship program at the Poynter Institute of Media Studies in St. Petersburg, FL.

Dr. William G. Mattox '48 and his research have been instrumental in the Peregrine Falcon being removed from the national endangered species list. For the past 31 years, he has taken volunteer teams to Northern Greenland where, after a 15 mile backpacking hike, they climb cliffs, band the birds, take blood samples, and attach radios to their backs so that telemetry

can be used to determine their flight and breeding patterns. All of this research was done on Dr. Mattox's own time while working for the Ohio Department of Natural Resources. Dr. Mattox is now retired in Boise, Idaho and is the Research/ Editorial Associate with the Archives of American Falconry and is President of the Conservation Research Foundation.

Rebecca Creskoff '88 plays the wife/ mother on the WB's comedy *Greetings From Tucson*. In August, she can be seen in Strindberg's play *Miss Julie* at the Berkshire Theater Festival.

Bill Koutsouros '93 and Don Dinkin '92, both in the world music band Animus, are becoming local celebrities as they gain both notice and praise by being asked to play live on NBC 10's morning show, "10!" and by being nominated for the past three years by Philadelphia's City Paper as best Roots/World music performer. 

Sport Shorts: the year in review

Cheltenham High School athletes once again excelled on the fields and on the courts during the 2002-2003 athletic schedule. Here are some of the highlights.

The Cheltenham girls' tennis team, coached by Mr. Tom Deiley and Mr. Lew Wisnoff '76, captured the Suburban I Liberty Division title for the fourth consecutive year. Led by junior Emily Levy at first singles and seniors Zabrina Noyes and Debbie Norris, the team compiled a 9-3 record

The boys' swimming team, led by senior captain Alex Goldberg, amassed an 11-4 record, including a big 101-84 victory over Abington. At the Suburban I League Championships the boys finished a strong third out of 12 teams. In the water, sophomore Dong Kim paced the team, taking an 8th place in the 100 freestyle at the PIAA State Championships.

The football team completed a winning season in what was supposed to be a rebuilding year. Finishing with a 7-5 record, the team completed the season with a 14-7 victory over rival Abington. All of the points were scored in the first quarter: The Panthers jumped out to a 14-7 lead and held on to that score until the final whistle. In a game delayed from Saturday until Monday due to rain, Cheltenham's speedy running backs had little trouble getting traction on the muddy Cheltenham field. Senior Sam Tarlo rushed for 104 yards while Junior Marcus Fonts added

39 yards and one touchdown. But the star of the day was Junior Ryan Williams who, with the score knotted at seven, returned an Abington kickoff 88 yards up the left sideline for the winning margin. Cheltenham then played tough defense for the rest of the game. Abington pushed into the red zone three times, only to be turned back each time with no points.

The boys' basketball team also had an outstanding season. The team, coached by Scott Eveslage '89, finished the season 23-7 and took second place in the Suburban I. They advanced to the PIAA playoffs before falling to a tough Coatesville team 46-44. Seniors Brandon Hector, Gary Vaincouer and Vaughn Tinsley brought experience while Sophomore Harris Mansell led all scorers.

The Lady Panthers Basketball Team continued the incredible success of

previous teams. With a team that featured no seniors, the Lady Panthers won the Suburban I Championship for the 17th consecutive year, were District I runner-up and made it to the elite eight of the PIAA State Championships before losing to state runner-up Downingtown. The girls finished the season with a 27-5 record. Coach Robert Schaefer recorded his 500th career victory with the team's first win of the season. Junior center Laura Harper was named to the All-State Team and has gained national recognition as she enters her senior year.

The boys' tennis team completed another outstanding season winning the Suburban I Championship for the fourth consecutive year. Alex Rosenthal led a senior dominated team in a sweep of the league.

On the track, Junior Maressa Pinzini broke records and brought home two state medals. In cross country, Pinzini finished 9th in the state, defeating all District I runners. In Spring track she set a new school record in the 800 meter run with a time of 2: 12.48, which made her an All-American. This is also the first time since Colleen Hackett '82 that a Cheltenham runner won two medals at two different PIAA Championships. Maressa was coached in the spring by John D'Anjou '96.

This year's *men's cross country* team completed another successful season by compiling an 8-3 record and finishing second in their division.
