MUN Patterned After United Nations

D-day is here! After three months of preparation, the Model United Nations has actually arrived. Committee meetings will begin today at 3:30 and last until 8:30.

Bothell's M.U.N., patterned after the U.N. in New York, will be composed of the eleven country Security Council, the General Assembly, and four main committees under the General Assembly--Political and Security, Economic and Financial, Social, Cultural and Humanitarian, and Trusteeship. Resolutions submitted to the General Assembly must pass through their respective committees before actual consideration in plenary session.

Resolutions may also be submitted to the Security Council, but they will only be checked by the Secretariat for reality and accuracy before being considered by Council members. At the same time committees meet, the Security Council will convene in the Little Theater. Countries represented at the meetings will be the five permanent members (with veto rights)--China, France, the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, the United Kingdom, and the United States of America. Non-permanent members will be Ceylon, Chile, Ecuador, Liberia, Turkey, and the United Arab Republic. The veto, used only by permanent members, cannot be applied to procedural matters in the Security Council.

Committee meetings will be held in the old and new cafeteriums, the library, and the main study hall, according to announcements.

In the General Assembly, each country will have one vote. A 2/3 majority will be needed to pass any resolution before the Assembly. Parliamentary procedure and the United Nations charter (mimeographed last week and available to all delegates) will be followed in all committees, the Security Council, and the General Assembly.

When the General Assembly discusses the resolutions passed in the committees, discussion will be carried on by the chairmen of each delegation, the official ambassadors to the Model United Nations.

Total speaking parts will number approximately 500, and ninety countries will be represented (see list). Committee chairmen will be: Committee #1, Jerry Rettig; Committee #2, Jeff Dean; Committee #3, Bob Koontz; and Bob LaBoey will preside over Committee #4.

Steve Mladineo, senior, will be General Assembly president during all sessions, representing the position that Charles F. Boland, of Ireland, has in the New York United Nations. Steve has been named an honorary member of the M.U.N. Ireland delegation. He will be accepted by the General Assembly at its first session, Monday, May 8th.

Security Council presiding officer will be Ann Harvey, of Ecuador.

Today is the day for committee meetings. Resolutions that have been okayed by the Secretariat for reality and accuracy, and that have been revised from committee discussions, will be debated, and then voted upon in the four committees. Those that pass will go on to further discussion in the General Assembly.

The Assembly will officially open Monday, May 8th, at 3:30. Flags will be presented, Invocations given, and speeches made during the first part of this session.

Each resolution passed Friday in committee meetings will have a majority speaker and a minority speaker, who will speak for and against the proposal. General debate will then be possible before the final vote.

Judging will begin at the official Assembly opening. Five persons will judge on content, five on speaking ability, and five on knowledge of parliamentary procedure. A trophy will be awarded to the delegation that is judged as most effectively and realistically representing their country. It will have each delegate's name inscribed on it, and will be a permanent trophy at Bothell High School.

Giving introductory speeches will be the countries of Afghanistan, Brazil, the Congo Republic, Peru and Sweden. The topic, chosen by the Secretariat, is "Disarmament."

Tuesday, M.U.N. participants will again attend committee meetings at 12:30 until 3:30. Then the General Assembly will convene. The last session will adjourn around 9 o'clock.

Dinner time each of the three days will be 5:30 to 6:15. Lunches will be eaten in the cafeterium; tunaburger for Friday, and pizza and spaghetti for the other two days. Doughnuts and coffee will also be sold.

Editorial

An Undying Purpose . .

What, exactly, is the purpose of Bothell High School's Model United Nations?

An activity of the magnitude and character of the Model United Nations benefits each participant in many ways. "Education through Experience," the theme of the activity, explains the general purpose of the M.U.N., and one benefit gained from all who prepare to take part in it--education.

In preparing for the M.U.N., a student will become more informed on the purpose of the United Nations as a world organization, and realize more fully the extent of its accomplishments. Also, he will become familiar with the problems and goals of the U.N., making him more aware of world situations today. Awareness will also be gained in the organs and agencies of the U.N.

Actual working experience will be gained in research, composition, and speaking. Research includes a thorough study of the United Nations, its charter, parliamentary procedure, the student's country and its position in the world today.

Dag Hammarskjold, Secretary-General of the United Nations, explained the purpose of the United Nations and each individual's connection to that purpose when he said--

"Students and teachers in all countries can work directly for the cause of the United Nations by helping to deepen public understanding of the need for concerted action to meet the great challenge of our times--mastery of the hard task of learning to live together in peace with one another as good neighbors, steadfast partners in the building of a better world."

The Model United Nations constitutes a big step towards this goal.

Industrious Thirteen Plan, Organize MUN

Organizing, supervising and deputizing the Model United Nations have been the main objectives of the Secretariat, a central committee doing most of the planning and caring for all the details. It is composed of 13 students.

Secretary General is Rich Edmonds, senior. He is the over-all chairman of Secretariat activities, in charge of coordinating the work of the five sub-committees, Arrangements, Communications, Credentials, Decorations, and Publicity. Serving as secretary is Linda Kremer, junior.

Working on Arrangements are Judy Asbury, senior and Sue Burnett, sophomore. They have been securing flags, setting up the signs, and determining the floor plan, or the locations of delegations.

Contacting country dele-

gations, passing out publications, printing resolutions, and processing outlines, lists, and reports for the M.U.N. have been the responsibility of Gary Fuller and Sue Stevens, juniors, and Bill Fasset and Dale Irmischer, freshmen.

Each delegation and each delegate will be checked for credentials by Anne Prideaux, senior. An official badge will represent a delegate's credentials. The top and bottom of these badges are lined with colors to denote the job of the participant. Pages will have red; the Secretariat, light blue; the press, green; faculty, black; and delegation chairmen will receive dark blue.

Pam Strand, senior, and Joy Shew and Sandy Asbury, sophomores, have taken care of Decorations. They have been in charge of making flags, and okaying delegation costumes.

Sue Levine, junior, has been writing to magazines and finding other means for publicizing the M.U.N. Included in publicity plans are a brief review over television, and a M.U.N. story in the Times Pictorial.

Tickets will be sold to observers over 12 years old for \$.50. One ticket will admit its holder to all official M.U.N. functions.

Programs will include an M.U.N. schedule, officials, M.U.N.'s purpose, committee members and chairmen, and delegation chairmen and members.

For use during the General Assembly, each delegation will be provided with a country standard and recognition sign.

Sargeant-at-arms will be Rod Van Lierop, chairman, Jim Bennettson, Dick Hall, Emma Helgeson, Dick Shroeder, Nick Bullard, Mark Amundson, and Skip Christ. They have been asked to wear dark trousers, white shirts, blue ties, and arm bands. Pages, not chosen at the printing of this paper, will be wearing uniform dress.

The Secretariat has invited the Rev. Baugh, the Rev. Bell, Pastor Root, and Pastor Williams, from community churches, to give invocations at General Assembly sessions.

Ninety Nations Represented

Bothell's Model United Nations will include the representation of ninety countries, involving 450 delegates. Each delegation is composed of a chairman, and four persons to represent their country in each of the four committees.
