
SERVICE NOTES

First Lieut. Sydney Meade was wounded Sept. 16th, and is now recovering in England. He is a graduate of Central and attended Notre Dame. He participated in D-Day operations and is a wearer of the Purple Heart medal.

Robert A. Jordan, who graduated in 1941 from Central, died September 24, from wounds. An infantry man, he had served overseas since May, 1944.



CONSISTENCY

Bears Trample Over Blue Blazers In Final Game

33-6 VICTORY GIVES TEAM SIX WINS AND THREE LOSSES

After getting off to a slow start Central's Bears came through to crush the Elkhart Blue Blazers 33-6 on Rice Field last Friday evening.

This contest was the final game of the season for both teams and was marked by Central's sparkling line play and brilliant backfield running and passing. The victory gave Coach Crowe's boys a season tally of six triumphs against three losses.

The Blazers drew first blood by virtue of Jim Hollibaugh's touch-down scoot early in the first quarter. The Bears smashed back to roll up 20 points in the next period after failing to enter Elkhart territory in the first quarter.

The Bruins rolled up 13 more points in the last half thanks to the backfield running and heaving of Posey Flowers and Joe Deranek. Although Morrical failed to score he played a great game.

Elkhart made one more first down than Central but the Orange and Blue far outdistanced the Blazers in the yards gained department, 339 to 192. Central suffered 90 yards of loss due to penalties.

Central's 1944 gridiron season is a thing of the past now and everyone is looking forward to the hardwood season. Let's look over the record.

The first Bear tussle was with Washington of East Chicago. Central won this one 15 to 7. Central won again in the next game with Adams. Morrical scored the only tally in the game and converted to win 7-0.

The old green plague hit Central next and the Panthers rolled up a 27-13 victory before the largest crowd of the season.

The following week the Bears bowed to a powerful Emerson squad, 21-0.

Central walked onto the Proviso field as the under-dog but came back off victorious 20-7.

Michigan City was the next victim of the Bears and the Red Devils were trounced 28-12 to remove them from the undefeated list. After a week of rest the Bears met and defeated Mishawaka at Notre Dame 19-12.

Central's third and last defeat came when Riley shut out the Bears 13-0. This tussle spoiled Bears' chances for capturing second place in the conference as Riley took over these honors.

As a grand finale. Central trounced Elkhart's Blue Blazers 33-6 and this final contest gave the Bears six victories and three losses for a season percentage of .666.

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
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
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
