
CIRO To Add Members

Pepsi-Cola Awards Offered

Seniors are invited to compete for the four-year scholarships offered by the Pepsi-Cola Company. This third nation-wide scholarship competition is being extended to high school seniors throughout the United States and territories, giving them the opportunity to win one of the 121 liberal four-year scholarships or one of the 600 fifty-dollar certificates of merit. Two scholarships and at least ten certificates will be presented to Indiana entrants. Winners of the awards will be chosen on the basis of their scholastic aptitude, school record, leadership qualities, and financial needs. Each full scholarship includes full tuition and certain incidental fees to any accredited college plus a \$25 monthly allowance and traveling expenses for one round trip from home to college each year. Fifty-dollar awards will be given to runner-ups of the scholarships payable when they enter college.

Students wishing to take this special test should see Mr. Fulwider. All names of entrants must be in before December 20. Central students will take the test on Friday, February 14. Winners of these Pepsi-Cola scholarships will be announced April 18.

International Relations Council has merged with the East-West Association and has announced the series for this year. General Victor A. Yakhontoff, first of the speakers listed, will speak on "Foreign Policy of the U.S. S. R." on Sunday, November 24, at 4 p. m. On Thursday, December 12, at 8 p. m. James G. McDonald will discuss "Problems of the New East." Third on the series is J. Raymond Tiffany who will speak on February 10, "Mutual Understanding Among Peoples"; fourth lecture is Ewart Edmund Turner who will speak March 3 on "Germany's Future." April 3 marks the last speaker, Grove Patterson, and his lecture on "America's Role in the Orient."

In addition to the regular series, extra meetings will be held throughout the year when speakers with appropriate topics are available. These meetings will be open to members of the Council without further charge. Membership cards for this fourteenth annual series are two dollars for adults and may be secured at the Y. W. C. SMILERS OBTAIN BURNHAM FOR FOOTBALL BANQUET

The Smiler's annual banquet in honor of the Central football team, due to the prohibitive price of meals in the local hotels, will be held in the Central lunch room, next Tuesday, November 19th at six o'clock.

The meal will include roast turkey, mashed potatoes, frozen peas, tossed salad, pumpkin pie and a drink. After this real old fashioned turkey dinner the diners will have as their chief speaker, Elmer Burnham, coach of football at the University of Rochester. Coach Burnham guided Central's last state championship grid team before he resigned at Central to coach at Purdue. Other speakers will include Principal P. D. Pointer, Coaches Jones and Dal Sasso, Supt. Frank E. Allen, and others.

1666 ATTEND CENTRAL

Mr. Merlin Richard, assistant principal in charge of attendance, has reported that during the first nine week period accumulated enrollment at Central reached 1757. There were 91 withdrawals during that period making the present enrollment 1666. Nine of those who dropped out went to other schools, five moved within the state, nine moved out of the state. two quit because of illness, nine quit when they became 16 years of age, and 47 left for other reasons including marriage, military service, and going to college. Mr. Richard also announced that attendance is 1% beter than it was early in the period and last semester.

MIDSEMESTER HONOR ROLL

The midsemester honor rolls, just released by Head Counselor C. O. Fulwider, carry the names of 139 of Central's 1666 enrolled students. Of this number on the distinguished lists 82 were girls and 57 were boys. Perhaps a record has been established since no students in either the 9A or 8A were found on any of the three honor rolls.

Central's Bears finished their 1946 football season last Friday night when they defeated Fort Wayne, North Side, 26-6, on the North Sider's field. The team, including nine seniors playing their last game for Central, had looked forward to an easy victory. The North Side boys had different ideas, however, and played the Bruins to a standstill in the first half.

The first time Central took the ball they marched to the North Side oneyard line where they were held for downs. It wasn't long, though, before the Bears hit pay-dirt, a pass from Dick Flowers to Sam Winston put Central out in front, 6-0. It looked as if Central was going to have a field day in the scoring columns. But North Side stiffened on defense, and in the second quarter Norb Cowan, the North Sider's main ground-gainer, reeled off a 66-yard sprint to tie the score 6-6. Cowan was injured in the third quarter, and his loss considerably weakened the Fort Wayne

Start Rolling in Third

Central rolled ahead in the third frame on a Flowers-Ring pass, good for 22 yards and six points. Two more scores in the final stanza sewed up the contest for Central. The first of these was scored by Flowers on a one-yard plunge, and the last was on a pass from "Posey" to Ring.

The Bears gained four times as much yardage as Fort Wayne, Wayman Redding's running was a spark plug in Bears' attack. He and big Pat Hagerty will be the only regulars back next year.

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BEAR FACTS

END OF THE FOOTBALL SEASON

The Central Bruins wound up their 1946 scheduled gridiron season by shellacking North Side 26-6 on the latter's field. This left the record for Central at seven wins and one tie. Records like this



aren't sent by just any team! It took the coaching of Jones and Dal Sasso plus the spark of each member of the squad to run up such a total.

The Central team was left in undisputed possession of second spot in

the conference standings. Only the Slicers, from over Laporte way, who had nine straight wins to their credit, rose above the "Orange and Blue." This might have read different had Laporte been pitted against the strength of Central or of South Bend Washington, two of the stronger teams in the conference loop.

First on the long list of victims falling before the power of the Bears was the traditional opposition of East Chicago Washington, who succumbed to the score of 26-12.

After winning their initial tilt of the season, the Central aggregation went on to meet the Eagles of S. B. Adams, taking the score 32-6.

Washington's Green Wave then stymied the home team with a 6-6 tie. this being the only blotch on the Bruins' record.

The following week the Bears were victorious over Coach Frieda's boys from Chicago Lakeview, 33-0.

Fourth victory of the season came when the home eleven shut out Michigan City's Red Imps, 31-0.

Some 15,000 fans at Notre Dame stadium, on October 26, saw the crushing power of the Bears roll over the Cavemen of nearby Mishawaka, in a surprising close battle which ended 34-24.

Last of the cities' teams to bow before Bruin brawn was the Riley eleven who took a 25-6 pounding.

Central then traveled to Fort Wayne to play their last tilt of the season. There, the North Side boys took a slashing to the tune of 26-6.

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Cubskin recently had a short talk with Coach Jones on the subject of Central's football team, present and future. In the opinion of Mr. Jones, when asked what he considered was the best played game on Central's schedule this year, there was only one answer, the Riley game. He also said that the finest all around battle this season, was the tilt against Washington.

Mr. Jones said that a big factor in the making of the fine record that Central has, was the wonderful spirit on the part of each player, not only on the field, but in the school as well.


