
1959 Elections Planned By FTA

Three Cheers for Our School System

Vice President Nixon's recent good-will trip to various South American countries, which has unfortunately precipitated dangerous riots, has a definite message for the students of Central. It is a tribute to the educational system of America, of which Central is an integral part, and a tribute to the effectiveness of this system as opposed to the effectiveness of systems in foreign countries, especially South America's.

In American educational institutions, students have impressed upon them the importance of respecting visiting dignitaries, even though these may be from countries which adhere to different beliefs than ours. There are certain individuals, to be sure, who will not respect these people, but they are few, and a few individuals do not constitute a mob, such as that in Lima, or that in Caracas, both largely made up of high school and college students. The riot at Lima was even instigated by college students, and although the president and professors apologized, the damage has been done, and the reputation of the school has suffered immeasurably. The riot at Caracas was not started by, but was actively supported and joined in by, students.

In America, this just does not happen. America's democratic government has formed a school system that teaches that important people in other countries should be treated as such while visiting our country, and teaches it well enough that people understand why and simply take it for granted. This is not just a matter concerning protocol, but one concerning the rights of man everywhere.

Miss Frick And Mr. Kottolowski Bid Farewell To Days At Central

The close of this year brings with it the end of a long association with some of Central's most honored teachers. Miss Agnes Frick and Mr. Harold E. Kottolowski have rendered many fine years of service here. They now plan to journey on, leaving memories of their excellent teaching in each respective field of English and of music.

Miss Frick has been the head of the English department for ten years. Entering Central in the field of dramatics, she progressed into speech and English classes.

Born in Missouri, Miss Frick attended a college there, then enrolled in others, including the University of Chicago, University of Iowa, Columbus University in Chicago, and Northwestern. Miss Frick has both a Bachelor of Arts

degree and a Master's degree. After attending Northwestern, she moved to South Bend and became one of Central's faculty.

Greatly Advanced Music

Music! Music! Music! is the theme of Mr. "K's" career. The Central High School orchestra has been an outstanding one since the advent of Mr. Harold E. Kottolowski. The orchestra has garnered, together with the Junior High District orchestra, eleven superior-rating plaques, and six excellent ones from the annual contests. This was accomplished under the direction of Mr. "K," as his students call him.

"I have enjoyed the courtesy and friendliness of the student body and the faculty here very much. Without their wonderful cooperation, instrumental music could not have succeeded."

Been at Central 11 Years

Mr. Kottolowski has directed the orchestra at Central for eleven years. He recalled the number of his first year orchestra students with a tinge of amusement; only three string players were enrolled. This original number has grown to the size of about 50 players.

Three students have entered the South Bend Symphony orchestra and two are currently in the Elkhart Symphony orchestra from

Central's orchestra.

Two professional instrumentalist graduates are Dave Niver, playing the clarinet and bassoon, and Bob Hamilton playing the piano and bassoon.

Mr. Kottolowski intends to direct the orchestra at Riley High School. The identity of the new director at Central has not been determined.

Mr. Kottolowski plays all string instruments and some of the wind ones. This is one of the requirements for orchestra teachers in high school.

Orchestra Used For Many Occasions

Mr. Kottolowski, popular and well-liked by all, will be missed as one of the finest orchestra teachers. The orchestra has been used for many occasions; plays, musicals, concerts, contests, and graduations.

As Mr. "K" puts it, "Central, with its cosmopolitan student body, furnishes a fine background for cooperations from all types of students."

Central will suffer a loss from the departures of Miss Frick and Mr. Kottolowski, but will undoubtedly gain two fine new teachers to fill the missing places. Although we "bid them farewell," we promise that they will always be welcome visitors within Central's portals.


Senior Pins Given At Yearly Concert

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BEAR QUALIFIERS FOR STATE MEET

Bruins Qualify Six Plus Relay; Take City Event

Our South Bend Central Bears tracksters, sporting their first regional track championship ever, qualified six individuals and the half miles relay squad for the trip to Indianapolis and the state track championships tomorrow. The finals are slated for 12:30 p.m. at Tech Field in the Capital City.

Main opposition to the title-hopeful Bears at the big Hoosier meet is an overstocked Terre Haute Gerstmeier squad. The Black Cats qualified ten track and field stars plus the all important factors in the persons of both relay quarters. Indianapolis Tech, Kokomo, and Indianapolis Howe also matched Jim Early's Bears numerically speaking with six individuals and one relay team.

Central athletes who qualified for the state meet were Mel Ross in 100 and 220, placing first and second respectively in those events, Dave Underly and Jim Love in the pole vault, Cassell Ross in the broad jump, and John T. West in the 100-yard dash.

Mel Ross, star senior sprinter, captured the 100-yard dash in :10.0 while Underly, unbeaten this campaign, soared 12' 3 1/2" to easily capture the pole vault. The Bears' 880-yard relay squad captured its event in a superlative time of 1:31.8.

Coach Early is hopeful of entertaining a state champ but is predicting no such outcome. However, he did say that he felt that Ross, Underly, and the 880-yard relay quartet had good chances for individual state championships.

Herman Knox of Gerstmeier was the only dash man in the century to match Mel Ross's :10.0 time, but Underly was topped by two vaulters, Dave Gibson of Muncie Central at 12' 7 1/2" and Rich Miller of Fort Wayne South Side at 12' 4". The brilliant half mile performance of Mel Ross, Cassell Ross, Joe Winston, and John T. West, was offset by an even better performance by Indianapolis Tech which posted a time of 1:31.6.

Defending champs favored once again to cop state individual crowns are Art De Bow, a :50.1 man in the 440-yard dash, Charlie Hall of Gerstmeier, co-champ last year with LeRoy Johnson in the high jump, Fort Wayne North's Tom Seifert in the shot put, and Russ Lash in the mile run. However, Lash will meet up with stiff competition from Detroit Spencer of Crispus Attucks, who beat him in the Indianapolis regional last Saturday.

BEARS WIN CITY

At the city track meet last Tuesday at Notre Dame the Bears coasted to an easy victory, taking eight first place medals. It was Coach Early's fifth straight city championship.

Winners for Central were Mell Ross in the 100- and 220-yard dashes with the very good times of :10.1 and :21.9, respectively, Richard Greene in the 440 and a tie in the high jump, Willie Wilson in the mile run, half-miler Gene Carnes, broad jumper Cassell Ross, Dave Underly in the pole vault, and the half-mile relay squad. Underly broke the city record with a spectacular leap of 12 feet and 7 1/2 inches.

Arvester Brooks of Washington added another highlight to the evening at Cartier Field with a fast-stepping :20.3 in the 180-yard low hurdles for another city record. The meet was principally a tune-up for the Bears for tomorrow's state meet.

South Bend Central teams have established quite an outstanding record this past 1957-58 season. The Bruins have amassed (excluding spring sports), sixty wins and only fifteen losses. The wrestling, football, basketball and track teams won or shared their conference crowns.

No Central team went through its entire season undefeated, although Coach Powers' tennis squad lost only one match and the wrestling team, under Coach Szucs, dropped one match also. The wrestlers, incidentally, were undefeated in state competition, as their defeat came at the hands of Calumet City from Illinois. The tennis team won seven matches in addition to their loss. Greg (Blistering Serve) Gates was the only senior on the squad, so next year's squad should provide some tough competition for other conference opponents.

The cross country team, under the tutorship of its new coach, Duane Rowe, was the team which showed the most improvement over last year as they had an 11 win and five loss record. The X-men won the city championship but could do no better than a third in the conference.

The winter sports, basketball and swimming, had only six losses between them. The swimmers won 12 and lost two. Coach Hoyer's crew, participating in the toughest area in the state, lost only to city Riley and Adams, the teams which were one, two, respectively, in state competition. The Bears finished fifth in the state meet to give South Bend three of the first five places.

The varsity basketball team, which was ranked first in the state for many weeks, ended the season with an 18-4 record. "Toolie" Coalmon, who was ranked the top high school basketball player in the state in pre-season polls, received an injury that pretty well hampered the chances of the McCallmen for the rest of the year. Senior star Denny Bishop took up where he had left off in his junior year to be the star playmaker of this year's crew. Denny won the Kiwanis award and the Free Throw award.

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
