Cheryl is now eligible for state and national scholarship awards to be given on the basis of original examination scores and an additional general questionaire.

Cheryl is a member of the National Honors Society and the J.E .-T.S. science club. She enjoys cooking, but her first love is actually knitting. She also plays the French Horn in the school band and orchestra, and the city's Honors Band. Cheryl plans to attend either Northwestern or Purdue universities and major in engineering.

A state Homemaker of Tomorrow and runner-up will be selected from the winners of the schools across the state. The state winner will receive a college scholarship of \$1,500, and the runner-up will earn a \$500 educational grant. The national winner will be chosen from the state winners on the basis of her original test score plus personal observation and interviews made during an expense paid educational tour of parts of the eastern United States. The national winner will have her scholarship increased to \$5,000, and the second, third, and fourth place winners will have their grants increased to \$4,000.




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Optimistic

Like many other Central sports. the 1968 track team will suffer from a lack of depth and participants. On the bright side, however, there are five or six experienced returning boys who are capable of turning in good performances for the Bears.

Of the twenty-eight boys who signed up for coach Bill Gilkeys' squad, there are six freshmen, six sophmores, nine juniors, and nine seniors. Eight boys have signed as managers

Last years team left a nucleus of six veterans, but six top competitors were lost by graduation. Those ex-Centralites and their top events are: Bruce Erhardt, shot-put and sprints; Larry Schzechowski, shotput, sprints and relay; Bob Kuehl, distance running; Dennis Boney, who took care of the two mile run; 440 and relays.

The six returning lettering lettermen are: Lyn Thompson, who will race in the hurdling events; Bob Seals, who will compete in the half-mile, mile, and relay races; George Smith, 440, half mile and relay; Larry Johnson, a hurdler and relay man Charles Fuller, sprints and relay; and Cleo Kilgore, the teams high jumper and broad jumper. Some of the other promising candidates are Greg Combs, half mile; James Husband, sprints; Art Moore, sprints; and Art Lax, shot-put.

Bob Seals, who toppled several school records last year, will be trying to better his own times of 4:16.5 for the mile, 1:57.4 in the half mile, and 9:40 in the two mile race. George Smiths' personal records of the '67 season are 51:1 seconds in the 440, and 2:03 in the 880. Larry Johnsons' marks are 14:9 in the high hurdles, and 198 in the low hurdles. Charles Fuller posted times of 10:2 in the 100, and 23.5 in the 220. Trying for even greater heights this year will be Cleo Kilgore, who marked 5'9" in the high jump and 21'3" in the broad jump.

With this nuclues of six outstanding performers, coach Gilkeys' team can expect a reasonably successful season this year.
