Student Council Elections

Student Council elections are here again. While freshmen may not understand all that is going on, the activities of this week are old hat to the rest of the school. Party meetings, candidates campaigning, posters along the walls, banners across the halls - these are all part of the general atmosphere pervading the entire school. Everything is finally climaxed by the election assembly and the actual election.

Don't get so caught up in "party feeling" that you forget the purpose of the election. The Student Cuncil will be the student governing body of Central all next year; it will need a very good leader. This leader should be picked with care. Don't vote for a candidate just because he or she is one of your best friends. Vote for either of the two candidates because you know he or she has done a good job in the past and will continue to do so. Vote for the candidate who has the better ideas expressed in his or her party platform.

But don't get the idea that the presidential election is the only thing that counts in this election. A good vice-president is a must; if the president is sick or otherwise unable to attend a meeting, the vice-president must be able to conduct the meeting as well as the president. A reliable secretary is also needed; if accurate records of meetings are not kept, even the president and vice-president will be handicapped. Although the treasurer is always at the bottom of the slate, this job must be filled by a person capable of handling large sums of money.

Each of the candidates for each office this year is able to do a good job. You, the voter, must go to the polls and elect the candidates who you think will do the best job.



Last year there were two established parties, the Pioneers and United Students. Then there was enough interest in that election to have a new party formed, the Central party. This year, for some reason, there was a lack of interest; came time for the turning in of slates and platforms, and United Students just wasn't there. The party, once very strong in the elections, has simply disappeared.

Surviving are the Pioneers and Central parties. But don't think that they haven't been hit by this lack of interest. Their main problem is money. They don't have enough money because they don't have the support needed to have big projects to make the moneythere are only about 15 active supporters in each party.

The trouble seems to be that The Central Band will present many people either don't care who gets elected, or feel that each candidate would do the job equally Central auditorium. Tickets are well. BLACK HISTORY

"When I think of the question of progress in the area of relations,

I try to look at it from the realistic point of view," declared the late Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. His preaching of non-violence succeeded in ending segregation on the public buses of Montgomery, Alabama on December 21, 1956, after a 381-day boycott of the city's transit system by Negroes. "I think we have come a long, long way but we have a long, long way to go," he said. King was now regarded as a leader of "the new Negro" who approached the problem of gaining rights guaranteed him by the U.S. Supreme Court with determination but without anger.

ND Sponsors Summer Class

On Wednesday, June 18, the University of Notre Dame begins a summer class on reading, writing, and study skills. It will follow a Monday - Wednesday - Friday schedule of classes continuing until Friday, August 1. This session will be open to twenty students who are entering their junior or senior year of high school. These twenty position will be filled on the first come - first served basis. The classes will meet from 1:30 to 4:00 P.M. with a short break about every sixty minutes.

The program will emphasize development of reading techniques and rates, comprehension, writing narrative and expository types of prose and improved techniques of studying. Integration of these skills will focus on appreciation and taste for ideas, the written word and dynamics of language. Class work will consist of group instructions and individual practice with modern laboratory equipment. Reading, writing and study skills will be evaluated at the beginning and end of the program. There will be homework for some of the classes requiring one to two hours of outside class work.

Any student enrolled in the proextra hours of laboratory practice, use of the library and attending special lectures, plays, art and music programs, for total educational experiences.

The total fee for this is \$90 which includes the mandatory down-payment of \$15 included. Anyone interested should contact Room 309, in the Administration Building at the University of Notre Dame.




