THANKSGIVING DAY EDITORIAL

On Thanksgiving Day it is not enough to say, "I am thankful that the American way of life is wonderful."

American freedom will continue only if American citizens are resolved to perform personal sacrifices in its behalf, every day of the year.

Democracy demands more civic responsibility than any other form of government. Being a citizen in a democracy entails more work than any other type citizenship. Democracy demands an active, personal citizenship. If individual citizens do not participate, democratic government becomes a mockery, and our freedoms will disappear.

The freedom of the ballot depends upon our duty to vote intelligently. Our right to a fair trial rests upon our readiness to serve on the jury when called. The right to worship God in our own way parallels our duty to extend respect to the religious beliefs of others. Freedom of the press depends upon the obligations of the press to publish the truth as it sees it.

Equality of opportunity and freedom from discrimination depends upon our refraining from radical, religious and class prejudices. The right to assure our children of a free education depends upon our obligations to take an active interest in educational issues and to pay taxes to support the public schools. Our right to work in an occupation and locality of our choice and our right to own property rest upon our duty to extend similar rights to our fellow men.

Though we are genuinely grateful for our great American Heritage we must not be content to rest upon that thankfulness. Not only must we preserve the freedoms handed down to us, but we must also expand and improve those freedoms. On this Thanksgiving Day we must remember that liberty, as Jefferson said, cannot be completely inherited, but "must be won anew for every issue in every generation."

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From The Office Of The Principal

Basketball season is now here and this seems an opportune time to bring to mind some of the rules and regulations laid down by the Indiana High School Athletic Association of which we are a member. We are asking the cooperation of students and fans in maintaining our membership in this association.

1. The Principal of the high school shall be the authorized representative of his school and responsible to the I.H.S.A.A. for control and management.
2. The Principal has the authority to exclude any contestant who, because of bad habits or improper conduct, would not represent his school in a becoming manner.
3. Principals shall take the proper measures to control the crowd and the players at all contests. Failure to do so shall be considered sufficient reason for suspension from the Association.
4. In all contests the decisions of the officials are considered final and binding.
5. A passing grade in each of three or more subjects requiring a minimum of fifteen regular high school recitations per week is interpreted to mean a passing grade in each of three regular high school subjects having a full semester value and for which a full semester credit is given.
6. Students shall be ineligible for any athletic competition upon reaching twenty years of age.
7. A high school student shall be considered as violating his amateur standing if he participates in athletic activities, schools, try-outs, practices and games held or sponsored by professional athletic organizations, clubs, or their representatives during the season of a sport or between the seasons of a sport. This rule applies to all sports except baseball during the summer vacation.
8. Any student, whose conduct or character is such, in the judgment of the Board of Control or his high school Principal, as to reflect discredit upon his high school or upon the I.H.S.A.A. is not eligible to participate in inter-school contests.
9. In cases in which an ineligible student has been used, the high school Principal shall be held responsible.
10. The giving and receiving of awards and medals shall (a) be kept within reasonable bounds; (b) have symbolic value only and (c) be done by and with the consent and under the supervision of the high school principals concerned.
 Note — The giving and receiving of awards by and with the consent and under the supervision of the high school principals concerned shall mean that the high school principal in each school shall have real control and supervision without pressure of any kind from outside persons or groups of persons.
11. Suitable awards may be given by such organizations as service clubs, patriotic organizations, civic groups, Dads' and Mothers' clubs, and the sports department of a newspaper or radio station. No awards should be accepted which, in any way, advertise any firm or individual so far as commercial or business interests are concerned.
12. Awards, medals, recognitions, gifts, trips and honors shall not be accepted by players or schools from colleges, universities and higher institutions of learning or their alumni.
13. Organized or formal practices in basketball by players or teams may be held within the school from the period beginning October 1 and ending on the date of the State Final Championship Basketball Tourney each school year.

How come Ruth C. and Bonnie K. are trying to put new words in the Government book. For instance, re-imbartation and reincarnation for extradition!!! More fun!!


We hear that Norma Smith is falling again! Watch your step, Norma!!

Dan Zielinski led the Tigers with 18 points, however, the Colonials' Jim Webber came through with 26 counters for the game's high scoring honors.

PANTHERS POUNCE ON COLONIALS

Madison's Panthers handed our Colonials their second consecutive loss last Friday on the Panthers' home court. As the final gun sounded the scoreboard read, Madison 58, Washington-Clay 50.
