## Audio Visual Procedures Simplified By Mr. Miller

Candid Camera has come to Clay!! Walking down the 100 hall last week one could see oneself on television. This wasn't A.B.C. or C.B.S., it was C.H.S., Clay's first closed circuit television was a presentation from the Audio-Visual Department of the School system, where it was not being used.

The equipment will be used experimentally to study the feasibility of a teaching with closed circuit television.

Mr. Galen Miller, a new biology teacher this year, has simplified the use of audio visual materials. Instead of running madly from the desk to the tape recorder or overhead projector, to switch them on or off, he can now control them from one place: in front of the classroom. Films and tape can be stopped at any time, so that only material pertinent to a particular lesson might be used. Speaking of the value of the device, Mr. Miller said, "The importance of this arrangement is that there is less time wasted in setting up this equipment and getting it ready for class use. It is also possible to have the material available at the instructor's fingertips at the precise moment it is needed. It is hoped that someday there will be used in each classroom."
