



Mark Smith Bulldogs on their way to the 1969 State Triple-A Basketball Championship, a coach from some Savannah high school asked the question, "Where Is Mark Smith?" Poor man, if only he had known before-hand that this statement would kindle a flame in a team that brought the state's greatest honor to its school.

It was a story that brought praise and encouragement from all parts of the state. One called it the "Impossible Dream." Perhaps, without dreams, there would be no reality for the boys that made up this team dreamed and made that dream fact.

To win it, was no easy chore. They had to beat four of the toughest teams in the South But this had been the story the entire year as the bulldogs played one of the toughest, if not the toughest schedules, in the state

The season had its disappointments, such as two heart-breaking losses to Lanier, one an upset in the Tom Porter Christmas Tournament. But the highlights-it would be an understatement to say anything other than every game played, was a highlight. This team was the most exciting, most determined to ever take to the hardwoods in this city

The boys who did the impossible, the starting five, were Scott Judd, Cam Bonifay, Frank Prince David Lee, and Charley Anderson. Paired man for man with the teams

things didn't look bright. But when they took to the court as a smooth efficient machine, the sun began to shine.

The team captain, little Scott Judd, was perhaps the most determined of this miraculous five. Lacking an awful lot in the height department, time and time again this season, he proved there's a place for the little man in basketball. Who can ever forget the sight of number 13, twisting his way through three huge Ballard Hudson players to shoot a layup with three seconds left to give the Dogs a great 75-73 victory? Or who can ever forget the little battler in the last Carver game? No value can ever be placed on his worth to the team.

We'll long remember the man who stole the ball with fifteen seconds left in the Carver game to allow Prince to shoot the winning layup. His hustle, his concentration, and his tremendous ballhandling kept the Dogs in each game against the finest pressing teams in the state For his efforts Cam Bonifay was named to the All-Tournament

Another All-Torunament team member, the one who fired the shot heard 'round the state, was Frank Prince. Although he shot when it counted. His determination was an inspiration to all members of the

The most consistent player on

was David Lee. In each game, he hit for more than ten points: above his regular season average. He, along with Scott Judd, barely missed be ing named to the All-Tourney

The big man, Charley Anderson put on the greatest display of coolness under pressure ever shown in a high school basketball game, His foul shots and his field goals were tremendous. But eating the glass is his specialty and he pinned the ball against the backboard in the last game. He was also All-Torney, but more important, he was named the Tournament's Most Valuable

These were the "Miracle Five." The other team members were just as important. The price they paid in practice and while subbing in games, was a must for the honors reaped. The story they wrote touched the hearts of nearly everyone in the state

So if ever someone asks you where Mark Smith is, tell them the story about the boys who dreamed the impossible dream and made it come true. Tell them about their demonstration, their devotion, their desire, but most important of all, their faith-faith that they could overcome overwhelming odds. It's what was inside of them that made it all possible and after all, that's where Mark Smith truly is.

Coach Minton Williams has been head football coach and athletic director since the school's very beginning.

Eulogy Educator

"Education is a painful continual and difficult task to be done by kindness by watching by warning. by precept, and by praise, but above all-by example.

This quotation by John Ruskin, indeed describes the works of Dr. Mark Smith, Superintendent of Bibb County School System from 1941, until his death in October

Dr. Smith was a man of service, who gave tirelessly and unselfishly of himself to his community, as evidenced by his many civic activities. At one time or other, Dr. Smith served in practically every community activity in Macon. He was president and chairman of the Community Chest Drive chairman of the Red Cross, and a member of the Board of Trustees of the Macon Chamber of Commerce. He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church and their Board of Elders He belonged to the Masons, Scottish Rite, Shrine, Elks, and Royal Order of Jesters

On the state level in 1931, Dr. Smith was commander and state chairman of the American Legion, a high official in the Boy Scouts, district chairman of Warm Springs Foundation, and state chairman of the Tuberculosis Association. One of the highest honors he ever received, was that of President of Kiwanis International.

Dr. Smith's civic activities are only a part of his contribution. Few people realize the full scope of his service and accomplishments in the field of education. Dr. Smith's greatest contribution to the student, however, was his service in Bibb County. Coming just prior to the War, he was here at a time when

this country experienced critical problems of growth. The county population is now more than 2/3 times that of the 1940 census. This growth is reflected in many schools by an enrollment increase from 17 000 in 1941 to over 30 000 pupils last year. High school enrollment has more than doubled during this time

Victory in 1945 found school facilities woefully inadequate here in Bibb County and across the nation Viewing the needs. Dr. Smith guided the members of the Board of Education into an ambitious building program, beginning with a bond issue of 21/2 million dollars. Approved in 1948, so meager a sum under Dr. Smith's wise administra tion, built Miller and Lanier Junior High Schools, the senior division of Ballard-Hudson, four Negro elementary schools, and additions to twenty other grammar schools.

Again searching for means to exnand Dr Smith secured sufficient Federal funds to engage in a 21/4 million dollar building program in 1953-54. From these funds came four white schools-Hall Tinsley Neel, and Barden- and one Negro

Allowing the system hardly a moment of rest from extensive construction, in 1956, Dr. Smith requested another bond issue, this time for 41/2 million, McEvoy, Willingham Appling and three grammar schools, besides additions to twelve others were completed. In all, since 1941, the Bibb County system has double in size, with the appraised value of school property increasing from 2 to 14 million dol-

To quote from a Board member

Mr Wallace Miller Ir "He (Dr. Smith) was the principal figure in the growth of the Bibb County School physical properties during his term as superintendent, and did more than any other person to keep school construction in pace with the increasing enrollment.

Concerned for the physically handicapped children of Bibb County, Dr. Smith worked closely with specialists to establish the Schools of Special Education here. Upon the request of the Association of Childhood Education, he fostered the establishment of the Macon Youth at Weslevan Conservatory and was its first Board Chair-

Closest to many students was his activities in the Beta Club, a national honorary organization for high school students. Over the years since its founding, Dr. Smith gave much of his time to advisory positions, serving on the Beta Council and National Senate. He was the only man to be national president twice, and was serving his second term at his death

Yes, the death of Dr. Smith marked the end of an important period, a period in which Bibb County was fortunate in having an educator who served his community and its schools as generously and capably as did Dr. Mark Smith.

Now Bibb County shows its eternal appreciation to this fine educator as evidence by the Mark Smith High School, located on Up per River Road; a distinction of quality, honor, and character that shall forever be part of its students and a atatue of meaning to the man

Eulogy To Coach

A great basketball team does not just happen, a good one might, but not a great one. The 1968-69 Mark Smith basketball team was a great one Compared individually with players of the teams they defeated one may not think so. In all four state tournament games, they were underdogs, even picked once to lose by more than ten points. Yet, when the Smith "5" took to the hardwood, they were a smooth-working unit, great in every respect. What made them this way?

Last year, Donald "Butch" Clifton took over the reigns as head basketball coach. He had led the "B" team for two sparkling years but the varsity was still a big step, especially since the Bulldogs face the toughest competition in the state-triple A.

The team last year, began early one morning in August when Coach Clifton drove them up to North Carolina in a yellow school bus. He took them to a basketball camp to learn basketball and it paid off. Although finishinf .500, 13 wins and 13 loses, this team gave everyone hopes of exciting things to come.

It was the same coach who at the start of the season this year, said he hoped the Bulldogs would win two or three of their first six games. They won five. The spirit was developed and they carried it through and won the State Tournament games. Everyone feels that without Coach Clifton's efforts and his ability to make his team become

leaders, the success they obtained would not be possible.

Coach "Butch" Clifton's life story can easily be summed up as a life of basketball.

Throughout his career in basketball, he has displayed his talent on the floor as a player and off the floor as a coach.

Coach Clifton was born and raised in Albany Georgia where he started playing basketball at the age of eleven in the Y.M.C.A. When he began attending Albany High School, if you can believe this, he was cut from the ninth grade team. After a lot of hard work, Coach Clifton became a starter on the varsity as a junior. He played fifteen

games that year and was only 5'8" During his junior year, he began to grow and became the captain of the basketball team by the time he

Coach Clifton led 1AAA scoring his last year and was one of the best free throw shooters in the region. His vast improvement enabled him to be selected to play in the north-South All Star game

When he finished his career in Albany, he was offered several basketball scholarships from different colleges. After a lot of consideration, he chose Mercer.

Coach Clifton began his coaching career the first year Mark Smith opened and has been head basketball coach for the past two years.

After he became the head basketball coach at Mark Smith, he attended John Wooden's Basketball School, head coach of the powerful U.C.L.A. basketball team. He has also attended the Stetson Baskethall Camp.

He was interested in other sports too His first love was football but he never was big enough to excell in the sport. Coach Clifton also lettered in baseball two times, while attending Albany High School. In tennis, he became a champion as a

At the age of twelve, Coach Clifton was named "Boy of the Year."

Coach Clifton made these comments about what athletics meant to him, "Without athletics, I probably wouldn't be anything; it gave me a scholarship to Mercer, and an education when I got out." "I think athletics are a way of life. I think it makes a boy a man to participate in athletic competition because through athletics, a boy has a chance to see what life is all about. To be a success in the business world, you must face competition, pressure, must be aggressive and believe in yourself, to get the job done.

There has been many highlights in Coach Clifton's life, with him playing basketball for Albany High. Mercer University, the Cheshire Cats, playing in the North-South All Star Game, and leading Region IAAA in scoring, but the biggest highlight of all is the 1968-69 Mark Smith Story
