Her Legacy: Our Inspiration

To honor the generous legacy of Mrs. Watkins, past residents of Watkins and Miller Halls, through Kitchen 8, established the Elizabeth Miller Watkins Memorial Scholarship Fund in 1998. The Fund that began with a few hundred dollars will this year award \$58,000 in scholarships. We would like to thank all who have donated. It is amazing how one woman's vision can impact so many women's lives.

Elizabeth Miller Watkins was born in 1861 in New Paris, Ohio, daughter of a Civil War doctor. When Elizabeth was 11, her family moved to Lawrence where she enrolled in the KU Prep School. Sadly, after only 2 years, she was forced to drop out and help support her family. Elizabeth would later turn her own unfulfilled dream of an education into a legacy for generations of women to come. At 15 she began work at the J B Watkins Land and Mortgage Co. She and JB were married in 1909. They had no children of their own and after JB's death in 1921, she turned her attention to the plans of giving she and JB had made. With a \$75,000 donation in 1925, Watkins Hall opened in 1926, the first scholarship hall in America. Building on that success, Miller Hall opened in 1937. Mrs. Watkins also created and gave a trust to provide for the maintenance and upkeep of both halls, which is still active today.

Janice Gartrell lived in Watkins Scholarship Hall from 1939-1942. She was known as "Giggles" and "Garter" to her friends at Watkins. She enjoyed her roommates, taking pictures and she excelled academically. She had an outstanding career in the oil business and loved to travel. After her passing in March of 2009, the EMWMSF received the funds of the Janice Gartrell Charitable Remainder Trust, enabling Kitchen 8 to award generous scholarships to deserving young KU women. Janice Gartrell was truly a woman who embodied Mrs. Watkins' legacy.

2013-14 Elizabeth Miller Watkins Memorial Scholarship Award Recipients

Akira Cowden: *Lawrence, Kansas*

Akira will be a sophomore majoring in English and Religious Studies. She intends to first invest two years working in the Peace Corps. Following that, she wants to teach English in South Korea, a country with one of the highest teen suicide rates in the world due to a rigid and highly difficult school system. Her ambition is to become a teacher that inspires hope and



ambition in her students. Akira wants to teach in an elementary school so she can give students the tools they need to be globally aware as well as the strength to persevere through the trials and tribulations of their middle and high school educations.



Erika Garcia: *Merriam, Kansas*

In 2013-14 Erika will be a junior studying public administration. Erika uses her bilingual Spanish-English skills to help students and their parents with the process of pursuing a college degree. In addition, she reserves extra time to learn more about the needs of the Hispanic community through her involvement in several Latino community organizations. She is also serving her second term as President of Latinos of Tomorrow (LOTs). All of these experiences have allowed her to work closer with Hispanic students, particularly those who are undocumented and have less opportunities to continue their education because of the lack of resources available to them.



Hali Hutley: St. Marys, Kansas

Next fall Hali will be a senior studying Pharmacy. She wishes to touch many lives and to give back to my community in ways similar to Mrs. Watkins. In her scholarship application Hali wrote, “Being female, I really appreciate all that she has done for the education of women. Her helpful attitude, generous nature, and keen business sense endeared her to many. Her values and choices that she made

in life shaped a community. Her influence can still be felt today.”



Emilyjane Pyle: Dodge City, Kansas

Emilyjane will be a junior studying Music Therapy. In her application Emilyjane wrote, “My life has been changed by the generosity and foresight of Mrs. Watkins. I live in Miller Scholarship Hall, just as my Grandmother did before me. My grandmother would not have been able to attend college without EMW’s help. I am the fifth generation of women to attend college in my family. This has made me respectful and enthusiastic about education and would not have been possible without the kindness of Elizabeth Miller Watkins. The spunk and spirit that Mrs. Watkins had is embodied in the women of Lilac Lane. We come from all sorts of families and backgrounds.”

Jocelyn Sajnani: Overland Park, Kansas

Jocelyn will be an incoming freshman studying Biology. She wrote in her application “As the daughter of two immigrant parents (one from Mexico and the other from India), I have grown up with the understanding that an education is the most powerful weapon—something that once earned, can never be taken away.

As a result, I share Elizabeth’s passion for education and respect her dedication to the students of the University of Kansas and the campus itself. She did so much to enhance KU that over 40 years later students continued to thank her for the many contributions she made. However, her support was not only monetary; she also influenced the lives of innumerable people through her selfless kindness.”



Katerina Sieg: Ottawa, Kansas

Next fall Katerina will be a junior majoring in Elementary Education. In her application Katerina wrote, “Mrs. Watkins was unique to her time as she overcame the stereotype of women’s absence in the work force. I believe that I have exhibited a similar level of unconventionality, which created challenges that I overcame, and yielded positive outcomes. Living in the Pacific for half my life allowed me to have a unique educational career as I was homeschooled by my mother until my first year of high school. However, through my self-discipline and passion for education, I have succeeded in my post-secondary education among peers who have more conventional educational careers. My unconventionality molded my appreciation for my education”.

Hailey Baker: Lee’s Summit, Missouri




The 2013-14 school year will be senior and microbiology major Hailey’s third year as a scholarship recipient. Following an internship last summer, Hailey became interested in the public health aspect of the medical field. This summer Hailey will journey to Panama on a global brigade, volunteering in a mobile health clinic. She will also be shadowing medical doctors and giving public health care education to rural Panamanians. She is hoping that this trip will give her further insight into her future in the medical field.

Qiao Yi Chen: Wichita, Kansas

Qiao is a senior studying biology who originally received the scholarship for her sophomore year in 2010-2011. Qiao shared, “The scholarship, as well as living at Watkins Scholarship Hall, reduced a great portion of my financial stress and allowed me to focus on schoolwork without worrying about my tuition.” This year to avoid burdening her family’s financial situation, this hard-working woman



took up to 4 different jobs: Crawford Desk Assistant, Optometry Technician, PLUS leader for Organic Chemistry, and personal tutor for General Chemistry. Because she has been awarded a scholarship for this coming year Qiao said, "I believe, with the help of the scholarship, I can earnestly focus on my academic work again." Her ultimate goal is to return home and help to improve the medical work and conditions back in China. "I've been training myself as a leader through up taking the Alumni Chair at Watkins Scholarship Hall, working as a PLUS leader for Organic Chemistry I&II at KU, and AWANA leader at a local Chinese church. I am also currently working at an Entomology Research Lab on molecular DNA of beetles. I believe all of these experiences will help to shape me in various ways, and I am truly thankful for the people that sacrificed their time to help and guide me. Living at Watkins has often reminded me to give thanks to the people around me and most importantly, not to give up."



Kerra Cissne: Topeka, Kansas

Next year Kerra will be a junior Pharmacy student. Upon graduation in 2016 she plans to pursue a Master's degree in Clinical Research. This would give her better tools to understanding disease states, how or why the drugs do/do not work, as well as what clinical outcomes to expect. To offset the cost of school and reduce her student loans, Kerra works 20 hours per week at a hospital in Topeka, KS. In the fall she will be balancing not only school and work responsibilities, but also the responsibilities of motherhood.

Rebecca Crook: Kansas City, Missouri

This is Rebecca's second year as an EMWM Scholar. During the 2012-13 will be a senior studying Environmental Studies with an emphasis in Plant Ecology. This summer she plans to attend a field school for Field Ecology. She is on the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences honor roll, and plans on graduating with Departmental Honors in Environmental Studies. With the guidance of a faculty sponsor, she is currently



working on her senior thesis, which is about the ecology, history, and restoration of the Tallgrass Prairie.

Her academic plans remain targeted towards keeping good grades and striving for another 4.0 this semester. Simona hopes to expand her horizons and gain a more global perspective by immersing herself in a new culture. She wants to practice a new language, build relationships with people from a different culture, and see how her profession is practiced abroad.


Natalie Scott: Topeka, Kansas
