Three perspectives on what Hall life is like in a pandemic:

Hello, my name is Kathy Martinez Reynaga and I am the Alumni Chair for Miller Hall this year. This year has been full of firsts for Miller Hall and our Lilac Lane Sweethearts are still thriving into the Spring semester.

I have lived in Miller Hall for 5 semesters so far and I have loved every minute of it. Although these unprecedented times can be difficult, having a loving and supportive community here at Miller has been essential to keeping smiles all around.

I hope you all enjoy a look at how Miller is operating this year and hearing from some of our Executive Board and how they have been!

Miller Life has adapted, so all of our residents can live safely, while still maintaining the Miller community together. One of the biggest changes Miller has seen is having our beds in our study rooms. We must wear masks in the Hall if we are outside our personal rooms. The Sleeping Porch has been changed into a Study Porch to accommodate all the desks which can no longer fit in personal rooms.

For the Kitchen situation, we have switched to having only independent kitchens as shared food is not allowed for safety reasons. Kitchen assignments are also divided by room numbers with an average of 2-3 rooms per kitchen. At the very end of the Fall semester, KU Housing permitted eating within the kitchens. Only one resident can eat at a time, and is the only person allowed in the kitchen, until they are done and have disinfected their eating area.

This has been an evolving situation, but as always Millerites persevere as a community!




A "NEW" NEW WOMAN BOOKLET

Each room got a box of tissues, and each hall got a brand-new forehead scanner thermometer as well as a pulse oximeter to monitor blood oxygen levels in case someone should get sick. I was also able to get 2 tubs of disinfecting wipes for each hall. They were still in short supply at the time, so I was happy to find them!


She is survived by her husband David and three children: David III, Deanna and Duane.

Thank you to all of you who helped us continue our goals of reaching out to our current residents of Watkins and Miller Halls and awarding our Elizabeth Miller Watkins Memorial Scholarships! I love getting your notes along with donations, sharing your experiences while living in the halls. I even got a good recipe along with a donation this year, from Phyllis Bock, who lived in Miller 1971-72! (available upon request!)

Our President, Paula Wrigley, met the challenge of how to interface with our current residents while observing their pandemic rules. Thank you to all our members who helped us provide COVID-19 Care Kits, supply New Woman Booklets and Treats, and pay for the All-Hall Photos. We give a large photo reprint to each Hall for Elizabeth's Birthday. Another source of donations sadly came with the death of Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsberg. Several of our members made donations in her honor. Thank you to everyone who cared and shared.

With donations of \$3,392.52 this year, we felt it was prudent to forego printing and mailing a magazine this year. Your K8 Board decided to send out a postcard alerting our members to our 2021 Annual Meeting and Scholarship Awards (by Zoom this year) and asking alumnae to register on our website.

A short review of K8 income and expenses is provided with this report. All K8 records are on QuickBooks.

The Elizabeth Miller Watkins Memorial Scholarship Fund began 2020 with \$1,521,996.74. After giving grants of \$68,000 during 2020, the End of Year balance was \$1,665,934.72. Contributions given to the EMWMS fund during 2020 totaled \$2,720.00.
